islands, the sailor down in Panama, the soldier trudging long miles over Iceland wastes, the foxhole inhabitant of Africa, and the WAAC, conscientiously doing her duties in North Carolina are all marching in this Memorial day parade toward victory.

Marching right along beside them are millions of war workers, housewives giving hours to Red Cross work.

William Sockman, 42, who died of sickness contracted in an eastern army camp, and Buck Christwhite, 42, who gave his life while in a plane training for military flying are just as much to be honored as Remko Steensma, 42, MSC's first war casualty on foreign soil.

Likewise the man who was killed by some falling machinery in a plane factory in Seattle last week gave as much for his country as the naval ensign torpedoed in Japanese waters.

The plaque which hangs in the lounge of the Union

building and bears the inscription "In memory of the men of MSC who gave their lives in armed service of our country" now has a list of 24 names. This list is going to grow many times larger before the conflict is over; every effort should be directed toward keeping it as short as possible.

It is fitting that on Memorial day, 1943, all America should dedicate itself to a renewed effort toward winning the war, and toward unity of capital and labor.

In this spirit and in this spirit only will the list of those honored dead on future Memorial days be kept to a minimum that the honored living may be preserved.

And only in this way will the Memorial parade line shrink from the distance around the world to a few blocks on Lansing's Washington avenue.

### Russia Withholds Report on Kuban Battle Progress

LONDON, May 29 (AP)—Thousands of Russian troops, fighting hand-to-hand, beat off a massive attack against the main German Kuban lines in the swampy Caucasus yesterday, Berlin announced early today, while Moscow kept silent on the outcome of the struggle to oust the invaders from the narrow isthmus opposite the Crimea.

A Transocean agency broadcast recorded by the Associated Press said the Russians, estimated to number 150,000, were backed by scores of tanks and planes in the swaying struggle, but thus far had failed to make any important breaches in the lines.

A midnight Russian communiqué to the second day announced merely that "fighting continues," although Moscow had reported earlier that 64 German planes were downed in one day over the area at a cost of 13 Soviet aircraft.

### Risien to Talk for Airmen's Convo Today

Aircrew Band Will Play; Assembly Stated for College Auditorium

All aircrewmen of the 310th college training detachment at Michigan State will attend an assembly today at 10 to 11 a. m. in College Auditorium to hear a talk by their commanding officer, Maj. R. S. Risien, Public Relations Officer Lt. E. N. Miller said yesterday. The assembly will last approximately 45 minutes.

Risien will give his men all information available to date on their training program. One of the primary purposes of the meeting, according to Miller, is "cutting out all the rumors that are flying around concerning the training aircrewmen will get here."

Risien will tell the men what will happen to them at Michigan State, and explain everything about the general setup on campus. He will also point out the reasons behind requiring the men to take various courses.

The 13-piece aircrew orchestra, composed of aircrewmen stationed here, will play a 15-minute program made up of the following numbers: "Let Me Off Uptown," "Nine-twenty Special" and "Southern Fly."

### Meeting Places Are Revealed for Senior Swingout

Divisional meeting places for the annual Senior swingout next Wednesday at 7:15 p. m. were announced yesterday by Bill Monroe, chairman of Senior week activities.

Agriculture students will meet in front of Ag hall; Engineers, Olat hall; Home Economics, Home Ec. building; Veterinarians, Vet clinic; Applied Science seniors, Kedzie chemistry building; and Liberal Arts students, Morrill hall.

The divisions will form a two-column line and remain standing until the college band comes to meet them, Monroe explained.

No honorary degrees will be awarded this year by Michigan State college, according to Pres. John A. Hannah.

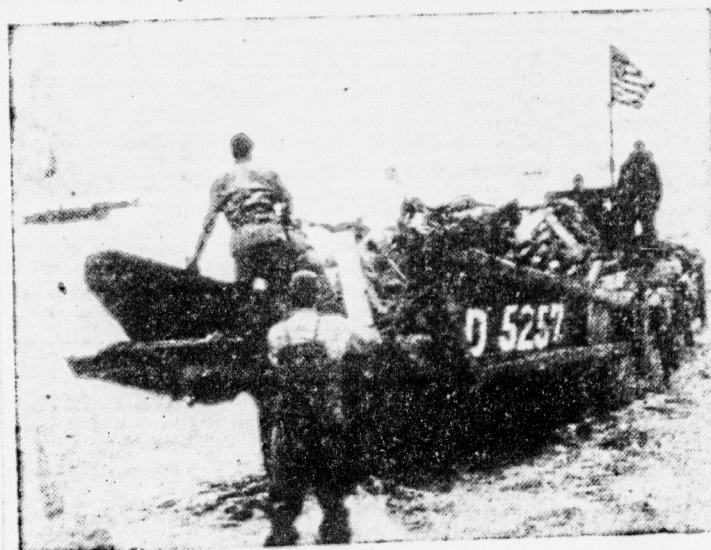
President Hannah explained, "As long as there are men in the military services who have been withheld from receiving a degree because they lack a few credits we will not be awarding any honorary degrees."

### Old Glory Gains Ground on Attu

An American flag flies over this captured Jap landing boat, being brought to shore at Masasake bay on Attu island, where the navy announced last night that U. S. army troops have penetrated deeply into the center of the area held by Japanese remnants after an attack prepared by Japanese remnants in mortar fire.

Advances were reported in the sector between Lake Cories and Lake Canirca on a line roughly

marking the base of a peninsula at the northeastern tip of the embattled island. Much of the battling in this wild, mountainous territory was reported to be above the clouds.

In the same general area, a communiqué said, troops attacked a ridge extending to the east of Fish Hook ridge, "after artillery and mortar preparation." The effect of this advance apparently was to outflank and thereby neutralize a Jap strong-point on Fish Hook ridge itself.

## President Names Byrnes Super-Czar Over Federal Agencies and Resources

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—President Roosevelt today centered under James F. Byrnes, the government's vast wartime controls over the nation's economic life, and made him the arbiter where civilian and military needs come into conflict.

### Risien to Select Top Squadron of Week at Aircrew Parade

Students, faculty members and townfolk are invited to this afternoon's parade. Lt. E. N. Miller, public relations officer for the 310th CTD, said yesterday.

Composed entirely of aircrewmen stationed at Mason and Abbott halls, the parade will get underway at 1 p. m. today on the ROTC parade grounds opposite the state police barracks on Harrison road. Music will be furnished by a 66-piece military band made up of members of the aircrew here.

The parade will be reviewed by Maj. R. S. Risien, commanding officer, who will award an emblem to the "squadron of the week" as determined at the parade. The award will be competed for by all squadrons each week.

### Invasion Anxiety Mounts in Italy

LONDON, May 28 (AP)—Rising Italian fears that invasion is near were pictured today in the Italian announcement that Allied landing barges were bombed in Bizerte and Sousse and an unconfirmed Morocco report that Mussolini, at a secret meeting with his party chiefs, decided further to reinforce Sicily and Sardinia.

The report, which had no confirmation, said all fortifications on the island approaches would be strengthened immediately, anti-aircraft batteries increased, and Sicily's airports, targets for heavy Allied bombings, would be enlarged.

By executive order, Mr. Roosevelt created the post of director of war mobilization and appointed to it the 64-year-old former South Carolina senator and supreme court justice who left the highest court last October to become director of economic stabilization.

In this position, Byrnes, who already had been named "assistant president" while economic stabilization director, will hold greater power than have ever been wielded by any American outside the office of the presidency itself.

### List Byrnes' Powers

Mr. Roosevelt's order empowered him "to develop, implement programs and to establish policies for the maximum use of the nation's natural and industrial resources for military and civilian needs; for the effective use of the national manpower not in the armed forces; for the maintenance and stabilization of the civilian economy; and for the adjustment of such economy to war needs and conditions."

### War Cabinet Established

In the same order, Mr. Roosevelt established what is in effect a war cabinet composed of Byrnes, Secretary of War Stimson, Secretary of the Navy Knox, Chairman Harry Hopkins of the Munitions Assignment board, Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the War Production board, and Judge Fred M. Vinson, former Kentucky representative who is leaving the District of Columbia court of appeals to succeed Byrnes as stabilization director.

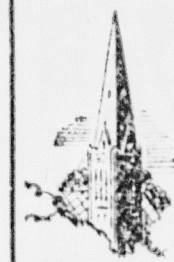

# Kobsmen Rally in Seventh to Take Normal, 6 to 4

Bernitt Shaky in First Two Innings as Hurons Score Four Times; Thirteen Hits Bolster Spartan Scoring Late in Game

Four runs in the seventh inning yesterday brought another victory for the Spartan baseball team over the Hurons of Michigan Normal for the sixth win against seven defeats this year for the Kobsmen.

Going into the seventh, State trailed 4 to 2 to Normal with Mickey Faulman coming to bat first. Faulman was safe on first on a shortstop's error, then Ted Lawski, Huron first baseman, dropped the throw to the bag on Raye Ladue's dribbling-infield blow to the pitcher to put two Spartans on base with none out.

Frank Pellerin surprised the Huron infield and beat out a hunt down the third base line to fill the bases. Art Maschoss drove in two runs as Faulman and Ladue came home on his slashing single into left field, tying up the ball game.

## Dillon Drives in Two

Roy Chlopan sacrificed Maschoss to second on a hunt for the first out. Then Jack Dillon, freshman shortstop, got his third hit of the day with a single driving Maschoss and Pellerin home. Dillon was tagged out at second on the play however in attempt to stretch the blow into a double. King fled out ending the inning.

Huron coach, Ray Stiles, saw his team take an early lead getting two runs in the first and two more in the second inning. Dick Bernitt, State hurler, got a slow start, giving up five hits for three runs in the first two innings but later settled down, allowing only four hits during the last innings of play.

The Kobsmen scored their first two runs in the second inning on successive hits by Dillon and King after Chlopan had walked as the first man up in the inning. Dillon was forced out at second on King's blow but Chlopan went to third on the play.

## Huron Error Aids State

Dillon moved to second on Raye's long fly into left field. Then both he and Chlopan scored on an error by Nuse, Huron third baseman, on Bernitt's grounder.

The Spartans got 13 hits in winning yesterday's game to give Bernitt some of the best support that any State pitcher has received this year. This is the second win over Normal with the Kobsmen taking a 7 to 1 victory last Saturday.

The next game on the Spartan schedule will be played Monday against Seltrige Field here.

There are two games with Seltrige and one with Western State left on the Spartan schedule for this year.

# Schlademan Takes Small Track Team to Milwaukee for 3-C Meet Today

A skeleton squad of 13 performers will represent State this afternoon and tonight at the 18th annual Central College conference track and field championships.

The preliminaries are scheduled to be run off in the afternoon, while the 16 event finals will be staged under lights beginning at 8 p. m. Today's meet will witness the smallest attendance in many years, with only 20 schools entered as compared with last year's 29.

The Spartans have only one title defender on the roster in Al Milne, who took the high jump last year with a 6 feet 4 inch leap to place State in a fifth place in the final team standings.

## State Strong in Distance

Other Spartan big guns are those making up State's formidable distance trio: John Laggett, half mile; Capt. Bill Scott, mile; and Jerry Page, two mile.

In the hurdle events will be lanky Mel Buschman, Wil Bennett and Sheldon Kaveff. Len Naab, who captured a fourth last year, will be heaving the javelin for State again today.

Only returning dash man will be Bob McArthur. Other sprinters danger are the pole vault and are Jack Mitzelfeld and Jackburdette.

Yon Eisenstein who will also enter the 440. Second Spartan entry in the half mile will be Joe Kennedy.

## To Enter Two Relays

Besides entries in the individual events, Coach Schlademan will run 440 and mile relay teams.

Today's meet will provide plenty of stiff competition for those competing with 11 of the 15 first place winners in the recent Big Ten meet.

Dillon, with a star studded wrist, will be favored to edge out Mackensen, last year's winner. Next in line are Milwaukee, Marquette and the Spartans.

The Spartans have captured but one crown since the meet's establishment in 1926, and that came in 1932.

## Many Old Records Stand

In the years since its founding the 3-C meet has seen an unusual display of talent, with several records of long standing. Oldest is the high jump mark set 11 years ago at 6 feet 7 1/2 inches. Others are the century mark of 93 and 220 record of 21.2 set in 1933 by Ralph Montague of Marquette.

Only records considered to be broken since then are the pole vault and are Jack Mitzelfeld and Jackburdette.
