IFC Smoker, Women's Mixers Unchanged by New Orders

William D. Anthony, medical officer of the unit. The IFC smoker and women's "at home" events will still be held as scheduled tomorrow, however.

The reason the lieutenant gave was that he did not want those men who are not physically up to par to come in contact with other students, according to Betty Corbushley, secretary to the dean of women.

However, the men were not placed under quarantine or their weekend leave curtailed in any way. The variety show, later Fraternity smoker or "at home" period definitely have not been called off, stated Miss Corbushley. The smoker, for all aircrewmembers and campus fraternity men, will be held in the Union ballroom from 2 to 4 p. m.

Spartan Thinclads to Engage Purdue Here This Afternoon

Meet Is Scheduled for 2 p. m. on MSC Track Oval

When the Spartans open their track season this afternoon at 2 with Purdue on the MSC track oval, they will be participating in a strictly war-time meet. Both teams are composed mainly of untried and green men with an abundance of freshmen, making the ultimate outcome unpredictable.

To top things off, Coach Herman Phillips is still in doubt as to whether or not he can get his ROTC men released from the college grounds for the trip to State. The Boilermakers' big gun in the distance events is Charles Duesler who competes in the one and two mile runs.

Purdue May Surprise

However, Purdue's surprise may come with freshman high jumpers Blum and Susca who each have cleared the bar at 6 feet 3 1/2 inches so far this year. Returning from last year is Joe Bancker who will give State's Dale Kaulitz plenty of stiff competition in the 440-yard dash.

Exam for Marine, Navy Reservists Slated Today

The qualifying exam for navy V-1 and marine corps reserve class 3(d) will be given Tuesday, at 9 a. m. and 2 p. m. in the Music auditorium. Examination Director Paul Dressel announced yesterday.

Both sessions are required of all men in navy V-1 program who will have completed six terms of college work by July 1, 1943 and all freshman and sophomore men in the marine program. Any pre-medical or pre-dental student may be excused for examination upon application to examiner but Dressel pointed out that they are advised to take it so if they are not qualified to continue their pre-medical or pre-dental course they will know in time to obtain another classification.

All men in these reserves will be excused from regular classes for the testing period, Dressel said.

There is a possibility that some students who satisfy the above qualifications are not on the official list and so did not receive a letter of notification, Dressel pointed out. These students should check their status with Dressel at the orientation office before the test is given.

Senators Demand Planes for China, Safety on Coast

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16 (AP)—Warnings that China cannot last another year without more airpower and that the Japanese in the Aleutians are a growing menace to the American west coast were heard in the senate today, but Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) replied that the war cannot be won by strategy developed in the halls of congress.

Senator Chandler (D-Ky.) demanded that 500 fighting planes be rushed to China lest she collapse within a year and declared that Gen. Douglas MacArthur also needs planes badly in Australia. As for the Aleutians, he said that despite continued American bombing raids "we have definite information" the Japanese are building adequate airfields on Kiska and Attu islands from which "the Alaskan mainland and our Pacific coast ports can be bombed and our shipping further restricted."

UNDER THE WIRE

LONDON, April 16 (AP)—American heavy bombers hammered Axis U-boat bases and harbor installations at Lorient and Brest on the Brittany coast today in a daylight assault which climaxed a continuous 24-hour Allied bombardment of strategic targets in Nazi Europe.

ALLIED HDQ. IN AUSTRALIA, April 17 (AP)—The Japanese convoy of nine ships which attempted to land at Wewak, New Guinea, has fled beyond Allied bomber range after two of the merchantmen were sunk, the high command announced today.

Farmers' War Course Will Open Tuesday

The third of a series of 12 week courses for rural war-production workers will open Tuesday, Walter H. Sheldon of the department of agricultural engineering, announced recently.

The course familiarizes farmers with the construction and repair of vital farm machinery. In laboratory classes farmers receive practice in welding, machinery adjustments, maintenance and sharpening of mower machinery and salvaging disused equipment.

News in Brief

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16 (AP)—Secretary Cordell Hull, denying hotly that reciprocal trade pacts contribute to war, said today he would label the charge 100 per cent piffle if anybody but a congressman had made it.

Hull told a house committee Monday that Representative Gearhart (R-Calif.) was "headed straight down the gulch of extreme nationalism" with his contention that other nations had taken undue advantage of the treaty program.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16 (AP)—The house deadlock blocking pay-as-you-go tax legislation began to break up today as Republicans supporting the modified Ruml skip-a-tax-year plan and opposing Democrats met on friendly terms and agreed to seek a compromise.

Leaders of both parties expressed hope that some pay-as-you-go measure applying to 44,000,000 American income taxpayers could be passed in the house next Wednesday.

Although no details had been agreed upon, Capitol Hill observers expected any compromise would abate a substantial portion, but not all, of one year's income taxes and embrace a 20 per cent withholding levy against the taxable portions of wages and salaries, effective July 1.

ALLIED HDQ. IN NORTH AFRICA, April 16 (AP)—Infantry units of Lt.-Gen. K. A. N. Anderson's British first army, holding the 10 strategic hills they captured in the Medjez-el-Bab sector in less than a week, hurled back savage German counter-attacks today and improved their positions on those heights overlooking Tunis and Bizerte.

Supported by artillery, the infantry has pushed steadily eastward in the area north of Medjez-el-Bab and now holds Djebel Ang, a 2,000-foot peak from which both the capital and the naval base to the north can be seen on clear days.

Meanwhile, Admiral of the British fleet Sir Andrew B. Cunningham announced the destruction of two Italian destroyers by the Royal navy off Sicily last night and indicated that the British Mediterranean gap was ready for any attempt by the Axis to evacuate troops by sea.

Knox Reveals Navy Now Has Seven Fleets

Location of Forces Not Told; Commodore Ranks Filled

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—Seven United States fleets are in operation against the enemy, Secretary Navy Frank Knox disclosed today.

He did not reveal the location of the seven fleets. However, seven separate naval commands, the north and south Atlantic; Pacific; south, southwest and southeast Pacific, and European, have been mentioned in previous navy statements.

Knox told of the seven fleets in announcing assignments of four captains to new duties under recent promotions to the temporary rank of commodore.

Asked whether it should be understood that one fleet was in each ocean of the seven seas, he replied negatively and declined to go into details.

He gave these assignments for the new commodores:

R. G. Coman, of Santa Rosa, Calif., command of the service force for the seventh fleet in the Southwest Pacific force; Oscar Smith, of Eustice, Fla., task force No. 1; L. P. Johnson, of Concord, N. C., rear echelon amphibian force, Atlantic; L. F. Reinhardt, transports amphibian force, third fleet, Southern Pacific.

Getz Slated to Pitch Against Michigan in State Opener

Game in Ann Arbor Is Redhead's First Tiff Against Wolverines; Skrocki Pitched Both Tilts Last Year

"Pinky" Getz will take the mound for the Spartans today when they meet the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor in the first game of the 1943 baseball season.

This will be Getz's first contact with the Wolverine team since Joe Skrocki hurled* both games against them last year. Blond Joe won one and lost one last year, although on both occasions his pitching warranted victories.

Skrocki lost the first game last year when his teammates let two unearned runs slip across the plate on errors. Joe gave the Wolverines only five hits, with the Spartans taking nine, but State went down 2 to 1.

Later in the season, with the help of the singing, razzing DZV brotherhood, who howled at every Wolverine pitcher to step onto the mound, Skrocki won a lopsided contest 12 to 1. Throughout the game Joe's DZV brothers kept chanting "Buckle down, Joe Skrocki," much to the Spartan pitchers' delight and Michigan's dislike.

Getz, along with Dick Bernitt, is the top-ranking pitcher returning for duty this year. Getz made his best showing last year while on the southern trip, winning two games. He is a lanky right hander, receiving his prep training in Buffalo along with today's third baseman, Art Maischoss.

Coach John Kobs has not made a definite choice between Mickey Faulman and Bob Proulx for the left field post. Faulman is a senior seeing his first service with the varsity this year, while Proulx is rated one of the best freshmen on the squad. Either lad may get the nod to start.

The probable batting order for today's game will be Frank Pelier, left field, leading off, followed by Howie Ladue, first base, and Ed Ciolek, right field. The cleanup man on the Spartan team will be Capt. Roy Chlopan, second baseman.

Batting fifth will be either Proulx or Faudman, followed by Bob Andreoli, the shortstop. Catcher Bill Reavely is in the eighth position, with Getz completing the circuit.

Michigan has several returning men this year, including more experienced pitchers than the Spartans. But the Kobsmen who remain in the lineup have proved in the past that they can hit the ball. With offensive hitting power behind him, Getz may take the Wolverines and start the season off with a win.

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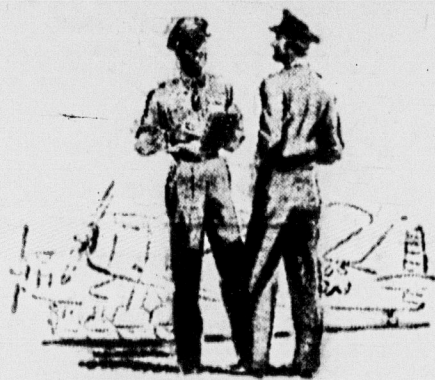
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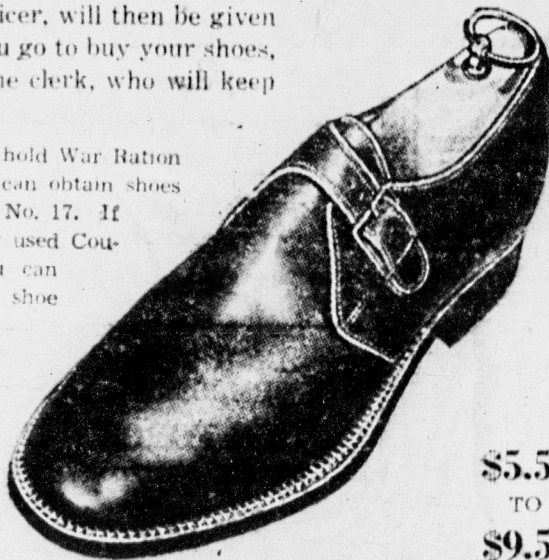

Engineering Schedule Includes Fourth Term

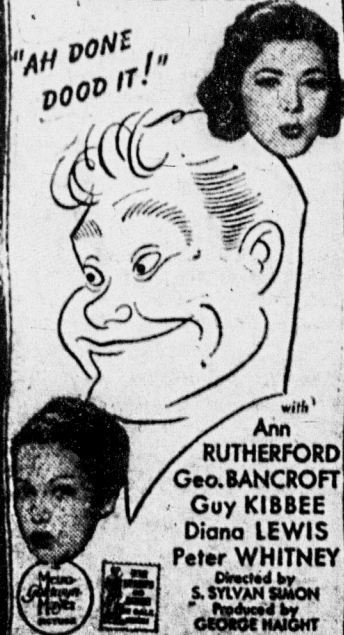
"Because of the accelerated curriculum at MSC, engineering students are urged to remain for the summer quarter," stated Dean H. B. Dirks, of the engineering division.
