Faculty Leaders Will Present Citizenship, Activities Awards

Special activity and athletic awards will be presented at the annual honor award assembly of the East Lansing high school in the auditorium at 9:40 p.m. Friday.

Highlight among the athletic awards will be the trophy given to the outstanding boy in athletic competition for the year. This award is made annually.

A special citizenship award will be given the senior boy and girl selected as ideal citizens of the spring term. The Home Economics club will present their annual award to the girl receiving the highest number of honor points for activity in the club. The outstanding vocal student will be chosen by the chorus.

At the assembly the names of the two boys to represent East Lansing high school at the Wolverine Boys' State to be held in June will be formally announced.

Honors will go to the three students most outstanding in oratory, declamation and extemporaneous speaking, respectively. Also under licensure recognition will be given to 12 debaters.

First, second, third, fourth and senior band awards will be given a large number of the members of the high school band and orchestra.

The Girls' Athletic association will honor their most outstanding member in athletic participation and service. Boys' athletic awards will go to the golf team, tennis team, tracksters and baseball team.

Leonard Gernert, in charge of publicity of the school, has stated that parents and patrons of the school are invited to attend. A student chairman will have charge of the meeting and presentation will be made by the faculty members in charge of each activity.

During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing on parade or in a review, all persons should face the flag, stand at attention and salute.

The union of the flag is the honor point; the right arm is the most noble standing. Those in uniform should salute at the first note, retaining this position until the last note is played. All men should remove their hats.
