





(Continued from Page 1) maining in Governor Kelly's official family, naming in his place a Republican highway commissioner who will round out Michigan's first all-Republican state administrative board since 1932

The post, long a keystone in the Democratic state organization, went to Charles M. Ziegler, former deputy to Grover C. Dillman, who lost the commissionership to Murray D. Van Wagoner ten years ago in the spring election that followed the Roosevelt landslide. Ziegler making his second campaign for the office, won all but a handful of counties from Lloyd B. Reid,

the incumbent by appointment. Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of public in-struction since 1935, paced the Republican ticket in his successful quest for a fourth term. Unofficial returns gave him an advantage of more than 80,000 votes over Edward W. McFarland, Wayne university professor and former Democratic chairman of the state liquor control commission.

Unofficial returns indicated the election of R. Spencer Bish-on Flint, and Ralph A. Hay-ward, Kalamazoo, to the University of Michigan Board Democratic Regents over their rivals, Dr. Ira D. McCoy of Bad Axe and Charles P. Nugent of Wayne University law school.


