Hitch Hikers Meet Rebuff

Independent men who have been striving to establish a local chapter of the national hitch hiking fraternity deserve aid rather than hindrance from college officials. Starting with the idea that organized hitch hiking would make life easier and less expensive for the hundreds of Spartan men who lack railroad or bus fares, independent leaders worked diligently toward their cause. They believe the organization of the national to which they are becoming affiliated is sound. They believe, further, that one centralized organization will be more satisfactory than a multiplicity of local organizations because of difficulties of securing nationwide motorist acceptance of small organizations. Union officials yesterday halted formation of the chapter in time to aid students returning home for their Christmas vacations. They objected because of the fifty cent initiation fee, saying that this fee put the organization in the same class with other societies in the Union. If this organization is worthy, the necessity of solicitation should not interfere. Blue Key, national junior men's honorary, annually makes it solicitations in the Union. Part of Blue Key fees go to a national as do those of the hitch hiking society. Revenues from both are making jobs for persons in national offices. As service groups, both should have equal rights in the Union. Another objection by authorities was that the new hitch hiking group would violate the spirit of East Lansing hitch hiking. It might do this if students showed their picarons merely to get rides to Lansing. But it is believed that the traditional cooperation between students and townspeople will be maintained without use of the new technique.

There is a membership fee of 50 cents a year to be collected on each student registers, which may or may not be solicited. Mr. Proddy said that this "soliciting" was one reason for not allowing the registration and that the other was a statement by Chief of Police Ham that such action would be contrary to the spirit of some East Lansing ordinances. Ham failed to define this spirit. Plans are being made so the memberships can be distributed to students desiring them, some ways before the Christmas holidays, back towards home.


