

Flu Peak Near: Not Serious Akers Talks Peak of the influenza epidemic sweeping Michigan State college and the midwest is expected to be reached here next week, Dr. C. F. Holland, head of the college health

service reported late Friday. However, the outbreak is not alarming, he says.

Although 130 cases now are under treatment or observation for the ailment, none of the cases is reported serious. No undue fear of the ailment need be felt at Michigan State, Because of the undulant fever outbreak on campus

only a limited number of cases are being treated in the hospital. About twenty patients have been sent to hospitals

downtown and the remainder confined to their rooms or to special wards set up in dormitories.

Wards to care for influenza victims have been set up in each of the college dormitories, health department authorities report. Patients are served meals in these wards

thorties report. Patients are served meals in these wards and receive medical care comparable to that of the hospital. Other persons suffering from influenza are being confined to their beds in rooming houses, Dr. Holland reports. To prevent further outbreak of influenza, Dr. Holland warns all persons feeling ill to remain in their rooms or report to the health service immediately. For their own good, persons suffering with fever should remain in bed, health

"Certainly any person owes it to his neighbor to help prevent the spread of the disease," Dr. Holland states.
