Russians Take More Towns in Kiev Area

Soviets Sweep Through 60 Hamlets to Arrive Near Rail Center

LONDON, Nov. 10 (AP)—Russian forces, sweeping west and south of captured Kiev, swept into 60 more towns and hamlets to reach with 60-75 miles of the railway of Zhitomir today as their mobile artillery, with a gun barrel every 20 yards, pounded the opposing German line without letup.

Despite rain, cold and fog the Russians drove the miles from Kiev to capture Khotivtsia, 14 miles southeast of Zhitomir, while another force went from Komarov, 40 miles southwest of Kiev, to capture 10 more southern points of strategic importance, and 10 miles northeast of Zhitomir. Moscow announced tonight:

To the south, Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's forces advanced to Vasylyev, 33 miles south of Kiev and only 20 miles northeast of the rail junction of Bychava-Terekov. This column appeared to be moving at a junction with the Russians west of the Dnieper near Pereyaslav.

The 50 men of World War I, for whom the Union building was originally built to honor, are long forgotten memories, and the fight to "free the world from democracy" was only a beginning phase in the present conflict.

Today classes will not be exonerated, and no one will pause to honor the dead, because each person is too busy getting his work done in order to go out and do his share in helping the living.

Even though a silence will not

encompass the campus at 11 a.m., the minds of the present student generation can just revert to the memory of the 50 men of Michigan State who have given their lives in "God's War," as Joe Louis has named the second half of the World War.

Worldwide Service
Former State men are in nearly every corner of the world, in all branches of service, and performing all manner of feats.

Lt. Howard M. Dunham, '40, now a prisoner, was awarded the air medal for exceptionally meritorious service before his capture. Capt. Seymour G. Knight, '41, was killed in the United States after receiving the same decoration following his trip as pilot on the ship which flew Prime Minister Churchill to Mos-

cow. Lt. Richard Bush, '41, and posthumously by Maj. Carl Sig

Capt. Seymour Yester, also received the silver star.

Lt. Bruce Mainstone, '41, has received the DFC, as did Capt. Herbert Barnum, '41, and Lt. Robert R. Finch, '42. The air medal

has also been awarded to Lt. Harvey M. Seeley, '40, and Lt.

Frank V. Burrows, '40, of the army; Ensign Anne W. Haywood, '37, navy service; Lt. Harry Burnside, '42; Capt. Robert Zantz, '39; Capt. Leon Williamson, '39, and to James A. Gibbs, '38.

Capt. Merwyn C. Plumley, '37, has been awarded the Navy Cross for heroism in action, following his service in the U. S. marines.

Nazis Thrust Nine Charges on Americans

Enemy Attempts to Hold Ground At All Costs; Heavy Snows Begin

A LITTLE HDQ., ALGIERS, Nov. 10 (AP)—Under orders to hold their precious Italian line at all costs for at least eight weeks, German forces are launching savage counterattacks against American infantry and massed artillery in the mountainous Venetia area, the Allied command announced today.

The reinforced Nazis fueled nine charges, but a smothering charge against the treacherous Americans within 24 hours in a desperate effort to check the Allied advance on their new Giglio bridge over Sangro River, operations.

Germans Thrown Back

Each time they were thrown back with heavy casualties. At last, Gen. Mackie, MacArthur's fighting doughboys, and his terrible artillery barrages, that ripped up the mountainsides,

knew already had begun to fall in the Apennines, and conditions were the worst under which the Allies had fought since they invaded Italy.

The weather seriously cut down on the activity of Allied fighters and fighter bombers over the battle front, but heavy Flying Fortress and Liberators of the new 15th army air force battered a ball and roller near the works at Villa Perosa.

Papers Taken

Documents taken from captured Germans confirmed that the enemy has picked his present front across Italy, some 70-80 miles from Rome as a "winter line" and has ordered it held at all costs for at least eight weeks.

The 11 Nazi divisions engaged with 500,000 men were putting up stiff resistance everywhere.

Bears Rate No. 1 in Total Offense

CHICAGO, Nov. 10 (AP)—It was bound to happen sooner or later—and last weekend it did. The Washington Redskins took over back in their passing game and the Green Bay Packers sold their receivers in their ground attack. But the Chicago Bears had another field day and for the fourth time this season came up with supreme success for the solid and efficient team of coach George Halas.

Outgated out by one start the other by the Packers on Red's 10th consecutive win, the Bears' total offense No. 1 in total offense, each meeting ending with 334 yards in gains, first marching with 164 yards a game and foremost in passing with 214 yards each contest.
