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## Spartans at War

**P**ACKING his bags and shaking hands furiously last night was freshman class President Pete Navarre who is abdicating his office to become a Spartan at war. Navarre applied last Monday for immediate induction, and approval from his draft board was wired back the next day.

When we mentioned that an alumni club might be started at New London, Conn., the other day, we got to thinking about it, and discovered that there were a few places where State students were gathered in large numbers.

Fort Riley, Kans., has a flourishing alumni group, as has Fort Sill, Okla., cavalry and field artillery bases respectively. But the arrival of a hundred-odd Spartans at Miami Beach to take air force training makes that one of the largest groups of Staters to be together in the service.

**Spartan Harold L. Oskamp**, from Canandaigua, N. Y., is at Colgate university, where he is taking flight training prior to being commissioned as an ensign and going on active duty with the fleet.

Another prospective flier, Aviation Cadet **George S. Collins**, Negaunee, is taking his basic flight course at Perrin field, Texas.

**Lieut. Walt Dolbee, Jr.**, East Lansing, was recently promoted to first lieutenant at Truxa field, Wis. Dolbee was commissioned in the AAF in May, 1942.

**Lieut. John G. Hemans**, '40, was recently awarded the silver star for gallantry in the Solomon islands, it has been announced by the war department. Hemans trained at Boston, Mass., and Mitchell field, N. Y.

**Tech. Sgt. Joe Kaman**, former varsity football player here, is a furlough visitor, while Ensign **Art Curtis** came to Michigan State on a leave last week.

Professor King was appointed chairman of the student-faculty social committee, after the resignation of Dean L. C. Emmons, who had served in that capacity for over 15 years.

**WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)**—Pork will come under specific price ceilings April 1 in retail stores all over the United States, OPA announced tonight, and similar top prices will be set soon for beef, veal, lamb and mutton.

The Office of Price Administration said the new ceilings will curb black markets, distribute available supplies more equitably and assure housewives that they are not being overcharged.

Y. and president of the national Michigan State Alumni association, wrote in recently to inform us that Michigan State has two generals in the U. S. army. They are Brig. Gen. Donald A. Stroh, Ag. '15, now stationed at Fort Bragg, N. C., and Brig. Gen. Ernest H. Burt, Ag. '14, now located in the Judge Advocate General's department at Washington.

Bibbins writes: "They were active in Cadet Corps and campus activities, and exceptionally good students. Ernie Burt was a member of the 1914 basketball team and also was president of the senior class. Both Don and Ernie served in the last war, and have been in the army ever since."

Bibbins, who was a member of the class of 1915 himself, is one of Michigan State's strongest alumni supporters. If you don't believe it, then why does every eighth or ninth student at Michigan State come from Buffalo, N. Y.

**Leland Stowe**, the noted author and foreign correspondent who will be on the lecture series here next Tuesday night, has a new name for American women. In a recent Detroit appearance he called them "clothes racks," and told them that they had fallen down on the job of helping this country to fight the war.

"England has had a women's land army for three years, and women are driving the taxis there," he asserted.

"If I thought American women couldn't be capable of doing the same thing, I'd be eternally ashamed. You're going to be driving taxis and milking cows, and when you do I hope you don't all ask if you are going to get a dollar an hour and overtime when you get the job."

Stowe further concluded that we do not have a lack of manpower, but a lack of will power.

No doubt, Stowe will have something to say about the American college woman when he speaks here. We'll be looking forward to it.

## Asks \$15 per Month Bonus for Soldiers

**LANSING, March 4 (AP)**—Rep. George N. Higgins, Fern-dale Republican, introduced a bill today to pay a soldiers bonus to men in the armed forces at close of the war, and companion measures to finance it through a tax on cigarettes and alcoholic beverages.

Returning honorably discharged veterans would receive an amount equal to \$15 a month for each month of service, and heirs of those who die in service would receive a bonus equal to that for service for the duration.

Briggs, "The Fan Who Bought the Ball Park," we were particularly amused by the part Louis "Bobo" Buck Newsom played in helping to win the Detroit Tigers an American League pennant. Bobo was always a favorite of Tiger fans although he was probably the cockiest ball player that ever hit the Motor City.

Newsom, who is a giant of a man with a powerful right arm, could beat about any team you

could assemble, when he felt like pitching. But it took quite a bit to get Buckskin to bear down and pitch his best. Joe Cronin was one of these bits.

Old Chisel (Cronin) as Bobo dubbed Cronin, caused large Louis no end of trouble. The two almost came to blows when Newsom, in the midst of one of his best years in the majors and chosen for the American League all-star team managed by Cronin, wasn't given the starting assignment in the all-star contest.

When Newsom was sent to the Brooklyn Dodgers, noted for their daily antics, last summer in the midst of their drive for the pennant, baseball fandom knew that Louis had landed in the right spot after playing on several different clubs.

We learned first hand just exactly how Buck acted when he arrived in the Bronx from Bob Valliere, sophomore Applied Science student here at State. Valliere, a resident of Brooklyn all his life and first cousin of Manager Leo Durocher, was batboy for the Bums the latter part of the 1942 season.

"Bobo arrived one afternoon when most of the fellows were in the clubhouse before a game," Valliere told us. "He burst in, looked around and when he knew that everyone was watching him he shouted across the room to Durocher: 'Here's your pennant insurance, Leo!'"

The Brooklyn bat boy continued to tell us how Newsom got into his monkey suit and asked for someone to warm him up. "Freddie Fitzsimmons, that's our refund coach. Had he would, but Old Buck just laughed and said, 'A fat guy like you warm me up?'" Buck went on to tell Fitz he was going to try and catch his fast ones he'd better put a pad on his glove," Valliere continued.

The pitching practice finally got underway with Fitzsimmons protesting the extra large pad Newsom injected into Fred's mitt, but wearing it, and Bobo throwing only lob tosses to the disgruntled Fitzsimmons.

## Big Ten Ready to Save Mileage

CHICAGO, March 4 (AP)—Football coaches and athletic directors of the Western conference will meet Friday to rearrange gridiron schedules for 1943 in the interest of saving rail mileage and to make room for games with service teams.

Revision is necessary because the schedules already had been drawn through 1944, limiting each team to nine games with a minimum of six within the Big Ten.

In revising the schedules, games with non-conference opponents requiring long travel probably will be dropped. Griffith said. Three constitutional changes were carried by a large majority. They are: the radio permit rule which was on probation this year; a ruling which allows men callers after 12 noon Sundays; and an extension of dating permission on terrace or dormitory steps which amends the old 4 p. m. limit.

## Senate Bill Approves \$3,500,000 Grant to Michigan State

LANSING, March 4 (AP)—The senate today passed and sent to the house five of the six appropriation measures in its possession. The bills, totaling upwards of \$30,000,000, included measures substantially increasing the grants for the University of Michigan and Michigan State college, but not removing entirely the "ceiling" on the millage formulas which fix their appropriations.

The senate gave the University of Michigan \$5,600,000, compared with \$4,800,000 this year, and Michigan State college was granted \$3,500,000, compared with \$2,950,000 this year.

Although the money is needed for war purposes, the house is not expected to be as lenient in boosting the educational institution grants.

## Patterson La Bismarck Victor

ALLIED HDQ. IN AUSTRALIA, Friday, March 5 (AP)—Aerial "mop up" squadrons now completely finished off 22-ship Japanese convoy was smashed in the Bismarck Sea, and have killed 27 more Japanese planes of the sky, the Allied high command announced tonight.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4.—The smashing victory of Douglas MacArthur's big army in wiping out an enemy made in the Bismarck Sea completely disrupted Japanese plans for the coming campaign in the South Pacific. Secretary of War Patterson announced today.

Tokyo's purpose in the ill-fated convoy of 12 ports and 10 warships from Rabaul to New Guinea was viewed here as a rather than offensive. Patterson's reference to the campaigns in the South Pacific therefore, was taken to Allied offensives which now will be unable to stop.

A navy communiqué reported that Liberators bombers struck at four held areas in the northwest Solomon Islands—West (East Longitude line) east the Bismarck sea attack under way. Bombs were dropped at Kahili, Bani, Ballale and every American plane turned.

At the same time B-24 dive bombers with Wildcat escort raided Buna on New Guinea Island for the 32nd starting a fire there, and planes likewise all returned was assumed that the Liberators and dive bombers spent out of Guadalcanal.
