The Board of Publications has authorized the position, but will decide at the end of the year whether it will be continued as permanent.

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knowledge. The English poet pointed to the modern world as proof something must be wrong.

Mocking modern pseudo-intellectual errors, Noyes urged the necessity of recapturing the point of view which asserts the Supreme Reality, not war, is behind the scheme of things. To prove this he quoted the poet Wordsworth, the philosopher Plato and Herbert Spencer, a 19th century agnostic.

Noyes did not blame youth, but rather the middle-aged, near-elderly people for helping to deprive the world of its basic conception, adding "there is one vision that grows not old."

Selecting several original poems, among them Noyes read "The New Duckling," "Mountain Laurel" and "The Highwayman."

The fourth college lecture series number this fall, this was Noyes' third appearance at State. The other two were in 1917 and 1924.

Ag Board Requests Additional Lights On Grand River

A State Board of Agriculture request for more street lights along Grand River was referred to a committee for special study this week by the East Lansing City Council. The Board of Agriculture made the request in the interests of reducing traffic accidents, it was explained.

Council members pointed out that though more lights have been installed and black and yellow lines painted on the pavement, final responsibility lies with the student. "Students cross at any point in the street, increasing their chances of being hit, and have no regard for the line and walks," one member asserted.

The council also suggested that the college Student Council inaugurate a program to educate students in crossing the street at the correct places.

Coeds Must Have Parental Approval For Riding Class
