## Macklin Field to be Target of Bomb Raid

Practice Blitz on Stadium to Be Held Tuesday, Sponsored by OCD

What happens in a town during a bombing attack will be demonstrated in "Action Overhead" at Macklin field next Tuesday by the Chemical Warfare Service of the U. S. Army, according to C. W. Otto, secretary manager of the Lansing chamber of commerce, and general chairman of the industrial protection conference being sponsored by the Michigan Citizens' Defense Corps.

A model village with business, residential and industrial sections is being constructed in the college stadium for the "bombing" attack, Otto said. The simulated attack will be carried out by explosive charges set off when planes dive on the village.

### Real War Conditions

Fires, civilian casualties, and exploding buildings will give opportunity for the OCD protective service units to demonstrate their work under actual war conditions.

Ambulance corps, hospital services, firefighters, Red Cross units, and air raid wardens will participate.

The demonstration, which will be open to the public, has been presented in Michigan only once before. It returns by popular request of the Michigan OCD and will appear in Flint, Grand Rapids, Pontiac and Lansing.

"Action Overhead" will climax the program prepared for the war gas, bombs, and industrial protection conference to be held at the Lansing Technical high school for district 2 of the Michigan CDC, Otto stated.

## Spring Term Average for College Hits 1.54: Ag and L.A. Lead

All-college average for spring term was raised to 1.54 according to Registrar R. S. Linton.

The 2,832 coeds and civilian men enrolled last term made an increase of .08 over winter session average of 1.46, making the all-college average of well over C.

Seniors made the highest class average with 1.84. The other three classes followed in order, juniors with 1.58, sophomores making 1.39, and freshmen with 1.37, Linton said.

Top divisional average was made by students in agriculture, whose record was 1.64. Division of Liberal Arts followed with 1.63 average, he stated.

## Capt. H.M. Seeley Wins Third Citation in Year for Meritorious Service

Capt. Harvey M. Seeley, class of 1940, has been awarded his third citation within a year for gallantry with the United States army air forces, according to a war department communication to his parents.

He received the bronze oak leaf cluster "for meritorious achievement while participating in the middle east theatre." He previously received the distinguished flying cross and the army air corps aviator's medal.

Captain Seeley received this latest honor "for having participated in 10 operational sorties of two and one-half hours or more in the middle east theatre, the notification read.

## Aloha Baker Will Lecture on 'India Now' Tonight

'World's Most Traveled Woman' Uses Own Films as Illustrations in Discussion of Indian Independence, Part in War Effort

Bringing with her the story of India's part in the world conflict, Aloha Baker will present an illustrated lecture, "India Now," in College auditorium at 8:15 p. m. today, according to S. E. Crowe, lecture series chairman.

Recognized as the world's most traveled woman, she has lived in 85 foreign countries while gathering material for her series of talks and movies. Since America's entry in the war Mrs. Baker has devoted all of her time to portraying the life of the allies and their various efforts toward victory.

### To Show Indian Culture

Tonight's lecture was planned by Mrs. Baker and her husband to illustrate the vital issues and complications involved in Indian independence. She will discuss the political, religious and educational phases of the question, and show films taken while observing life in India from the palaces of princes and mahals to the hovels and huts of untouchables.

Also treated in "India Now" is the surprising volume of Indian war production, which includes steel ships, armored cars, and shells. The millions of soldiers who have rallied behind the British in supporting the Allied cause are also portrayed. The Bakers emphasize that this is not a scenic travelogue, but rather deals with the people and their basic problems.

### Return Performance

Mrs. Baker has appeared on the Michigan State lecture series several times in the past. Last fall she presented a similar illustrated talk to State students on the part Australia is playing in the war.

The next feature on the regular summer school entertainment series will be the movie, "Alexander Graham Bell," to be shown Saturday night in Fairchild theater. Crowe stated. Playing in the film are Don Ameche and Loretta Young.

Hotel maintenance equipment will be tested for durability in the hotel research laboratory located on the second floor of the power plant, which was dedicated by Pres. John A. Harlan yesterday afternoon in the Sunset room in the Union building.

# Dem Hall Takes Leading Role in New Training Program

Armory Once Housed Lecture Series, Farmers Week

Demonstration hall, the home of Michigan State ROTC and temporary offices for the armed forces on campus, includes the story of the expansion of State in its history.

The original Armory was located on the site of the new Music building and was used as a center for campus activities and as headquarters for the military department.

**Armory Built in 1886**  
The Armory was built in 1886 under the direction of Lt. J. A. Leavelle, first professor of military science at Michigan State.

Michigan State is the oldest land grant college, and was one of the first colleges to establish an ROTC unit. The building was low and covered with a tar and gravel floor that gave forth such disagreeable odors that often lectures and concerts had to be cancelled, and later a maple floor was put in to do away with this problem.

**New Building Needed**  
As the college enrollment increased there was a demand for a larger building in which to hold lectures, athletic events, and commencement and a new building was planned to include room for these activities besides ROTC classrooms.

In 1926 plans for the new Armory were started under the supervision of Colonel Sherburne, former head of the military department but it was not until January, 1928 that actual construction got under way. Italian Architecture

The new building was of modern Italian architecture and enclosed more than 30,000 square feet of floor space including general buildings and military headquarters, rifle range, assembly hall and classrooms.

The interior dimensions are 215 feet by 100 feet which is five feet longer than Madison Square Garden in New York City. Fieldhouse seating capacity in balconies is about 400 and with added bleachers 6,000 can be accommodated.

**Giant Structure**  
At the time of its construction, the new building was considered the largest structure ever to be built in Lansing. It was also considered a great distance from all other campus buildings since

present expansion was not for seen. Demonstration hall was dedicated on the 70th anniversary of Founders day, Friday, May 13, 1928. The military department under Colonel Sherburne, moved in immediately upon its completion in the early fall.

**First Commencement**  
Commencement exercises in 1928 were held under an open sky with half completed brick walls. The expansion of the military department is best reviewed by Capt. James H. Atchison who has been connected with the department since 1919. Capt. Atchison, known for many years as "Sarge Atchison", was raised to captaincy last summer.

When Capt. Atchison came here the ROTC courses offered included infantry, coast artillery and cavalry. Field artillery unit was established in 1935 and last year Signal and Quartermaster corps were added.

**Students More Interested**  
Student interest in military classes and activities have grown with the facilities that Dem hall offered, according to Captain Atchison.

The new building rated high in government inspection and was put on the star unit list—a list of the best military departments of the 48 land grant colleges.

Maj. J. P. Thompson, '28, professor of military science, said that there is a distinct difference in students who took ROTC in previous years as compared with today. Students now have much more self confidence, they take better care of their uniforms and show more pride in wearing them.

**To Be Called Sherburne Hall**  
When the building was dedicated it was suggested that it be called Sherburne Hall in honor of Colonel Sherburne who was instrumental in having it built. But because of its use for demonstration activities during Farmers' Week, it became known as Demonstration Hall.

With the building of the Auditorium and Jensen Fieldhouse many events that formerly took place in Dem Hall were moved into the newer buildings.

**Still Has Many Uses**  
The huge, dirt-floored fieldhouse is still the practice place for military drill, cavalry and coed riding classes, the scene of the installation of Corps sponsors, field for polo teams, and home of horse shows. Some Farmers' Week demonstrations are still held there.

caused by experts in the fields of chemical warfare and bomb defense.

A demonstration on the correct use of firearms will be presented by the Michigan state police. A laboratory session, to be held during the noon hour, will show methods of decontamination after gas attacks.

Military cooperation in bombing emergencies, extended protection for industrial plants, and dealing with fire and incendiary bombs will be among the leading topics of the conference.

C. W. Muehlberger, director of the college crime detection laboratory, Elmer Leminger, professor of chemistry at State, George McConkey, professor of architecture at the University of Michigan, and Lt. Col. S. Preston Smith, regional facilitating security officer of the sixth service command, are included in the program.

State's coaches are somewhat handicapped because none of the approximate 3,000 army students on the campus are permitted to play intercollegiate sports, because of an army ruling.

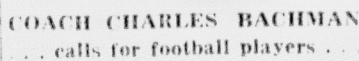
Many schools, including Michigan, have naval cadets and trainees to select from, for the navy allows its men to compete in such sports, as does the marine corps.
