ALLIED HDQ. IN NORTH AFRICA, April 13 (AP)-The Axis Tunisian bridgehead was shrinking rapidly 'today under. pressure of general Ailied advances at the south and northwestern sides of the envelopment box being drawn up before Tunis and Bizerte, and nowhere along the front had the enemy shown any disposition to attempt a decisive stand.
