Russians Take More Towns in Kiev Area

Soviets Sweep Through 60 Hamlets to Arrive Near Rail Center

LONDON, Nov. 10 (AP). Russian forces, surging west and south of captured Kiev swept into 60 more towns and hamlets to reach within 35 miles of the rail city of Zhitomir today as their armored artillery with a captured enemy 20 yards, pumpled the sagging German line without firing.

Despite rain, cold and fog the Russians drove 60 miles from Kiev to capture Khorosheva, 35 miles southeast of Zhitomir, while another force swept into Komarovka, 40 miles southeast of strategic Korostyiv, and 40 miles northeast of Zhitomir, Moscow announced tonight.

To the south, Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's forces smashed to Vasilev, 33 miles south of Kiev and only 20 miles northeast of the rail junction of Belyaya Tserkov. This column appeared to be aiming at a junction with the Russians west of the Dniester near Perevalsk.

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* SOUTHWEST PACIFIC ALLIED HQ, Thursday, Nov. 11 (AP). United States Marines again have the situation "well in hand" on Bougainville after killing an estimated half of the Japanese force which landed north of their beachhead, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's spokesman said today.

The Japanese were beaten decisively two days ago in a battle fought along the Taruma river four miles north of the marine invasion position of Cape Torokina on the west-central coast of Bougainville.

Only the day before the first large-scale Japanese air attack on the marine beachhead had resulted in heavy losses to the invaders.

Today's advances from MacArthur's headquarters listed losses of 67 Japanese planes in all sectors of the southwest (MacArthur) and south (Halsey) command areas.

Rabaul, the New Britain seaport stronghold on which Japan relies heavily to preserve its Bougainville position, was raided at night by Mitchell medium bombers, the communique said, and MacArthur's air arm hit the Japanese at Alexishaden.

Nazis Thrust Nine Charges on Americans

Enemy Attempts to Hold Ground 'At All Costs' Heavy Snows Begin

ALLIED HQ, ALLIED HQ, Nov. 10 (AP). Under orders to hold their present Italian line at all costs "for at least eight weeks," German forces are launching a new counterattack against American infantry and massed artillery in the mountainous Venetian area, the Allied command announced today.

The reinforced Nazis thrust nine charges, but unsavory charges against the redoubtable Americans within 24 hours in a desperate effort to check the Allied advance on their new Gargano river bridge river positions.

German Thrown Back

Each time they were thrown back with heavy casualties. By Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's fighting doughboys and by terrific artillery barrages that ripped up the mountainides.

Snow already had begun to fall in the Apennines, and conditions were the worst under which the Allies had fought since they invaded Italy.

The weather seriously cut down on the activity of Allied fighters and fighter bombers over the battle front, but heavy flying fortresses and Liberators of the new 15th army air force battered a half and roller bearing works at Villa Poma.

Papers Taken

Documents taken from captured Germans confirmed that the enemy has picked up the present front across Italy, some 70-80 miles from Rome, as a "winter line" and has ordered it held at all costs for "at least eight weeks."

The 11 Nazi divisions entrusted with the task were putting up stiff resistance everywhere.

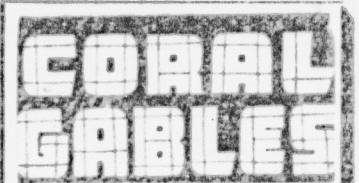

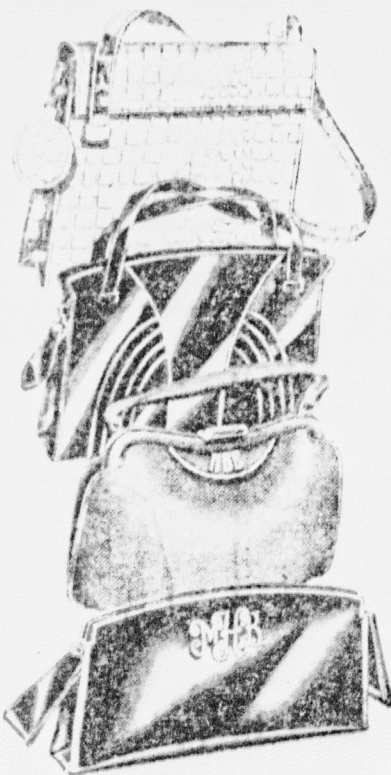

As part of a nation-wide effort to recruit 65,000 student nurses this year for wartime replacements, Mrs. Mary Taylor Swoboda, representative for the National Nursing Council for War Service and the United States Cadet Nurse corps, will be on campus today to interview possible applicants and to lecture on the opportunities for college women in nursing.

Following a luncheon given by the Student Nurses Association, Mrs. Swoboda will set for her interviewees from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. in the CNA office where she will interview students interested in nursing. The cadet nurse corps is a new government plan which offers the U. S. Public Health Service offers a free professional education for qualified students.

At 7:30 tonight, Mrs. Swoboda will lecture at the Home Economics building, Room 101, on the opportunities for college women in nursing. The lecture will be given in the Home Economics building, Room 101, at 7:30 p.m.

Mrs. Swoboda is a graduate of Mount Holyoke college at South Hadfield, Mass., and of the Yale School of Nursing. She has also served as psychiatric and medical nurse at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, Md.

He said that consideration would be given to transportation equipment, farm machinery and tools, washing machines, refrigerators and other household essentials.

Crystal Gazing Students Try to Forecast End of War

Today is Armistice day, and no one can say that war has not struck MSC. Today, State is practically a military camp with over 3,000 men following a war training program.

Olive drab overcoats, the campus, but the shadow is not foreboding. For, college 1943 style, still prevails.

Ice cream, football games and parties are still in evidence, as are the girl and the hawk box, led by GI cadets. And there are still color dates and athletic events.

Predicts Long War

But everyone is asking when will the war be over? That question is the most important controversy on campus. But as most Jeanne Barron, Birmingham junior, put it, "We will have to realize that Germany won't come marching home the minute an armistice is signed. For demobilization will take a lot longer than it did in the last war."

Beverly Smith, Detroit sophomore, said that she believes the European phase will be over next summer, but that "we will have to make outstanding gains in the Pacific area before we can even hope for the war there to be in our favor."

Agreeing with her, Pfc. Bob Barron, former junior ROTC in the cavalry, predicted that the end of the war points toward 1945, especially if the war in the Pacific turns from a passive to an active standpoint. Barron said, "I also believe that one of the jobs of the men in the AST will be instruction and police patrol duty overseas after the war."

Too Optimistic

"People seem to be too optimistic," Sue Averill, Birmingham sophomore, said. "I don't

believe that the war will be over next year as so many think, and the way things are going in the capital, I feel that the peace will last at least a few more years. The only way we can lick Germany and Japan by invading both countries, this certainly can't be done next year."

"The Moscow conference is a definite step toward the end of the war," Prof. George F. Brown, head of the animal husbandry department, said. "But, I think, it is a mistake to think that Russia will be the main ally after the war for we will be content with what we have."

Russia Has Upper Hand

Cherry Nowlin, Lansing sophomore, says that "The war of Germany will last until the end of next summer, and at that time an Allied compromise with Russia will definitely be made. Russia should be the upper hand in Europe."

A. Jim Meisker, Lansing ROTC cavalryman, said:

"There is a long hard battle ahead, and we have to back everything we can. We can start to predict the end of the war. The German fighting for their life will not crack or give up until as is hoped. The German a lot of power harnessing, it's too bad that that power not be harnessed for the good of civilization."
