Operator Split Threatened in UMW Meeting

Lewis Accuses Coal Heads of Sullen Attitude in Wage Conference

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—A virtual breakdown in negotiations between the soft coal operators and United Mine Workers developed today when UMW President John L. Lewis, who emerged from the conference with a denunciation of the John A. Hannah board.

"A farcical proceeding in every respect," Lewis declared, "a stultification of collective bargaining; the sullen, morose attitude of the operators is an affront to the coal miners and to the national interest."

Operators would not immediately make any comment except a report to the War Labor Board is being drafted. The parleys were directed by the board to report back in 15 days and that period expires tomorrow.

The joint wage conference is scheduled to resume at 10 a. m. tomorrow but participants indicated that the meeting would be held merely in conformity with the rules of the conference.

War Stamp Sales Pass \$1,000 Mark First Day as Alpha Chi Lead Race

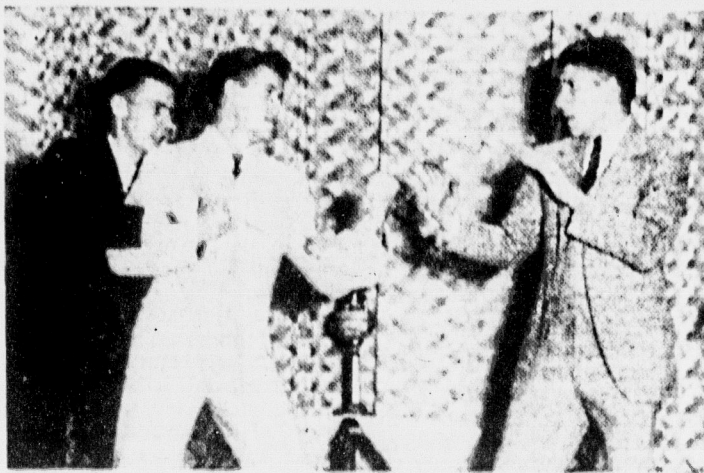

Churchill Announces Invasion Thrust Near at Hand in European Theater

LONDON, June 8 (AP)—Winning as though raising at last the bright signal that will send the invading Allied armies plunging forward, quietly told the world today that amphibious attacks of the peculiar complexity and scale on a large scale were very near at hand in the European theater.

All is in readiness for the grand assault, he made clear in a vigorous and heartening report to commonsense in which he declared the Allied submarine position was getting better and better by the day, and suggested, although tempering this out with his customary conservative qualifications, that the prospective defeat of the U-boat might mean the moral and actual defeat of the Germans.

The prime minister stood proud and confident before commonsense reflecting, as he had put it in another connection, that "mellow light of victory" which he saw playing over the Allied cause—and gave to the members the most confident review in the years of his war leadership.

New Book Represents Quarter Century of Work by Huddleson

The results of a quarter of a century of one man's work is contained in the new edition of the book "Brucellosis in Man and Animals" written by Prof. L. F. Huddleson of the department of bacteriology, and international authority on the subject.

This book is a third edition of the original book by the same title published by Huddleson in 1914. It brings up to date all available material on the disease, and contains material compiled through individual research on Huddleson's part.

Much of his research was done by studying the disease on the island of Malta, Tunis, and in different parts of Europe.

Brucellosis, which is commonly known as undulant fever, is receiving increasing importance as a disease of world-wide importance. At the time the fight against it was begun it was three times as prevalent as tuberculosis.

News in Brief

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt said today he intends to sign the pay-as-you-go tax bill soon and hinted at a new administration request for additional taxes, possibly heavier excise levies on cigars, tobacco and whiskey.

LONDON, Wednesday, June 9 (AP)—Two sharp river battles, with the Germans being driven across a river at a waterway below Kharkov, were reported by the Russians early today, while German airports and the Soviet industrial city of Gorki were pounded again in the mighty and unabated aerial war.

LONDON, June 8 (AP)—Rome and Berlin reported today that British commandos assaulted the tiny turtle-shaped island of Lampedusa Monday night and were repulsed in the first attempt of Allied forces massed in North Africa to invade Italian soil in the Mediterranean.

Military Units to Combine in Mass Event

All Classes to Be Excused from 4 to 5 p. m. for Term-end Showing

ROTC, STAR, and aircrew units will parade for Gov. Harry F. Kelly at 4 p. m. today on the parade grounds across from the police barracks, according to Capt. C. W. Boyer, public relations officer at MSC.

This annual spring governor's parade is the first all-unit parade since MSC went military. For this occasion, Pres. John A. Hannah has excused all college classes.

Aircrew to March

Participating in the review will be eight massed battalions of the 310th College Air Force Training Detachment, five massed battalions of ROTC men, and one massed battalion of STARS.

Music for the Governor's review will be furnished by the 60-piece Aircrew band.

All participants will wear regulation O.D. wool uniforms, without blouses except the aircrewmen who will wear khaki, Captain Boyer added.

New Units Included

The 300 new aircrewmen who joined the 310th CDF over the weekend, replacing squadrons A and B which graduated recently, will also join the other members of the training detachment in the march. These new men are enlisted men, some of whom have held ranks in the regular army, according to Lt. F. N. Miller, public relations officer.

Yesterday the regular ROTC parade, reviewed by three officers, was held from 4 to 5 p. m. on the parade grounds. Marching with the ROTC men was one battalion of STAR men.

Roosevelt Warns Axis Against Use of Poison Gas

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt, saying there are reports the Axis is preparing to use poison gas, warned today that a resort to such "desperate and barbarous" warfare would be followed by the fullest possible retaliation on munition centers, seaports, and other military objectives.

In a statement, Roosevelt said he wanted to make it clear that the United States would regard use of gas against any of the United Nations the same as if it had been committed against this country.

He added: "We promise to any perpetrators of such crimes full and swift retaliation in kind and I feel obliged now to warn the Axis armies and the Axis peoples in Europe and in Asia, that the terrible consequences of any use of these inhuman methods on their part will be brought down swiftly and surely upon their own heads."

OPA Regulations to Change Price of Vegetables

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—Fresh vegetables were put next on the list for price roll-backs today while some congressmen were attacking the whole theory of food subsidies and representatives of grocery interests were telling a congressional committee that OPA regulations already in force threaten to "break down" the country's food distribution system.

Labor representatives countered with a charge that inflation-minded congressmen were attacking OPA to cover their own "stupidity or cupidity, or both."

General effectiveness of the OPA and the whole theory of subsidies and price roll-backs were attacked by senators in the banking committee hearing, but Richard Gilbert, economic adviser to Price Administrator Prichett Brown, retorted that the nation is faced with the threat of a rise of 2 to 3 per cent a month in living costs.

He asserted that OPA proposed to use subsidies "only enough to get the production we ought to have and to stabilize the cost of living."

Only One Case of TB Revealed by X-Rays

If women have not yet received notice of their X-rays, taken early this term, it means that they show no sign of tuberculosis, Dr. Charles Holland, director of Olin Memorial health center, said yesterday.

No notification was given to these students, while the ones that need a recheck or treatment have been called in, he added. As yet, only one case has been discovered.

College Band to Continue During Summer School

For the first time in the history of the college, the Michigan State college band will continue normal activity through the summer term, according to Prof. Roy Underwood, music department head.

A definite program for the band has not been announced as yet, but it is expected that it will schedule two or three concerts to be held in the shell, Underwood said.

Vets to Move to Barracks

Veterinary students who are members of the ERC should not make arrangements for rooms during the summer term, according to Capt. C. W. Boyer, public relations officer for the college. Captain Boyer said the veterinarians would be moved into barracks at the beginning of the term, and suggested that the students plan to pay their own tuition, although "the money will probably be refunded to them later."

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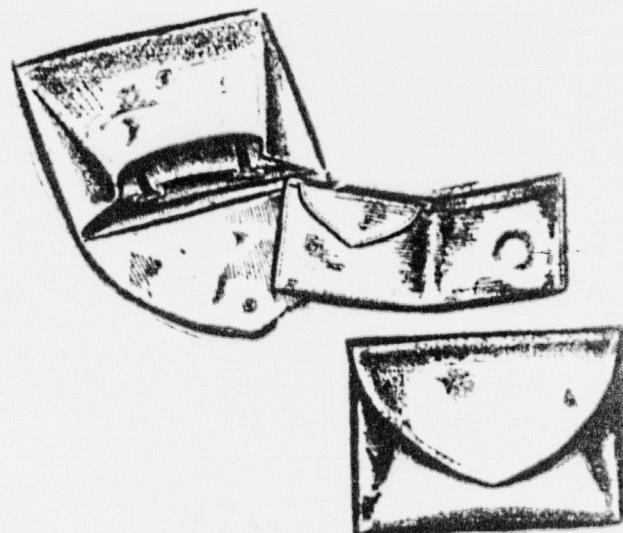
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Allied Invasion of Europe Predicted Picture of Continent Attack Forecast by Nazi Leaders

STOCKHOLM, June 8 (AP)—The Germans, said to be counting from hour to hour on an Allied invasion of Europe, presented today their advance story of just what the first few days of assault would be like if northern France is struck from across the English channel.

Here is the imagined picture—highly favorable to the Germans, of course—as forecast by German military sources quoted by the Berlin correspondent for the Stockholm Tidningen.

A terrific barrage by British warships and a mass aerial bombardment would be set up simultaneously against European coastal batteries.

Small landing boats, each with 120 men, would proceed under the barrage toward the coast, carrying about 50,000 men in the first attack wave. This wave also would include other boats carrying light weapons and small tanks.

Upon the discovery of the attack, the Germans would concentrate U boat packs—presumed to be stationed at possible invasion areas since they hope to use them to ward off any Allied blow—and aerial power in an attempt to wreck the landing plans.

American Planes Hit Jap Cargoes

ALLIED BOMB IN AUSTRALIA, June 8 (AP)—Japanese shipping in both the northwest and northeastern sectors of the island perimeter above Australia came within the bomb-sights of American bombers yesterday with the heaviest blow falling on vessels in the harbor of Waingapoe, Soemba Island, of the Lesser Sunda group.

There a formation of Liberators attacked in mid-morning, finding a 5,000-ton cargo ship and two transports of between 3,000 and 4,000 tons as well as a gunboat.

The ships raised a heavy curtain of anti-aircraft fire which was supported by some shelling from land positions, but the B-24s managed to damage the largest vessel with two near misses of 500-pound bombs.

An Aeronca trainer NC31387 has been donated by the Hughes Flying service, Lansing, for aircrew use at MSC. The plane is for inspection use only and pre-cadets have an opportunity to get the "feel" of controls and become familiarized with the construction of the plane.

The plane is set up next to the tennis courts south of Mason-Abbot hall and aircrewmembers may inspect it in their spare time. The plane contains a Continental A 65 four-cylinder, air-cooled, horizontally opposed engine.

Boxes have been set up in the recreation rooms of Mason and Abbot halls for aircrewmembers to suggest a name for the plane.

An effort will be made after the war is over to have a sufficient number of these pins on hand to be given to any graduates of the college who want them.

All names will be kept on file for the duration and after the war, pins may be obtained through the registrar's office, Foster added.

Argentine Leaders Near Break With Axis Countries

MONTEVIDEO, June 8—An eventual break with the Axis by Argentina's new government was forecast tonight by usually reliable Montevideo sources who said that the lifting of martial law in Argentina and the government's promise to "act" on continental collaboration reinforced their opinion.

They said latest actions of the new cabinet indicate that the revolutionary regime intends to carry out the original program, which liberal elements endorsed.

It was assumed here that repeal of martial law did not lift the state of siege which former President Ramon S. Castillo decreed to protect his neutrality policy from popular criticism. And thus far the new government has been enforcing all decrees enacted by the previous regime.

Nevertheless, the speedy lifting of martial law after the behavior of the people showed it was unnecessary, was interpreted here as a happy augury for eventual restoration of normal conditions.
