East Lansing has, roughly, 10 places where meals roughly, 10 places where meals are served at some hour of the day. About four or five of these bear the brunt of the hundreds of persons who must eat, whether they want to or not.

It is loads of fun, pays good money and is a rather healthy occupation at that. Many young persons who must eat, whether they they may not be college.

Under present conditions in East Lansing sometimes it is al-most impossible to do that Many students go to Lansing to cot their evening meals, and do the best they can at noon. But not all students are made of money. at does count up in time.

Another factor adding to the alleady unpleasant situation is that now, during the summer first one and then another of the shops is closed for repairs of cations, leaving only three four to handle the situation

While some persons gripe about the matter, it is something which calls for far more than mer griping. A person could make something whi good business start in East Lan-sing by organizing and operating a cateteria or food shop which served good, clean tood, well prepared, and at reasonable price for students to pay.

Opportunities would be endless, because that is the one thing State students would ap-preciate. Of course, the matter securing materials is a stiff

one to be met. Not all of the shops which have closed in the last few weeks have done so through choice but because of lack of materials to continue serving the public with. However, it is still a thought However, it is still a thought about something badly needed.

Another angle to the food sit nation, especially affecting those who live or cook at a private home and don't get their meals away from home, is that local private grocery stores are being forced, through lack of products, to close down for the duration.


