know a man who found that out and then refused to trust anyone afterward. He will eventually be hurt more than the man who trusts everyone and is occasionally double-crossed. For he will never have any true friends unless he changes his attitude.

Ideals and friends are pretty important things to have in spite of those who sneer and say they are just for tools. It is partly by ideals that we uphold the moral life. Ideals govern our conduct in business and relations with others. If we have good ideals we will have friends. And friends are the basis of all happiness.





Congressmen Make Football Appeal to Army Heads

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—

A leader of congress' "Friends of football" Representatives Wm. C. Price today asked Brig. Gen. Malford G. Whitehead, assistant chief of staff to advise present regulations and permit participation in inter-collegiate athletic competitions by soldiers attending colleges.

Weiss requested in the interest of some American way of life to change shortly after Weiss and his two congressional colleagues, Representatives Dixie D. Walker and Monroe C. Dill, had called for making some official changes toward a more liberal attitude toward the game during war time.

"Why not adopt the English system?" Weiss asked in a letter to Weiss. England has a well known program where participants are only personnel attending the universities to participate in sports if they wish."

"Throughout England," reports Weiss, "have been carried on during the war, attracting from 200,000 to 300,000 spectators. The increase is due to the strenuous, steady and hardy morale of the people."

The army apparently decided on certain reasons why it said it may not be feasible for soldiers in college training to compete in athletics. Principal reasons were lack of time, transportation difficulties and the attitude of the public, some persons that participation might come under the heading of special privileges.

NEW YORK, May 26 (AP)—Baseball fans have had two whole days to ponder what in thunder goes on in the majors this year. The schedule makers must have had a much as to what might happen when they left those two consecutive open dates. The teams don't need much rest, just the fans.

Anyone would have been considered slightly teetered in the mad had he said a year ago that late in May, 1943, the Pats and Braves would be bidding for third place in the National league that the Pines would draw 34,146 fans to a double header of Shibe park that Cleveland would be leaving the American league with Washington in third place only a breath behind the Yankees, and that the Chicago Cubs and Boston Red Sox would be locked in the cellar of their respective loops.

Even the usually outstanding Red pitching has been faltering lately and when the team does as well pitched game is over anyway. It's on a diet when it comes to the plate and Bill McKechnie will have to start putting a log of meat on third base to get the boys around. They're eight games out now, which shows how fast they gather.

Cedar Passes Flood Stage


