The state-wide influenza epidemic that has recently swept the campus of Michigan State college has taken its Here Today toll in health, and has threatened grades. toll in health, and has threatened grades.

It would seem that flu-ridden patients have had enough to contend with,--what with attempting to make up for lost class instruction as well as trying to recover from somewhat serious health setbacks,—without being burdened with the extra worry of class failure arising from cuts taken during illness

This worry is an unfounded one. There is no record to our knowledge wherein course failure has been threatened as punishment for over-cutting if there were good and sufficient excuse for that cutting.

But there have been widespread campus rumors to the effect that such measures would be adopted. In a letter to the Michigan State News, dated March 1, President Shaw allays such fears. Shaw states:

"Because of the prevalence of illness from various causes, some of them epidemic in character, the Administrative group joins with me in suggesting to instructors that special consideration be given all students whose class attendance or studies have been interfered with by sick-ness during the term."

This is as fair a suggestion, both to students and in-structors, as could be made.—D. H. T.






