LATE FLASHES FROM WJIM'S NEWS ROOM

Under the Wire

London, Dec. 6—England declared war on Finland, Rumania, and Italy tonight, but diplomatic circles here believe that the declaration will not have any immediate military significance. The three powers had ignored a British ultimatum that they withdraw from the pro-German conflict. Canada and other British dominions are expected to follow the English lead.

MOSCOW, Dec. 6—Attacking on three fronts, Soviet armies struck blows against the German forces on the eastern front tonight. Soviet command reports the capture of 200 more villages, west of Leningrad; a break-through in the German lines 125 miles east of Leningrad; and a renewed Russian offensive which is threatening to capture Kharkov.

AN DIEGO, Dec. 5—A bad-thinking Navy test pilot saved the U.S.'s largest bomber from complete destruction today. One of the plane's giant motors broke loose from its moorings and ripped through the top of the ship, but the pilot slowed the other motors and taxied the bay, saving the plane from further damage. knowledge. The English poet pointed to the modern world as proof something must be wrong.

Mocking modern pseudo-intellectual creeds, Noyes urged the necessity of recapturing the point of view which asserts the Supreme Reality, not war, is behind the scheme of things. To prove this he quoted the poet Wordsworth the philosopher Plato and Herbert Spencer, a 19th century agnostic.

Noyes did not blame youth, but rather the middle-aged, near-elderly people, for helping to deprive the world of its basic conception, adding "there is one vision that grows not old."

Selecting several original poems, among them Noyes read "The New Duckling," "Mountain Laurel," and "The Highwayman."

The fourth college lecture series number this fall, this was Noyes' third appearance at State. The other two were in 1937 and 1924.

Coeds Must Have Parental Approval For Riding Class

The voluntary class in horse-ship offered to coeds during winter and spring terms requires all candidates to have the written consent of their parents before enrollment will be accepted, military department officials said yesterday.
