COLLEGE traditions don't just happen. They are built solidly into the history of this college and are as much a part of it as books, professors and classrooms.

They are the unwritten laws—the customs which students have established and kept for many years—distinguishing one college from another.

In over 80 years Michigan State has built up many traditions, most of them stemming from two of the main features of the college, the friendly campus and the campus beautiful.

Probably the best known tradition is the "no smoking" on campus rule and it is one that seldom has been broken, but people have been reporting that this tradition is being violated more and more frequently lately.

This is more than a social erosion. It is a crime against established custom. However, nobody is going to sue or discipline the smokers because traditions are upheld by pride and not by force.

Respect for the old tradition should give the violator the desire to "put out the tag" while on this side of the river.

PICTURES appearing recently in the newspapers of Henry Kaiser's new post-war \$400 car, which he plans to sell through gas station chains all over the country, is one of the latest additions to the post-war dream world.

Predictions of the advance of science have been made right and left lately, most of them without real backing. Following a research with experts in the field, Howard W. Blakeslee, Associated Press science editor, puts the skids on these predictions.

According to his research on what science will offer after the war, the average man will own a helicopter with only the space of a back yard necessary for taking off and landing.

Automobiles will have transparent sides and top and will go 50 miles to the gallon with five gears for 100,000 miles. Houses will probably be made of glass with movable partitions and there will be television in every home.

Farms will double their output, but Blakeslee points out it would happen right away. The conversion from war to peace-time industry must take place first. It will be perhaps 20 years before these inventions are perfected and introduced to the American public.

Meanwhile we will have to do other things to worry about—like winning the war.


