#### Yanks Send Bombers to Rotterdam, Hamm

LONDON, March 4 (AP)-American Flying Fortresses struck two powerful new preinvasion blows in daylight today, heavily bombing Hamm, key of a vast German rail network over which Hitler would have to move troops to meet Allied armies in western Europe, and Rotterdam, which might become a landing point for ar-mies striking the continent.

Five Fortresses were lost in the raid but they destroyed at least 14 of a strong German

fighter force.

In daylight late today RAF Mosquito bombers attacked railway centers near Le Mans and Valenciennes in northern France. One plane failed to return.


