CBS Reporter Replaces Cook on Series

Sorenson, Globe Trotter, to Illustrate Talk With Movies

Sorenson, former CBS foreign correspondent, comes from the geography department of the University of Chicago, according to Prof. S. E. Crowe, chairman of the lecture course.

Elected a fellow of the Royal Geographical Society of London, Sorenson's travels cover Europe as well as Latin America. He watched Hitler's rise to power, and covered exclusively the opening of the famed pipe line from Iraq to the Mediterranean. He has also studied Spanish at the University of Mexico and has traveled widely in Latin America.

Tonight's lecture, "New Patterns in South America," will be given in the Auditorium at 8:15 and will be illustrated with moving pictures. All service men in uniform will be admitted free and students must present their stamped treasurer's receipt, according to Crowe.

300 Engineers Will Begin New Specialized Training

State Selected as Training and Classification Center for Sixth Service Command; Certification Board Named

Classification of 300 engineers under the specialized training and replacement program to remain on campus for advanced training will begin next week, according to S. E. Crowe, director of the STAR program on campus.

Boys' Staters Eat Well in Spite of Food Rationing

The nine-days meeting of the sixth annual Wolverine Boys' State presented many problems to officials, but none more puzzling than the food situation, with food rationing adding to the complications.

Last year the college Union fed the Boys' Staters but now with approximately 850 soldier-students to feed, the meals had to be divided between the Union and Peoples church.

Twenty-four thousand pounds went for meat alone, with the model students stowing away about 436 pounds of baked ham at one meal, while roast beef dinners called for 166 pounds per meal.

Average consumption of other items was 225 gallons of milk, 330 pounds of potatoes, 33 gallons of ice cream, 60 gallons of soup, and 24 pounds of crackers.

In between-meal figures were about as huge with a total of 23,000 bottles of soft drinks and 3,475 popsidles being devoured.

Presentation of 16 special awards and a diploma to each of the 727 citizens officially closed the Boys' State program yesterday. Principal address of the ceremony was delivered by Robert R. Wright, department commander of the Michigan American legion.

"This Boys' State was unquestionably the most successful yet," said Carl Matheny, president of the Boys' State commission, in closing the week's activities.

Will Keep STARS

Now instead of sending the classified students to other training centers in surrounding states, Michigan State will classify and retain its own soldier-students.

The classification board, which includes Capt. W. W. VonStichten, Capt. C. W. Boyer, Lieut. V. D. Giermer and Prof. P. L. Dressel, will begin its battery of tests and personal interviews Monday, and a certification board made up of Maj. Gerald Peterson, Capt. Von Stichten and Crowe will interview and certify each candidate.

Split Into Units

The STAR program will be divided into two units, those having no previous college experience, who will take preliminary work, and those with one or more years of college credit who will do advanced work.

Basic training courses will begin July 12 and advanced courses will start when advanced engineers arrive.

Program of study for the Stars in basic training will include seven hours of physics, three hours of chemistry, three hours of history, two hours of geography, three hours of English, six hours of physical education and five hours of military training, making a total of 35 hours each week.

STAR classes are scheduled to begin July 21 and will continue for seven school terms, the equivalent of a full technical engineer's course.

650 4-H Club Members Will Meet on Campus

Michigan State college will play host to 650 young 4-H club members beginning June 28 and continuing through July 1. The annual Club week has been somewhat curtailed this year, but will continue on a restricted basis, according to A. G. Kettunen, state club leader.

Girls will be housed in Campbell dormitory and boys are to stay in the Women's gym during the five-day period. All meals will be served in Peoples church.

The theme of the entire convention is "4-H on the Home Front."

SPEAKING FOR MYSELF

WHILE not upholding any of its policies and realizing that Japan and the Japanese people are not the most pleasant topic of dinner table conversation at the present time, it is still interesting to note some of the things coming to attention all the time concerning that small island group in the far east.
For example, Japan is reported to be primarily an agricultural country, in a current encyclopedia. In view of this fact, the agrarians have done well by themselves in technical and mechanized affairs in more recent years.
Also interesting to those who care to compare figures is the fact that in a nation of little more than 90,000,000 population at the time there were only five imperial universities and 32 other institutions of university rank.
With military or naval training compulsory between the ages of 17 and 40 in the country, it is not surprising to know that the peacetime forces of the Japanese army numbered more than 15,000 officers and almost 200,000 of other ranks.
Classed then as the third great naval power of the world, it isn't hard to realize what power they could have amassed before Dec. 7, 1941. Those who can't imagine can remember.

ALTHOUGH Benjamin Franklin could not have known the ironical significance certain of his words would have today, one remark which he made in 1787 has an entirely new meaning today. After almost four months of heated debate, planning, changing and compromising the constitution of the United States was worked into an understandable, fundamental law, preparatory to submitting it to the various state legislatures for ratification.
As, one by one, the 39 delegates to the convention approached to sign the approved document, Franklin remarked that often during the session he had looked at a sun painted on the president's chair without being able to tell whether it was rising or setting. "Now, at length," he added, "I have the happiness to know that it is a rising and not a setting sun."
Were Benjamin Franklin living today, he would know that it was definitely a rising sun, but probably wouldn't like the great significance given to the symbol of the rising sun by the race of people known as the Japanese, regardless of how many years that country has been known as the land of the rising sun.
There's more than one person now who hopes to live to see it the land of the setting sun, never to rise again to its present self-imposed, lofty position.

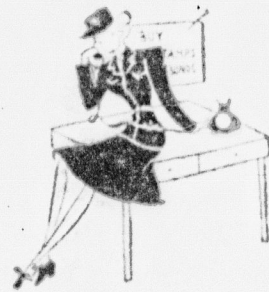
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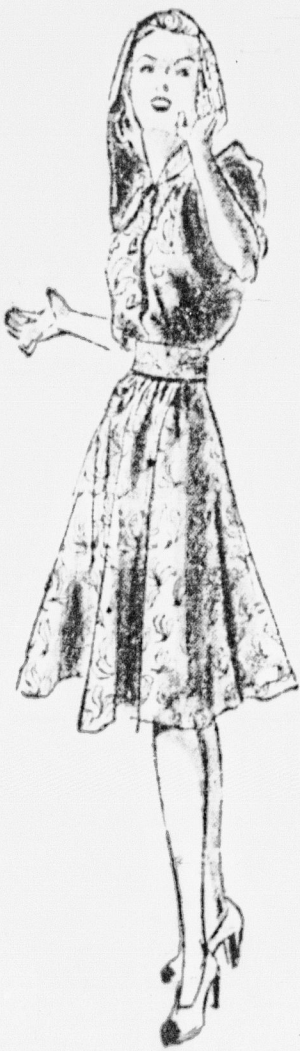

V. Millard Practices and Preaches Progressiveness

Progressive and progressing. These two words describe the theory and practice of C. V. Millard, newly appointed head of the department of education.

Students in Dr. Millard's classes sometimes at first don't realize that they are being taught by the new progressive method, and it seems strange.

This philosophy and method of progressive education which Dr. Millard, who has been with the education department five years, expounds and practices is based on an experiment which he supervised while at the Henry Ford school.

Conducted Test

In this experiment, during an eleven-year period, a group of 400 students was given over 200,000 measurements including both physical and mental tests, proving the worth of the test.

Dr. Millard did his undergraduate work at Ypsilanti and while there participated in sports which brought him to State's track and baseball field in the role of competitor. He was rated high-point man on the Normal track team.

Playing in his own band occupied much of his spare time while he attended Columbia university where he earned his master's degree. Music came easy to Millard, but he maintains that his son, a junior in high school who has played in State musical organizations such as the ROTC band and the symphony last summer, "is a real musician. I was a fake."

Further education was completed with a doctor's degree in educational psychology obtained at the University of Michigan. Was High School Teacher

Dr. Millard started his teaching in Northville. From there he went to Dearborn high school where he taught science and coached football for a few years. From there he went to the Henry Ford school as superintendent.

Five years ago, Dr. Millard

was invited to be a guest professor during the summer session, and that fall he became a regular member of the staff of education. Becoming depart-

ment head clinches his 20 years in public school work.

Chief among Dr. Millard's vocations is golf. He started playing at twenty-five and ended up in the Michigan Amateur Open semi-finals, but since then has decided to stick to education.

Dr. Millard is now editing a work for Michigan Elementary Principals' association on child growth and development. All of his outside experimentation has been on child growth.

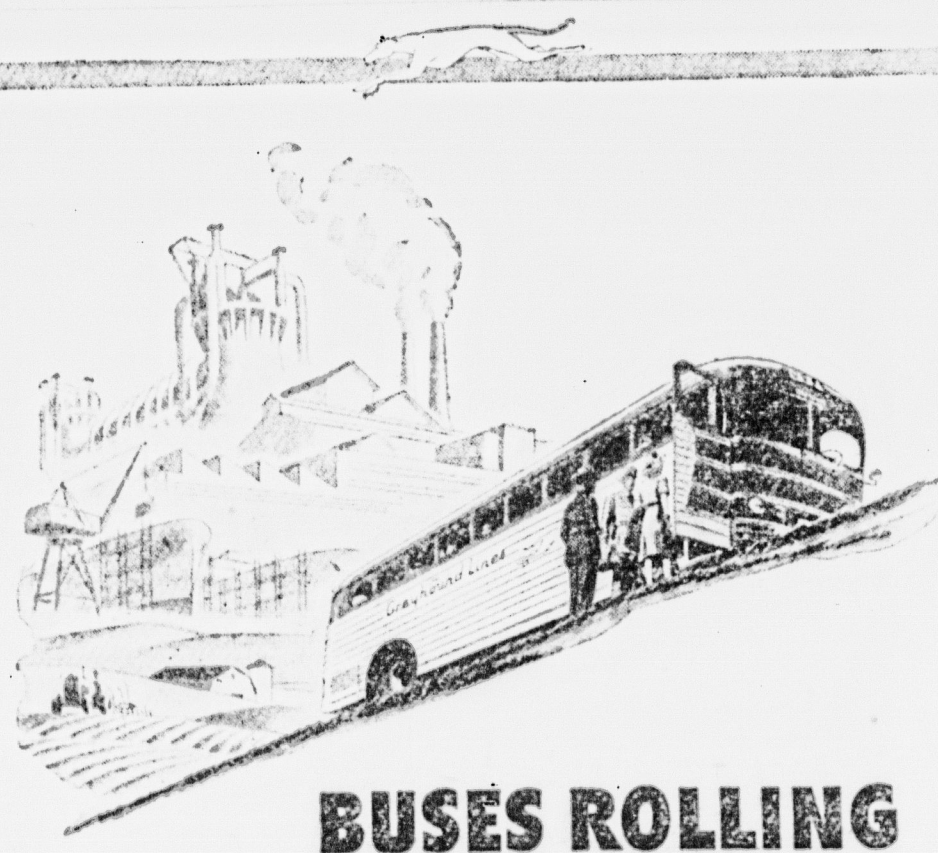
