Under the Wire

STOCKHOLM, May 3—Trondheim was surrendered officially today by Norwegian troops in the city, following withdrawal of Allied troops. Norway also was surrendered late yesterday, according to reports here.

The Norwegian commander at Trondheim is reported to have accused the Allies of retreating without warning, leaving Norwegian troops no alternative but surrender.

BERLIN, May 3—Great Britain was accused in official statements today of planning to spread the war to the Mediterranean. Germany warned the Allies that she is ready for such a move, the northern war being merely "a dress rehearsal for final stages of the war." Meanwhile, Rome newspapers today launched another bitter attack on Great Britain.

MOSCOW, May 3—Germany and Russia have agreed to preserve peace neutrality. It was reported here today. Agreement is said to have been reached in conferences last week.

IRON MOUNTAIN, Mich., May 3—Four cars and a truck were driven into a 90-foot water-filled pit late today when a large section of highway U.S. 2 caved in at the center of Iron Mountain Friday. Collapse of the highway, which has interrupted train service to and from the city, is believed caused by underground water seepage.

WASHINGTON, May 3—All chance of passing a revised version of the Wages and Hours Law in this session of Congress was stopped today when the House voted to send it back to committee. This is considered a victory for the President, who opposes the revision.

FOURTH APPEARANCE

It will be the fourth appearance for Mekules this season, his second in a starting role. He made his first start on the mound in the second game of the Wisconsin series, when he turned back the Badgers, 7-6. Paul Dickinson will be retained for relief duty today.

Satisfied with the present out-field regime, K. K. plans to let that sector remain the same for today's tilt. The score-board panel will be composed of Siegfried Jukkila in left, Paul Storch in center and Willie Davis in right.

At present, Sargent Jake is leading all Michigan State batters with an average of .409. Second to the Flint junior is another outfielder, Will Davis, with .387. Shantz, third member of the combine, is batting only .214 but has been the most reliable fielder on the squad.

FEW CHANGES SLATED

Only one other change is on the file for today's game. That is at first base where Bob Kamath, Escanaba sophomore, may replace George Owen. Kamath has been hitting consistently and should be play today. If the Spartans will have four left-handed batters to face the right-handed slants of Notre Dame hurler Rex Ellis.

Remainder of State infield will remain the same with Morrison at second, Duncan at shortstop, and Clegg-Klewicki on third.

In clashing with Notre Dame today, State will enter its 50th diamond meeting with the Irish since the opening of rivalry in 1910. Notre Dame has won 31 of the contests and 18 have gone to State. Last season State turned back the Irish twice, 14-9 and 4-3.

PITCHING RECORD

Ellis, right-hander who will be on the mound this afternoon, has won two games and lost one while hurling 30 innings this season. Ellis and Novak-Hunthausen are the two ace Irish pitchers and Hunthausen was slated to go against Michigan Wednesday. The game was rained out but it was expected that Ellis will still pitch in his turn.

Other starters for Notre Dame will be Charles Farrell, first base; George Sobeck, second base; Ray Pinelli, shortstop; Capt. Cliff Sullivan, third base, and Bernie Crimmins, catcher. Starting Irish cuttlers will be Ken Oberhauer, left field; Andy Cheblek, center field; and Hubert Crane, right field.

After deserting the diamond sport for many years, the University of Miami Hurricanes have drafted an extensive baseball schedule this spring.

Wildcats Are Back To Repeat Victory

Weather May Be Prime Factor

Weather permitting, local golf fans will get their first view of the 1940 Michigan State golf team in action today at 11 a.m. on the Walnut Hills golf course when the Spartans meet Northwestern U. in a continuation of an old rivalry.

According to Coach Ben* Van Alstyne, Northwestern is rumored to have a better team than usual team this year. Fannon and Bland, two of the Wildcats' varsity members who featured last year in State's downfall, furnish the nucleus of a team which is back to repeat its former victory if possible.

OUT FOR REVENGE

The Spartans, led by Stan Kowal, go into the match determined to get revenge for a 6½ to 11½ defeat suffered last year on the Wildcats' home golf course.

In the advent of cold weather, a repetition of the 1939 meet with Northwestern which ended 9½ to 8½ in favor of State would be satisfactory, but members of the team have set a higher goal and hope for a continuance of their one-sided victories enjoyed last week.

"If the boys shoot the kind of golf that I know they can, we should be able to take this Northwestern bunch in spite of their reputed power," asserted Van Alstyne. "Of course, cold weather will affect our scores," he continued, "but our opponents will have the same difficulty to contend with. And they aren't used to it, like we are."

Bud Tansy, who was recently moved up into the number 2 position for State, will remain in that place by virtue of his improved game which is causing Van Alstyne to breathe easier when viewing prospects remaining for the season.

LINE-UP SAME

Line-up for the meet will be the same as the one which has started off all the 1940 matches thus far. Stan Kowal, junior, will hold down the number 1 position; Tansy, the only senior on the team, is in number 2; Bill Zylstra, also a junior, will play at position number 3, and a newcomer to the team, Ralph Kortge, sophomore, will be number 4 man.

Spartans will be hampered by the lack of practice which the last week of changeable weather has caused. The team has been able to play only a couple of rounds since the last match.
