## South Atlantic Waters Hide Fate of Liner's 120 Americans

Official Washington was anxiously awaiting word yesterday afternoon of the fate of 120 Americans aboard the steamer Zamzam, mysterious as sunk in the South Atlantic early yesterday while flying the flags of neutral Libya.

Among the 260 passengers of the ill-fated vessel were 24 volunteer American ambulance drivers on their way to serve with the free-French forces in Egypt and a large group of Protestant and Catholic missionaries enroute in ports in various portions of central Africa.

The first report of the disaster came from London with word that the ship had sunk in the Atlantic between Brazil and Capetown, South Africa, but made no comment on the cause of the sinking.

Included among the equipment on board were several ambulances and complete X-ray tools.

Wise voters are going to have to vote this amendment down—provided they don't stagger into the polls with an attitude of "Just one more short one, and then I'm going home."
