Furloughs End for 135 ROTC Graduates

Final Contingent to Go to McCoy Saturday for Processing

The final contingent of 85 former ROTC seniors will leave Saturday for Camp McCoy, for processing before going into OCS of different branches of service, according to Lt. Col. E. H. Stillman, military department adjutant.

One hundred thirty-five of the graduates left Monday for Camp McCoy after expiration of their 14 day furloughs. Five of the recent graduates went to the camp immediately without taking the furlough granted. Six former police administration students will go directly into M. P. school, Colonel Stillman said.

The processing period will include several inoculations and tests, similar to those required of all inducted into the regular army.

Colonel Stillman also announced that approximately 300 engineering students will soon begin specialized training under the recently established STAR program.

Classification of the 300 engineers began Monday. In the past the STARS have been classified and sent out for further training, but the present group will remain.

Basic training courses will begin July 12. STAR classes for advanced engineering students are scheduled to start July 21.

Sixteen engineers, who had already arrived on campus, yesterday moved into Wells hall, which is to be reserved for STAR trainees.

Three Points Earned by 5 Men, 8 Women for Spring Term

Straight A scholastic averages for the spring term, just concluded, showed almost a 50 per cent decrease over winter term averages with only five men and eight women three pointers as compared with 14 women and 9 men winter term, according to R. S. Linton, registrar. However, this total does not include seniors who graduated on June 12 or graduate students.

CTD Commandant to Be Transferred

Major Risien to Take Over Washington Duties Monday; Will Be Replaced by Capt. Carl Modglin

Major R. S. Risien, commanding officer of the 310th College Training Detachment at Michigan State college, will report to Washington, D. C., tomorrow after being transferred to headquarters of the army air forces, in the office of the assistant chief of air staff, department of training.

Major Risien will begin his new duties Monday and will be officially connected with the air crew training program as carried on in various colleges and universities throughout the country.

He will be working under Brig. Gen. R. W. Harper, under the commanding general of the army air forces, H. M. Arnold.

Capt. Carl F. Modglin, formerly an adjutant in the army air force school program on campus, will replace Risien as commanding officer of the 310th CTD.

Before coming to Michigan State college as commanding officer of the 310th CTD when the group arrived here late in March, Major Risien was stationed at Ellington field, Texas, where he was the commandant of advanced pilot training at the twin-engine school.

Bengal Nine Takes 1-0 in Over Nash in Exhibition Tilt

The Detroit Tigers baseball club easily downed the Nash Local No. 13 squad by the unimpressive score of 1-0 in Old College field yesterday evening in an exhibition contest.

Playing before a crowd of 6,000 shivering spectators, the combined efforts of Pitchers Stan Overmire and Roy Henshaw held the Nash sluggers to three hits while the Bengals came through with five.

The only score of the afternoon came in the third inning when Al Unser reached first by virtue of a walk and circled the bases on a sacrifice by Overmire and Joe Wood's single on the only error of the game.

Turning in a sterling performance for the Nash kids was Pitcher Maurice Ramont, who, while holding the Bengal slugger power to five scattered hits, forced eight of the Detroiters to appear before him out on strikes. Overmire, who was relieved by Henshaw in the sixth, struck out six, while Henshaw accounted for three in the same manner.

Only hitting power displayed by Local 13 was vested in First Baseman Irv Kolberg who clouted out two doubles in his first two times at bat. Pitcher Ramont acquired Nash's only other hit when he rapped out a single in the eighth.

Detroit's much lauded slugger, Dick Wakefield, was unable to reach first base as he went down swinging twice, flied out once and grounded out another time.

Enrollment Hits 4,667 for New Summer Mark

Final registration totals show 4,667 students enrolled for the first full term summer school, according to Registrar R. S. Linton. Registration closed Monday at 5 p. m.

Included in the enrollment are 1,667 civilians and approximately 3,000 aircrewmembers and STARS. The civilian enrollment includes 826 men and 841 women.

The 4,667 soldier and civilian registration hits an all time high for summer school. Two thousand five hundred one students registered last summer.

The 3,000 soldiers although on government assignment are registered with the college and will receive regular credits.

Included in the enrollment are about 200 June high school graduates who are taking advantage of the accelerated educational program.

Two Ex-Spartans Given Citations for Air Bravery

Capt. Henry F. Riggs, former of Michigan State college athlete, has been awarded the distinguished flying cross and air medal with oak leaf clusters for meritorious achievement, according to citation received by his family.

Lt. Walter D. Anderson, of East Lansing, former State college athlete, awarded with shooting down three enemy planes in aerial combat over Panama.

Capt. Riggs, who has been mentioned in African bombing missions since Jan. 19, was co-pilot of the Spartan wrestling team.

He was transferred from the 48th to the 34th North African Air Corps with the opening of African operations there. His home is in Parma City, Okla. He was member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

The 48th squadron of which Lt. Anderson was a member, shot down 10 Messerschmitts and Italian Maccis while attacking a Red Cross plane in Sicily.

Before enlisting in the army he was Lieutenant Anderson graduated from East Lansing high school, and attended Michigan State for three years where he was a member of Delta Sigma Phi fraternity. He received his flight training in Texas.

COLLEGE traditions don't just happen. They are built solidly into the history of the college and are as much a part of it as books, professors and classrooms.
They are the unwritten laws—the customs which students have established and kept for many years—distinguishing one college from another.
In over 30 years Michigan State has built up many traditions, most of them stemming from two of the main features of the college, the friendly campus and the campus beautiful.
Probably the best known tradition is the "no smoking" on campus rule and it is one that seldom has been broken, but people have been reporting that this tradition is being violated more and more frequently lately.
This is more than a social error. It is a crime against established custom. However, nobody is going to slug or discipline the smoker, because traditions are upheld by pride and not by force.

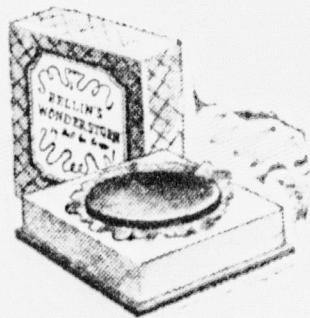

Six Freshmen Win Letters on Track and Baseball Teams

For the first time in 25 years freshmen were awarded major letters for participation in varsity sports, it was announced by Athletic Director Ralph H. Young yesterday.

Six Spartan yeetlings qualified for their varsity letters among the total of 40 other letter winners.

The track squad carried away the largest number of winners with 27 men qualifying, while the baseball squad came second with 13 and two minor lettermen.

Freshmen Take Awards

Freshmen who distinguished themselves among the cinder-men were Jim Barbour, broad jumper from East Lansing; Joe Kennedy, half miler from Niles; Ward Lyke, miler from Mesick; Jack Von Eberstein, dash and 440-man from Royal Oak.

Freshmen taking awards among the baseballers were Jack Dillon, shortstop from Grosse Pointe, and Tom King, fielder from East Lansing.

Forty Winners

The total of 40 letter winners is a surprisingly large total, considering the number of eligible men who were lost to the army, commented Young.

Most of the award winners will be inducted into the armed services by the end of the summer, forcing Spartan coaches to start from scratch when the coming seasons roll around.

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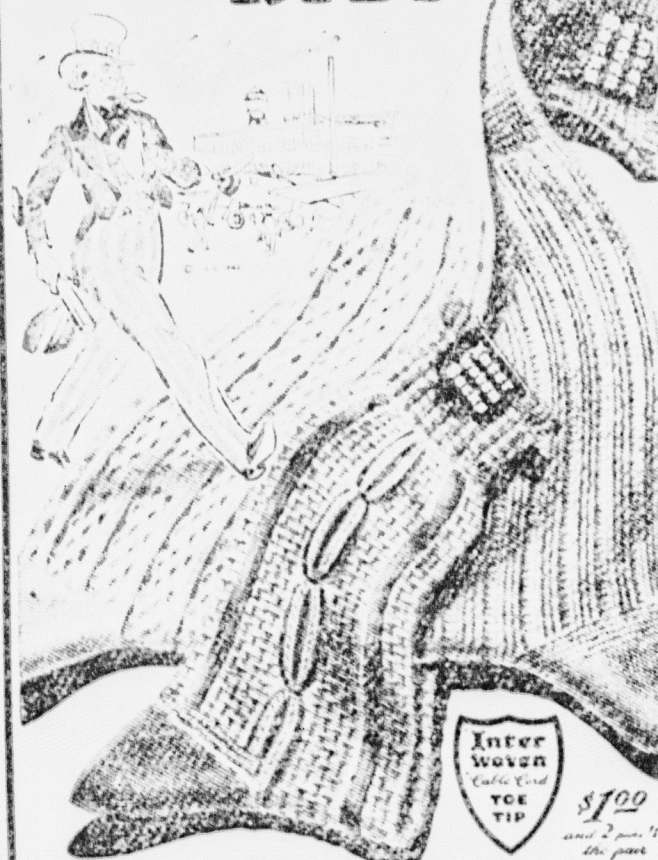
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
