Aussies Thrust Ahead in Drive Toward Jap Base at Sattelberg

SOUTHWEST PACIFIC ALLIED HQ, Saturday, Nov. 20 (AP)—Australians driving northwest of Finschhafen, New Guinea, have battled to within a mile of Japanese jungle concentrations at Sattelberg, it was announced today by General MacArthur.

The enemy's troops offered bitter opposition but the Aussies were aided by Mitchell and Marauder planes which dropped 44 tons of explosives on the Japanese.

On the western flank of the Pacific land offensive, there were air battles over the Bougainville beachhead held by Americans at Empress Augusta bay during which 16 Nipponese planes were reported shot down at a cost of two Allied interceptors.

"Claudia" will again be presented this afternoon at 2:15 and this evening at 8:15.

Mrs. Dillingham, East Lansing senior, in the leading role of Claudia, romped through the first two acts always in character and holding the audience at her fingertips every moment of the time. In her dramatic scenes in the last act Mrs. Dillingham was excellent, although many of the dramatic scenes were carried by her alone.

Playing the role of David Naughton was William White, Detroit freshman. His acting, although not as professional as that of Mrs. Dillingham, was well done, and he did a fine job of the characterization of the patient and long-suffering husband of a screwball wife such as Claudia.

Four bell performances for her interpretation of Dariuschka, the Russian opera star, goes to Nancy Blue, Detroit junior. Miss Blue was never out of character with her Russian accent, dramatic gestures and facial expressions. She provided a good bit of the play's comedy.

Anne Osgood, East Lansing freshman, showed herself a professional in her handling of the role of Mrs. Brown, Claudia's mother. The role, although one of the play's heavier ones, called for a lightness of touch, which Mrs. Osgood gave to it expertly.

William Tietheke, Escanaba sophomore, who was not only "English but British" in the role of Jerry Seymour, English novelist, aided by his Australian accent, gave the right touch to his role, and he seemed at perfect ease behind the footlights.

Other supporting roles were played by Mildred Van Westrienen as Julia Naughton, the sophisticated sister-in-law of Claudia; Barbara Lipton, Bainbridge, N. Y., junior, as Bertha; and Paul Wegner, Hartland freshman, as Fritz, the German servant couple of the Naughtons. Both actors did good characterizations complete with authentic German accents.

Pétain Offers Resignation as Protest

French Leader's Attempt to Form Constitution Checked by Vichy

BERN, Switzerland, Nov. 19 (AP)—Information leak-

ing across the French frontier tonight said that a number of Marshal Pétain's close friends, including three generals, had been arrested after the 87-year-old chief of state offered his resignation in protest against thwarting his plan to promulgate a democratic constitution.

"Vichy France"—which meant Pétain and the German—was said to be exerting every effort to keep Pétain in office.

A speech which Pétain intended to make over the radio, which was barred by the Germans, would have been an attempt to renounce Pétain as his successor, and put power in the hands of a national assembly, trusted advisers said.

Among other things, the edict prepared for broadcasting, abrogated all acts by Pétain's government, which has collaborated with the Germans. It directed France back to the democratic constitution of 1875 and declared the marshal intended to conserve his power until his death, after which the power would be returned to the national assembly, unless the new constitution he desired came into effect.

German Attacks Force Reds Back from Zhitomir

LONDON, Nov. 19 (AP)—A massive German counterattack gave the Russians their first major setback in their four-month-old offensive today, forcing Red army units to evacuate Zhitomir, important rail junction 85 miles west of Kiev where the Russians had reached farthest westward and posed their greatest threat to the Germans.

The Moscow daily communiqué said Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's first Ukrainian army, which earlier had taken the Ovruch rail junction 25 miles north of Korosten with air-borne troops, gave up Zhitomir in the face of Nazi pressure and occupied other positions "more advantageous" for defense.

But despite the Russian retreat before what appeared to be largely a German defensive offensive to protect their communications, General Vatutin's northern flank and Gen. Constantin Rokossovsky's White Russian armies scored successes.

State Board Accepts Lithographing Press, Money, Resignations

Two gifts for Michigan State college were accepted by the State board of agriculture, governing board of the college, at the meeting Wednesday. Karl H. McDonel, secretary, stated yesterday.

Two presses and accessories from Franklin DeKleine company, Lansing printers, were presented to the college art department. One was a lithograph press and the other a Washington hand press.

The other gift was \$500 from the Institute of American Poultry Industries for the poultry produce research fund.

Replacing Ralph May, who resigned effective Dec. 31, as assistant state club leader, Verne A. Freeman's appointment was approved by the board, according to McDonel.

The second appointment accepted by the board was that of Philip A. McClosky as assistant editor in the department of publications. McClosky comes from the Press-Gazette at Green Bay, Wis.

Among the resignations approved by the board, McDonel said, were those of May, George Alderton, and Scott S. Pauley. Alderton, sports editor of the Lansing State Journal, left the college faculty as part-time sports publicity director.

Pauley, who has accepted a commission in the navy, was formerly instructor in geology and geography.

Anthony Lists Results of Placement Bureau

During the summer State placed 66,000 persons on Michigan farms, Dean Ernest Anthony stated. A. B. Love of the agriculture engineering department was in charge of the project.

This afternoon the eight candidates will be introduced at the Union board-sponsored tea dance at 3:30. Although disqualified from the final race, the remaining 12 women originally in the race will serve in the court of the Mardi Gras queen, Nov. 27.

Collections for the finals will start after the tea dance today, and the money already deposited will count toward the final selection. The voting closes at 7 p. m. Friday.

Four More Aegean Islands Occupied by Nazi Forces

LONDON, Nov. 19 (AP)—The Germans claimed the occupation of four more pinpoint Aegean islands today in a creeping counteroffensive along the sea line before Greece, while the Allied air arm fell with methodical violence across the Balkans from Salonika to the Yugoslav coast.

Adolf Hitler's command announced a victory following its recovery of the Dodecanese islands of Cos and Leros and seizure of the outlying islets of Patmos, Icaria and Lipsos, the military significance of which is not clear.

The situation on the more important island of Samos, the last in the Aegean to remain under Allied standards, was in doubt, but German broadcasts indicated Allied resistance there was still strong and implied that some of the Allied forces taken off Cos and Leros had gone in to support the Samos garrison.

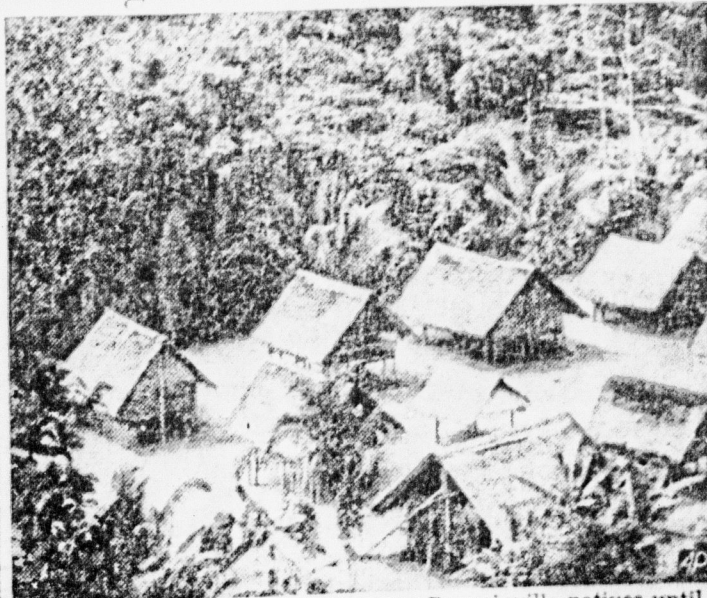
