Diver Plans Two Talks Tonight

Max Gene Nohl Will Tell of Record Descent In Lake Michigan

Max Gene Nohl, who spent nine minutes on the floor of Lake Michigan at a depth of 420 feet, will make two appearances on the student lecture course tonight at 7 and 9 p.m.

Nohl broke the world's diving record with that descent on December 1, 1937. Pressure at that depth was 180 pounds per square inch.

NEW RECORD

The diver made his famous descent off Port Washington and went down 114 feet deeper than the official record of Frank Culley of the United States navy.

Success of the dive was attributed to the use of a new diving suit invented by the sea explorer himself. Previous to that time divers had been unable to descend to such a distance because of their inability to live on air pumped to them. Max Nohl's suit provides for the diver to use oxygen and helium which eliminates the nitrogen in natural air.

It is the nitrogen in the natural air that is extremely dangerous to divers. The intense subsurface compression of the air causes bubbles of the gas to form in the lungs and blood which causes "bends" or a crippling and sometimes fatal convolution of muscles.

During the descent the diver donned first ordinary shorts, then a suit of fluffy wool with a chamois skin cover and tight roll neck and then the waterproof suit of canvas thinly surfaced with a rubber-like compound. As accessories he wears thick wool mittens and socks, lead and steel shoes weighing 28 pounds each, and a football helmet to ward off bumps, and the air purifier.

EXPLORED SHIPS

Max Nohl's experience under water includes sponge diving. He accompanied the Seth Parker expedition as a diver exploring the wrecks of the Spanish Main. Last spring he helped in salvage work aboard the Louisiana seeking to recover \$20,000,000 treasure imprisoned in her hull.

Although only 27 years old he is considered an authority on sunken ships. He has done considerable submarine photography and will show colored motion pictures of his own making as the basis of his lecture.

Drama Comes of Age

"Drama in a cow college?"

That was the song of the scoldish when Michigan State college first attempted this practice of the finer arts many years ago.

But the originators of the movement shut their eyes and ears to the chant of the disbelievers and made their small beginnings.

From those beginnings has grown a recognized Michigan State institution. Campus exponents of the sock and buskin are beginning to come into their own. But they are having their troubles.

Growing pains are always bothersome even when the afflicted ones receive all possible cooperation from those about them. When that cooperation is lacking, growing pains sometimes take an unexpected toll. And lack of cooperation with its painful aftermath is the very thing that is threatening the life of Spartan dramatics.

Whether the administrative heads will see fit to include a theater annex to the new auditorium in their building program is still a matter of conjecture. It is to be hoped that bids for the construction have been taken both with and without the annex.

And there are other angles to the theater project. For instance, no previous appropriations have been considered to take care of those things that will turn the building from a mere shell into a properly equipped student theater.

Things like curtains and footlights and ventilation, although important all proper acoustics. Because these things are expensive they have fallen before the axe of the budget trimmer. Without them, a theater will be of little use to the dramatists.

And then there are numerous smaller instances of non-cooperation instances that could easily be avoided. There is the matter of rehearsals.

Rehearsal periods, to be effective, must be long. Increasing the number of periods is of little value. To when the cast of a play may not be present the play requires that each rehearse each act of the play in its proper sequence. That can't be done here.

Why? Because the Dean of Women has decreed that no girl shall receive late permission for play practice. This in spite of the fact that the dramatics heads have offered to cut down the number of weekly practices and to see that every woman who might be given late permission shall be chaperoned.

There is also the fact that freshman women, unless they live in the dormitory, must be regarded as potential actresses. They also have been denied permission to be present over their dwelling after 8 p.m. for rehearsal.

Sixty afternoon practice is denied. Permission to leave the dining rooms early to permit longer rehearsals within the stipulated hours has been denied. Is there any good sound reason for these decisions?

Michigan State college dramatics have been running a strong race with pretty steep hurdles. But no wind would lift them.

It might be a good idea to speak with those heads.


