### **Russia May Act Openly**

The Nazis won't say, but a lot of speculation is afoot concerning the import of current conferences between Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov and Von Ribbentrop, who holds that position in the German government.

"Inter-continental peace" is the avowed subject for discussion. However, it's apparent that the real purpose is to speed up Russia's cooperation in German war efforts through shipment of munitions, because the Reich-Soviet pact has seen little more than lip service since its signing. This may be the time for the treaty to take on its full meaning.

reprovements have been killed in Rumania's alatest earthquakes, but more important to Germany is damage done in Rumania's rich oilfields. Russia may prove a handy ally while Rumania digs out of the ruins and tries to re-establish production of the millions of gallons of oil which the Nazi war machine had expected to get from her.

## **Finances** Trouble Draftees

Ever since activity of the selective service law began, the draftee and his financial circumstances have been the object of considerable attention, some worthy and some varacitic.

First on the worthy side, of course, are the legal measures taken to protect soldiers in America's new army from losing real and personal property through failure to make payments while in camp.

Tuesday the University of Michigan regents ruled that drafted students will get a refund of any tuition paid but not used. Some business firms are planning to pay employees the difference between their usual salary and army pay. In this connection, the Michigan Unemployment Compensation commission has ruled that such payments do not constitute wages. This means that firms which make these voluntary payments cannot deduct anything from them for unemployment compensation.

In the doubtful value class are those advertising efforts of some retail stores which Modern Greeks offer to sell merchandise to draftees on one of several "national defense" plans. Substance of most of these ideas is that a man eligible for military service can buy goods, but can return them without making any payments if he is called into the army. Such schemes seem to have quick turn-
