Each spring the greenhouse and gardens near the Horticulture building are scenes of rustic student activities. About 200 students take courses in flower arrangement and garden flower culture throughout the spring and summer terms.

During the course, plants are taken care of from seed to blossom. Nearly 200 flowers are taken from the gardens for use in flower arrangements. At present tulips are being used since they are now in full bloom.

# Trackmen Lose Ace Fieldman And Meet At Penn State

## Ewell Leads Lions to 78-44 Victory

Running true to form, Michigan State's thineclads produced a few surprises, scored their 40 point quota, and extended their losing streak in dual meets to two complete years as they succumbed to Penn State, 78 to 44, at College Station, Pa., Saturday.

The meet, which was sandwiched in with the Pennsylvania Interscholastic meet, ended the Spartans' dual season and left but the IC-4A meet at Randall's Island, N. Y., and the Michigan A.A.U. at Ypsilanti this Saturday and the Central Collegiate championships at Milwaukee, Wis., remaining on State's schedule.

### FEW TO GO TO NEW YORK

A few individual performers and perhaps a relay team, will make the journey to New York. Coach Karl A. Schladerman plans to take the remainder of the squad to Ypsilanti.

State's chances at team titles at both the AAU and the Central Collegiate received a severe setback when Bruce Drynan, ace field event man, was seriously injured while pole vaulting. After clearing the crossbar, he hooked his left arm on an unprotected upright iron bar forming part of the support of the pole vault apparatus, which ripped the muscles in his side.

Both Assistant Coach Lauren P. Brown, who remained behind with Drynan, and the injured star will arrive in East Lansing this morning. The injury will keep the big blond out of action for the rest of the season.

State's Mel Buschman skinned over the 120 yard high hurdles in 5.2 seconds for the Spartans' only other clearest victory.

The biggest surprise of the meet was George Doran, Grand Rapids Junior, who came through with his first college victory. Shifted from the short dashes, Doran ran the 440 yard dash for the first time and won with a strong finish in 51.7.

### HARRIS EARNED TIE

Bob Harris, another Grand Rapids boy, figured in the second upheaval of the day, earning a tie in the pole vault with two Penn State vaulters at 43 feet. Ted Wench, sophomore star, failed to place for the first time this year going out at 12 feet 6 inches.

In the dashes, Bob Webster tied well with a second in the 220 and a third in the 100, considering the fact that Barney Ewell, Nittany Lion speedball, won the century in 19.6 and the 220 in 20.8. Ewell also took the broad jump with a 22 feet 11 3/4 inch leap.

Bill Scott, sophomore middle distance man, came through with two stellar performances in the half and mile races. In both events Scott forced Bob Gordon, topnotch Nittany Lion runner, to turn on a hot sprint to win in the final stretch.

John F. Murphy playing in a Carpet Trade tournament in 1916 compiled the highest 18 hole score in the record books, a 298. He was beginning to get good when he ran out of holes; his score on the eighteenth being an even 10.

Coach Ray Fisher's baseballers have gone a long way since State and pitcher Frank Mekules lost the first 1941 game by a narrow 3-2 margin almost a month ago. At present, the Ann Arbor squad is riding on the crest of the Big Ten diamond wave and has only to win another game to clinch the Western Conference title.

However, in defeating Western State Friday, the Spartans have been able to reach heights that even the Big Ten could not scale and, therefore will be given an even chance to reverse the April 29 result.

A slight fear hung over the Spartan camp today, because it was feared that the State nine might suffer a relapse in form after compiling a record of four straight victories including the much cherished one over Western State.

The Kobsmen had been pointing for the Broncos for several months and, with that game now out of the way, Coach John Kobs is working hard to keep his charges keyed up to their winning ways for Michigan.
