Ice Cream Demands Continue Despite Ration, Frost

Ice cream demands this summer are met half way, because of increasing shortage of vanilla, fruit juices, and other compounds, said a professor of dairy science.

Estimated for this summer, the ice cream industry has been conspicuous by the absence of the memo.

According to Lucas, there has been a 50 per cent decrease in the price of vanilla, a 50 to 75 per cent decrease in all milk and citrus fruits, or other items, the exception of butter, which is still available.

Lucas continued, "The rumors about ice cream rationing and industries closing down are entirely untrue. The government has just proclaimed that the manufacture of ice cream is considered an essential industry and will continue to the duration."

With the extremes of temperature of 36 to 41 degrees endured by State students within a period of five days there was no effect on the buying of the item. Dairy personnel maintain that they are just as busy as ever. Hot or cold, ice cream is still sold.

Besides having no decrease in sales to regular students, there was an increase caused by the conventions held on campus.

ROTC Grad Group Pre-Vets May Complete Studies After Induction

Goes to Custer for Processing

Through a last minute reversal of orders, the 85 senior ROTC graduates of the final contingent leaving today will go to Fort Custer rather than to Camp McCoy for their processing period, according to Lt. Col. T. H. Stillman, adjutant.

After the processing the men will be sent to Camp McCoy where they will be stationed from one day to 12 weeks while waiting for an opening in the officers' candidate school of their branch of the service.

Most of this group are held artillery men. The first group which left Monday went directly to Camp McCoy, where they will be processed. They will not be returned to Fort Custer.

150 Students Will Continue Training Under Army Supervision: Pre-Meds Receive Temporary Deferments

Approximately 150 pre-vet students remaining in college will be inducted into the army this week and will be allowed to complete requirements for graduation, according to Col. Dorsey Rodney.

First group will go to Fort Custer Wednesday for formal induction. The vets will continue under army supervision until they receive their degrees, when they will be awarded commissions.

Two Ex-Spartans Killed in Action

The number of former Michigan State students who have lost their lives in the present war has increased with the reported death of Lt. Raymond Zetzel, Gen. Service, during secret operations yesterday.

Lt. Eugene Boone, a State cadet of 1941, has been reported missing in action since June 22 in action over the southwest Pacific area, according to a telegram received by Boone's wife Wednesday from the war department.

Zetzel, whose home town was West Branch, was killed in a plane crash in Virginia July 1. He was enrolled in the Engineering division here in 1938-39. At the end of the spring term in '39 he left to attend West Point.

Lieutenant Boone began his college career at the University of Michigan, but transferred to State after two years. He graduated from the Liberal Arts division in 1941. In January, 1942, he enlisted in the army air corps, receiving his training at Kelly, Randolph and Foster fields.

DEAREST Johnny,

Summer school is really under way now, and counting the aircrewmembers and STARS the enrollment totals 4,667. Civilian students number 826 men and 341 women.

This weekend will be the first quiet one of the term. When students first returned to campus Wolverine Boys' State was having its annual meeting. Then 4-H clubbers moved in for a week, learning how to put into practice their motto: "4-H on the Home Front."

The women's dormitories are going to live up to Gov. Harry Kelly's recent request for meatless Tuesdays. Mildred Jones, dormitory manager, has worked out a number of meals which have all the values of a regular meat dinner.

CNC is continuing its activities this summer, and recruiting at registration time drew 109 volunteers. Defense classes, SWAVes, and the date Bureau will all help the civilian students do their part.

Michigan State has recently been selected as a training and classification center for the sixth service command. This means that the college will classify and retain its own soldier-students. Under this new program 300 engineers will soon begin their training, either in the basic or advanced courses, both of which will be offered.

Major R. S. Risien, commanding officer of the 310th College Training Detachment here, has been transferred to the headquarters of the army air forces at Washington, D. C. His new work will connect him with the aircrew training program that is being carried on in colleges and universities all over the country.

The Detroit Tigers came to college this week to play an exhibition game with the Nash Local No. 13 on Old College field. Final score was 1-0, with the Tigers on top.

The remaining 85 ROTC graduates leave today for Fort Custer, later they will be sent to Camp McCoy and then to OCS. One hundred thirty-five left last Monday, after the expiration of their 14 day furloughs.

Probably what will prove to be the last sports news for the duration has just been announced. For the first time in 25 years freshmen were awarded major letters for participation in varsity sports. Six of the first year men qualified among the total of 40 major letter awards.

Canning Factory, Gift of Ford, to Fill College Storerooms

The college canning factory, received last year by Michigan State as a gift of Henry Ford, is now being used to stock college storerooms with food for civilian and soldier consumption next fall, according to Prof. H. E. Marshall of the horticulture department, head of the project.

Harvesting of 35 acres of peas began last week, and approximately 4,000 No. 10 size cans of peas, each holding nearly a gallon, were shelved in the college storerooms recently.

From now until the end of summer the college will be harvesting and canning produce from 40 acres of beans, 85 acres of sweet corn, 6 acres of lima beans, 38 acres of tomatoes, two acres of pumpkins and squash, and four acres of beets and carrots.

These canned goods will not be sold, Marshall said. Besides being a source of food for vari-

ous campus services, the factory will serve as a laboratory for research information on preservation and processing.

High school boys and girls from Lansing, East Lansing, surrounding communities, and harvest the peas, and will produce as other produce is harvested. Canning of fruit in the college orchards is also being considered, Marshall said.

Superintendent of the canning plant is William Robertson, who came to State from Brooklyn, N. Y., last April. He has seven years teaching and years practical food processing experience.

Administrator Crowe Bears Titles of Diverse Offices

It's not a hobby, it's business. That is the man of many titles, Director, Chairman, or Coordinator S. E. Crowe.

All the titles accumulated over a period of seven years have made Crowe's office more like Grand Central station, with booksellers, program agents, professors, army men, and students calling in person, and the phone buzzing like a stock exchange.

Prefixes to his name are Chairman of Advisers, Director of Summer School, Director of General College, Chairman of the Lecture Course, and Coordinator of Army Training.

Latest Prefix

His latest acquired office is that of coordinator of army training. This job requires most time at present and its spontaneous character with respect to the sudden appearance of STAR men makes it the title of the moment.

Director Crowe received his B.A. at Ohio State, his M.A. at the University of Michigan, and took further work at the University of Chicago, the University of Wisconsin, and the University of Minnesota.

He came to State in 1909 directly from Ohio State and entered the department of mathematics as instructor, joining Dean L. C. Emmons who came the same year.

In 1936 he was made director of summer school while still teaching mathematics half time. With the accumulation of the various offices he now holds, he moved from the Engineering building to the Administration building in 1939.

Gives Up Teaching

About one and one-half years ago Crowe broke away from teaching mathematics entirely. His last class was one in statistics which has been his major field.

All the jobs are different in nature and all absorbing. He especially enjoys meeting the people in connection with his lecture course work. The rush seasons for the different positions are seasonal, no two simultaneously requiring a great deal of time.

All of the present war activities on campus remind Director Crowe of the SATC of the first

World War, a short-lived training program. It was begun in the fall of 1917 and continued through the following winter.

500 Men Included

Only four or five hundred men came, making about the same ratio of army to civilians as that today. Men were quartered at Williams hall (where the library is now) and in Wells hall and drilled every afternoon on the grounds in front of Wells.

Mornings were filled with class work which did not include much of the training now required.

In a strictly military manner anyone coming on campus was challenged by a sentry and had to give the password and then take a specific route onto the grounds. Tragedy of the program was the results of the epidemic of influenza which spread over the entire country that year.

Reviews College's Growth

Crowe likes to reminisce about the evolution of State since he came here when there were only 1300 students and a "forest" surrounding a few buildings. One of the interesting periods was the post-war construction which produced the Home-economics building, the library, and the Union.

Growing with the college has made him "think more of this place than I do of my Alma Mater."

His hobby is collecting antique Colonial furniture and glassware. Small square tables and Sandwich glassware are his favorites.
