

LONDON, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Red army cut the last

The Germans faced one of their greatest disasters since Stalingrad, where Field Marshal Gen, Friedrich Von Paulus's sixth army of 350,000 was lost, The Nazi Crimean forces are believed to number less than that, since some have been evacuated, Berlin says

Gen. Feodor Tolbukhin's victorious fourth Ukraine army drove five miles ahead into both narrow corridors linking the Ctimea with the mainland, on the northwest at Perekop, and on the northeast at Novo-Alekseyevka, said the Moscow broadcast bulletin.


