Axis Requests Two Leaders Meeting for Parley Peace Terms of French

Demand for Negotiation Follows Surrender at Cap Bon Trap

ALLIED HDQ. IN NORTH AFRICA, May 11 (AP)—The German troops cut off on the Tunisian mainland by a British breakthrough across the base of Cap Bon peninsula surrendered unconditionally to the French tonight and agreed to the immediate transfer of all their material.

Pocketed in the Zaghouan mountains, the Germans asked the French command for an armistice in the first such request to be made by the Germans to the French since the last war.

Just as the Americans had done in the north, the French followed the Casablanca formula by demanding immediate unconditional surrender and the immediate delivery of all material, and the Germans accepted.

There was no indication of the number of surrendering forces, who were isolated when the French 19th corps drove through to the coast to cut them off from their comrades, facing the British eighth army to the south after the British first army had stabbed across the base of Cap Bon.

Allied armies carried out another tremendous raid today on the Mediterranean island, stepping stones necessary for a continental invasion. Nearly 200 bombers escorted by more than 100 fighter planes, smashed at Marsala, Sicily's closest port to Cap Bon.

Freshman Week to Be Shortened

Freshman orientation for next fall term will be shortened by a day and a half, beginning at Tuesday noon instead of Monday morning, according to S. E. Crowe, chairman of Freshman week committee.

This new plan will serve to accommodate working students by allowing them extra time and will be accomplished by cutting down on number and length of convocations.

Last year the freshmen registered with returning students alphabetically instead of according to sectional groups, Crowe said. This alphabetizing will be extended to other activities of Freshman week instead of organizing them according to sub-divisional groups, he added.

Faculty Warns Against Misuse of Identification Credentials

Final Plans Complete for Organization of Coed Date Bureau

Completing its organization of all societies, the official date bureau organized to enable the pre-cadets to meet State women, announced its final plans for operation yesterday, according to chairman Betty Baker, Detroit sophomore.

Representatives from women's dormitories, groups, off-campus houses, sororities, and town girls have formed a council and will meet with representatives from the 10 arrow squad to plan social events for weekend.

Specification sheets have been filled out by each woman interested in dating pre-cadets, giving her name, height and interests. These are now on file at Mason and Abbot for the use of an arrow.

Group Passes Legislation

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—The house military committee approved today legislation prohibiting strikes in government-operated industries, strengthening the authority of the War Labor board to enforce its orders, and requiring labor organizations to file financial reports.

Under no conditions should a student loan or give up his college identification card, whether to faculty, student or official will be the rule governing use of cards as passed by the administrative group, Registrar R. S. Linton announced yesterday.

He indicated that the situation, growing increasingly worse, had arisen from the practice at college functions, in which concerts and lectures, as well as sports activities, of requiring students to give up identification cards in lieu of activity books.

The matter was first brought to the attention of administrative officials by the large increase of duplicate identification cards issued recently, Linton stated.

Students had been required to present their identification cards when they applied for use of athletic equipment from the gymnasiums and many also gave their cards at games, lectures and concerts when they did not have their activity book to present.

The practice grew up of allowing such students to enter and then allowing them to redeem their cards upon presentation of the coupon at the accounting office.

Of course if students are caught passing their cards around for use by other persons they will be subject to disciplinary measures, he added.

Probable Plans for Invasion Feature Talk

Stalin May Join Parleys with Allied Leaders in Washington

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill arrived here tonight against a background of an Allied victory in Tunisia and German offers over invasion for more war talks with President Roosevelt.

His swift trip to the United States after the sudden collapse of Axis arms in Tunisia led to conjecture that he had come for a final checking over of plans for hammering open another front on the European continent and perhaps to project Allied strategy even beyond that point.

Speculation Spreads

Ever since the final rout of the Axis forces in North Africa began, speculation has been widespread about the next Allied step. Possible invasion points have been mentioned all the way from Norway down through Holland, Belgium, France, Italy and around the Mediterranean to Greece.

Several times the American president has promised that there will be an invasion of Italy.

Roosevelt Sends Letter

The current Anglo-American conference gave added significance to the secret letter which President Roosevelt entrusted to Joseph E. Davies to deliver to Joseph Stalin in Moscow.

The contents of the message have not been revealed and there was no definite indication that the Russian premier might join the talks here, or even that he had been invited to do so.

Officer to Select Navy Candidates

Lt. (jg) C. W. Mulenberg of the Detroit branch of Naval Officer Procurement, will be in the Union today, to interview prospective naval officers, who are familiar with the habits, language and customs of the people of the Far East.

Civilian candidates to become officers in the Navy under this special program should have previous training in anthropology, sociology, or Oriental languages. Those who have traveled extensively or who have lived in foreign areas may also be eligible, Lt. Mulenberg explained.

Experience in public administration, business, administration, legal sanitation, agriculture, statistical fields or engineering is also desirable, he added.

Lt. Mulenberg is a graduate of Hope college and was formerly connected with the Manila, P. I., office of the International Harvester company.

Tunisian Defeat Adds to German Worries

LONDON, May 11 (AP)—While the impact of the Axis North African defeat was reflected in reports of soaring revolt in Europe and mounting Axis woes, the Nazi-controlled Danish radio predicted today "this battle for Germany is about to begin."

It said that behind his fortifications, Hitler has from 14,000,000 to 15,000,000 soldiers set to meet an Allied invasion of his European fortress.

"Germany has switched to the strategic defensive, which does not exclude offensive action," the broadcast asserted. "This battle for Germany is about to begin; the situation is unique in the history of war."

Reds Continue Heavy Bombing Attacks on Nazi Supply System

LONDON, Wednesday, May 12 (AP).—The Red army captured a German fortified key position in the violent battle of Novorossisk Tuesday and pounded the Nazi foe in the caucuses with infantry, artillery and aerial power on a day marked by a continuation of heavy air battles and vigorous activity along the entire front.

In an additional announcement, Moscow said that Red armies carried out heavy raids on Monday on half a dozen key rail centers behind the German lines, including Kiev, Bryansk and Orel.

The pulverizing pattern of bombing Germany's whole eastern front supply system was carried into the third successive day Monday by a persistent Red air force onslaught which has begun to suggest that the Red army is preparing for its first summer offensive.

BY THE time people get to be seniors they ought to have enough sense not to whine over trivialities. In times when young men elsewhere are getting their arms and heads shot off it is of no moment when someone on the MSU campus stubs his toe.

Yet a handful of small time saboteurs has been carrying on a whispering campaign in an effort to break down the tradition that only senior women shall attend the annual senior dances, first of which is listed for tonight. If we go with a girl who isn't a senior, why shouldn't we bring her to the dance, they whisper.

It has been drummed into their heads that the whole reason for holding senior dances is to promote acquaintance among the graduating class, and the graduating class alone, but nevertheless they persist doggedly in their behind the back attrition.

The senior dances are the one social function of the college reserved for acquainting a more or less select group, senior men can escort and meet women in other classes to any other college dance. 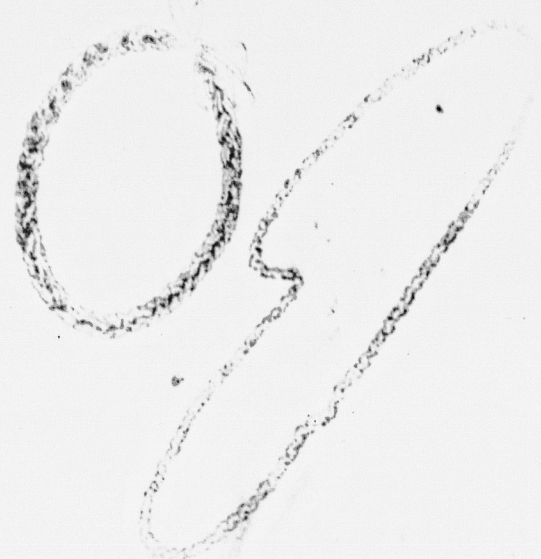

Richard W. Mangrum, tackle and co-captain of the 1942 Spartan football team, has been awarded the Spartan athletic council medal, given annually to the athlete who excels in scholarship. Athletic Director Ralph H. Young announced yesterday.

During his four years as an Engineering student and star athlete here, Mangrum has maintained close to an all "A" average. His all-college average at the present time is 74.4, which is no mean mark, athletic or no athletic.

Three Years on Varsity

For three years Dick has been a mainstay on the gridiron to earn his letter and for the past two seasons he has rated as one of the top linemen on Charley Bachman's team.

In his sophomore year, Mangrum had the bad habit of charging blindly across the line of scrimmage, due to an excessive eagerness to get into the play as quickly as possible. His anxiety led him into many a "mouse-trap" play until he was dubbed by the other squadmen for his inability to stay out of the trap.

When the season of 1941 rolled around, however, Dick shed himself of the charging weakness and took over the tackle position as a steady job.

Also ROTC Cadet Colonel

As one of the truly big men around the campus, he has won this name here as the college ROTC cadet colonel, the top rank given in the military department here.

Mangrum, a graduate of Dunbar high school, started each of the Spartans' nine football games this year and was second high on the team for the most time played throughout the season. Along with Walt Pawlewski, he was chosen co-captain at the season's end.

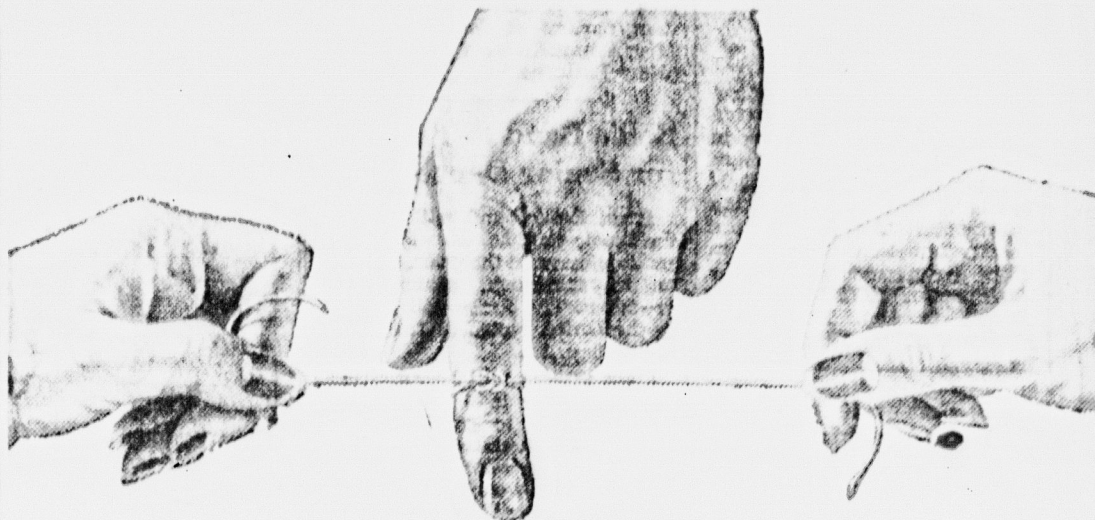

Rumor Clinic to Open Tomorrow: CDC Plans June Defense Rally

The rumor clinic, which up to now has been purely in the embryonic stage, will swing into action tomorrow at 3 p. m. A table will be placed in the main lounge of the Union to handle all rumor business.

This clinic will track down rumors, malicious or otherwise, and either have them verified or disqualified.

An executive board made up of Pres. John Hannah, Prof. Tom King, CDC adviser, Len Barnes, managing editor of State News, Col. Dorsey Rodney, and others who are in a position to determine whether rumors have any basis, will help according to the plan.

Later a telephone will be installed at the table and SWAVes will be present during the day to handle incoming calls. Lansing and East Lansing townspeople and college students are entitled to report any rumors they have heard. People calling or handing in rumors must give their own names where they heard the rumor and when and how.

Then the proper people will be contacted. All rumors and answers will be posted on a bulletin board behind the table.

Another plan on the CDC book is a defense rally to be held in place of the annual political rally each spring.

Scheduled on the tentative program are short speeches by students and faculty and a street dance open to civilians and aircrewmembers. Dean Elisabeth Conrad has given the go-ahead signal for this rally, although military officials have not yet been contacted.

Quarters to Remain Same for ROTC

Contrary to prevalent rumors, the coast artillery seniors for ROTC men now living in the Sigma Alpha Epsilon house will not be moved to the Delta Sigma Phi house with the quartermasters nor will there be any immediate changes in living arrangements for any other senior ROTC men, according to Col. Edmund H. Stillman, acting adjutant.
