

Students Get New Ideas In Job Clinic

Bell Man Assists By Interviewing Senior Student

Aided by W. T. Kirk, employment supervisor of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co., the second Job Application Clinic was held Tuesday evening, with new ideas in application technique being presented.

Letters of application to Michigan Bell were studied at Tuesday's meeting of the clinic, conducted by Dave Jones, Student Council placement chairman, and C. E. Hurd, executive secretary of the Liberal Arts placement committee. Criticism by the audience followed each letter, as suggested by Kirk's suggestions.

INTERVIEWS SENIOR

Ruth Winegar, Liberal Arts senior from Marquette, was interviewed by Kirk for a position in the Bell commercial department after her application letter had been studied.

Kirk described Miss Winegar's behavior during the interview as "excellent," and she was given a personal application blank to fill out and invited back for further consideration.

POSITIVE ATTITUDE IN BEST

In addition to the points brought up at last week's clinic, which featured applications to the Olds Motor Works, several new suggestions were developed. Adoption of a positive rather than futile attitude in the search for employment was stressed, and inclusion of reasons for wanting to work for that company were among the features presented.

One more clinic is being planned for the term, according to Jones, and will be held next Tuesday.

Friday Is Deadline For Turning In Carnival Themes

Students worrying about how to pay next term's fees still have a chance, according to Harry Jackson, Detroit senior and chairman of the 1941 Water Carnival theme contest. A \$50 prize awaits the literary genius who writes the winning theme. The deadline will be reached Friday.

The electron microscope, which is from 20 to 50 times more powerful than the ordinary light microscope, has revealed new facts concerning deadly disease germs and other small particles according to recent scientific experiments made by Zworykin.

One of the foremost discoveries made possible by the new microscope is the fact that diptheria germs absorb chemicals just as large living organisms.

According to Doctor Zworykin, objects which have been studied under the ordinary optical microscope reveal heretofore undiscussed organisms and particles when magnified as high as 100,000 times under the new electron microscope.

Zworykin, the holder of 74 U. S. patents, has received many awards for scientific research, both in this country and Europe. Awarded his first degree in electrical engineering at Petrograd, he has since been awarded a Ph.D. by the University of Pittsburgh and a doctor of science degree by the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute.

In 1934 he received the Morris Lachman memorial prize, and the Overseas premium from the Institution of British Electrical Engineers. Last year he was selected to receive the American Pioneer award.

One of the nation's foremost Jewish institutions, Fordham University, is in its 100th year and has graduated more than 20,000 students.

Official action was taken to table plans for a spring "musical show," originally scheduled for May 2 and 3 in Fairchild theater. With but one dissenting vote, I.S.A. council members supported the idea of postponing the musical program until the 1941-42 school year.

The measure's single opposer, David Blain, Detroit junior, proposed that the Independent's produce "Ten Nights in a Bar Room" instead of the musical show.

Cagers Pick 'Gary Gang' Co-Pilots

Regulars Choose Sofak, Beisser On All-Foes

Two charter members of Michigan State's well-known Gary Gang, Max Hindman and Bob Phillips, reached the climax of their collegiate cage careers Wednesday when teammates named them honorary co-captains of the 1940-41 Spartan basketball team.

Chet Aubuchon, third member of the "gang", was chosen last season as leader of this year's aggregation, but when he was unable to play it was decided to select new captains. If he returns to school Chet will assume the post during next season.

For Hindman and Phillips the selection put the finishing touch to a brilliant court story which has seen them play side by side through six years of high school, Indiana independent, freshman, and college varsity basketball.

MAX LEADS 'IRON MEN'
Max, who scored 144 points in 17 contests this season and played 686 minutes out of a possible 680 to lead State's squad in both departments, has played at center ever since he came up on the Spartan varsity, while "Phil", who counted 90 to finish third in scoring, has seen action at both forward and guard.

Along with selecting captains and engaging in their last wild scrimmage of the year, Michigan State's basketball players also found time to select an all-opponent team Wednesday from cagers they have faced this season.

Placed on their team by an almost unanimous vote by the 10 Spartans were Ed Beisser, tall center of Creighton university's Big Six champion Bluejays, and Mike Sofak, little dynamo of Michigan's hapless Wolverines. Beisser was placed at center and Sofak at forward.

WOMEN'S MIKE REVENUE

Along with these two were placed Jimmy Ruch, high-scoring West Virginian, at forward, with sharp-eyed Angelo Musi of Temple and deadly Ossie Schechtman of Long Island university at guards. Vern Seigel and All-Western conference Dick Fisher of Ohio State, Floyd "Scotty" Hamilton of West Virginia, Bob Smith and Charlie Butler of Notre Dame were given second-team recognition by the Spartans.

Adding financial success to that achieved on the court by State's "miracle men" this year, Assistant Athletic Director L. L. Frimodig said Wednesday that the Spartans played before a total home attendance of 22,079 in 11 games.

This didn't quite reach the record 24,656 compiled in nine home battles last season but brought in a larger revenue, Frimodig pointed out. Had it not been for the four games here during Christmas vacation, this season's total would have easily set a new mark, he believed.

Placing in eight out of ten events, the Sophomores led by Joan Bergman tallied 35 points to capture the first of the W.A.A. interclass swimming meets. The Juniors took second place with 25 1/2 points.

'S' Will Send Small Squad To CCC's

State Lacks Men For Four Events; Leave Friday

Only the pick of this year's indoor Michigan State track team will leave for South Bend, Ind., tomorrow at noon to compete in the Central Collegiate conference championships to be held in the Notre Dame fieldhouse Friday night and Saturday afternoon. This is the first time in 20 years that State has failed to enter a full team in the affair, due mainly to a lack of outstanding performers in several events.

ADDS SOPH, SENIOR
Coach Karl Schladehman completed the team roster for the meet Wednesday after the daily practice. The latest additions to the list were two sophomore quarter-milers, Earl Cady and Sid Riordan, and Kurt Mader, senior 440 man. Riordan's selection was prompted by his strong showing in the 300 yard dash in the M.S.C. Relays, and his showing in time trials in the 440 yesterday.

Two changes made by Schladehman for the CCC's are in the running events. Ralph Monroe, lanky sophomore, will race only in the two mile instead of both the mile and two mile. The second rearrangement affects Dale Kaulitz, the Spartan Express, who is slated to run in the 440 and in the mile relay if he does not reach the finals in the quarter. In the event that Kaulitz does get into the finals, the Spartan mentor will insert Riordan or Mader in his slot on the relay team.

WONT ENTER JUMPS

State will not enter in the half mile, mile, high jump and broad jump. The loss of Captain Stone in the second half, who went out with a sprained ankle, changed the tide of the battle.

In the other game, the sophomores overpowered the seniors with a 22-7 score. Loretta Urban, record holder for the intramural high scoring, led the sophomores with 10 points.

The sophomores, sparked by Urban, Barbara Scarlett and Dorothy Thompson, built up an 18-5 advantage in the first half and then coasted for an easy victory.

So far this season, the Badgers have whipped the West Virginia Mountaineers 6 1/2-1 1/2, by way of four technical knockouts, and have soundly trounced a strong Penn State squad, 5 1/2-2 1/2.

Edward Gunderson, Manistee sophomore, will replace Clyde Marshall, senior regular, in the lineup in the 120 pound weight for the only change in the Spartan lineup. Gunderson will meet Bob Sachtschalle, highly rated Wisconsin flyweight, in the first bout of the evening.

NOVICE IN STAR
One of the Badgers' biggest guns is Phil Foster, a newcomer, who will box in the 175 pound slot. Prater has defeated the veteran Nick Lee, who has an outstanding record as a fighter and who defeated Glenn Menter of State last year. Prater recently scored a technical knockout over Beecher Hinkle, West Virginia captain. Clifford Lutz, another Badger newcomer, has dethroned Warren Jollymore, veteran, in the 145 pound class. Lutz recently in the bout with West Virginia, scored a technical knockout over Crispin Hernandez, who dethroned State's Everett Davidson in their last bout at Jensen fieldhouse.

Another battle that promises plenty of excitement is between William Roth, Badger veteran, and Capt. Joe Cestowski, in the 165-pound division. Cestowski will try to break out of his present slump and return to form that he showed in the early eastern trip. State's undecided and unsettled 145 pound slot will probably be filled by Everett Davidson, who eliminated Maurice Green, New York sophomore, in a bout last night. Previously Bill Ryan, hard-hitting Bessemer junior, had won over Green, but suffered a badly cut lip and will not see action for at least a week.
