Flu Epidemic Causes Cancellation of All Social Events

Aussie Jungle Troops Close Around Jap Base at Wareo

MacArthur's Bombers Score at New Britain

S. W. PACIFIC ALLIED HDQ., Saturday, Dec. 4 (AP)—Australian jungle troops, supported by artillery, are closing in on Wareo, a Japanese stronghold on the Huon peninsula of northeastern New Guinea.

Wareo is inland approximately 11 miles northwest of coastal Finschhafen, the base which the Allies captured Oct. 2.

Take Strongholds

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announcing the latest progress today, said the Aussies were mopping up on enemy strong points along the track which leads from Allied Wau Bonga on the coast north to Finshhafen westward to Wareo.

To the east, just across narrow isthmus on the peninsula, MacArthur's bombers continued to hit targets on New Britain in areas of that important enemy island which is most vulnerable to invasion.

84 Tons Dropped

For the second straight day, Bergen bay's dumps and supply bases were the targets. Sixty-three tons of explosives were dropped by Mitchell medium bombers which flew as low as the tops of the trees.

Bergen bay is on the north shore near New Britain's western tip.

In the northern Solomons, the bombers of Adm. William F. Halsey hit the enemy's Kara air-drome on an island just off the Bougainville and the Ballale air-drome on an island just off the coast with 57 tons of bombs. These enemy bases have been bypassed by Americans now holding a beachhead at Empress Augusta Bay.

Institute Will Offer Women Training as Engineering Aides

Opportunities for women interested in becoming engineering aides are being offered by General Motors corporation in Flint, according to Prof. Tom King, placement office head.

Women who will graduate in December or graduates of the past four or five years are preferred, although the only requirements are one year or more of college and an average of C or better.

Candidates will go through 15 weeks of intensive training in fundamental engineering subjects at the General Motors institute in Flint.

Those taking the course, which begins in January, will be paid a salary during the training period, King added. The program includes lectures, supervised study, and introduction to shop and factory methods.

Miss Moehlman won the women's final with her presentation of "Broken Chains," while Kamins' "Post War Realism" took first place among the men.

ALLIED HDQ., ALGIERS—elaborate, well-prepared German fortifications, Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's fifth army stabbed forward from Salerno to against the right flank of massed German troops in the fourth day of the biggest Italian offensive since Salerno.

Great clouds of smoke and dust hung over the battlefield. Air force pilots participating in the methodical destruction of enemy gun positions and entrenched areas of American and British forces saw signs of a fierce combat raging below.

Official accounts gave no indication whether Clark's troops yet had reached the hard core of the Nazi line.

Equally bitter fighting raged on the eighth army front where the right wing of Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's British, Indian and New Zealand forces surged six more miles up the Adriatic coast.

They approached the important highway and railroad center of San Vito Chietino, only 16 miles from the big port of Pescara.

The Germans had reorganized their defenses farther inland and were resisting desperately around the ancient Roman city of Lanciano, where they held a 900-foot ridge dominating the surrounding country. Montgomery's men captured Castel Frentano, two and one-half miles southwest of Lanciano.

La Guardia OKs Subsidy

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—Mayor La Guardia of New York fought to save the government's tottering food subsidy program today.

The peppery little executive of the nation's largest city told the senate banking committee the food costs have shot up 39 per cent in New York since 1941.

Open Letters Cite Spanish Aid to Nazis

Gil Robles' Letters Reveal Outright Assistance to Hinder British

LONDON, Dec. 3 (AP)—Open letters—one of which charges the Spanish government with outright war aid to the Germans, including assistance to U-boats—are being circulated in Spain, demanding the resignation of Generalissimo Francisco Franco, and restoration of the monarchy to save the nation from grave consequences of pro-German policy.

Outstanding among these letters, said information reaching London from inside Spain, are two letters written by Jose Maria Gil Robles, former leader of the federation of rightist parties now living in Portugal.

In them, Gil Robles asserts that the Spanish government had supplied German submarines in Spanish waters, placed bombs in British ships in Spanish ports, and installed wireless stations near Gibraltar to "advise German submarines of movements of Allied convoys."

Gil Robles declared it was ridiculous to assume that the Allies would leave the Franco regime in power once Nazism and Fascism were crushed, and that restoration of the monarchy was the only way to avoid "an approaching catastrophe."

Letter Reaches London

If Spain "goes to the peace table under the present political situation, her seat will be on the bench of the conqueror," he said.

One of Gil Robles' letters reached London. Others circulating in Spain were from members of the two leading monarchist groups.

Servicemen's Voting to Be Under State Control House Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—A coalition of Republicans and southern Democrats, overriding the senate leadership, today jettisoned the idea of federal supervision of servicemen's voting by absentee ballot and passed a bill calling for state control.

The new bill, substituted for the pending measure on a 42 to 37 rollcall and finally approved by a voice vote, calls on the states to make ballots available to members of the armed forces at home and abroad.

Democratic leader Barkley (Ky.) immediately condemned it as "a pious ladies aid society resolution."

Senators McClellan (D-Ark.) and Eastlund (D-Minn.), asserted that the substitute which now goes to the house would retain state control over elections.

Big Three Offers 'Give Up or Die' to Nazi Leaders

LONDON, Dec. 3 (AP)—The Berlin radio declared today that the conference between President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin has been completed at the Persian city of Tabriz, and that a Christmas ultimatum to Germany to "give up or die" had been agreed upon.

Crediting dispatches from a variety of sources, including "Reuters circles in Lisbon," the busy Axis propaganda machine, which was the first to report a tri-power meeting actually underway, asserted that an official communiqué from the conference would be issued tomorrow.

It will again call for the scrapping of the Nazi party and unconditional surrender by Germany. Allied circles scouted predictions that any official declaration would come so soon, considering the time lag between previous conferences and their official announcements.

There was no disposition to doubt that an historic meeting of the "big three" was in progress.

Saturday, Dec. 4 (AP)—Mud-spattered Red army troops cut into the important German railway network northwest of Gomel in two directions yesterday, stood firm against repeated Nazi counterattacks in the hotly-contested Chernassy area and expanded their Dnieper river bridgehead below Kremenchug 15 miles to the west through powerfully defended territory, Moscow announced early today.



RAF Air Armadas Rock Berlin In Fifth Smashing Assault

All of City Probably Wrecked by Latest Blow

LONDON, Dec. 3 (AP)—RAF air armadas rocked Berlin in a blasting new assault last night with more than 200 tons of new fire bombs and explosives, leaving nearly half the Nazi capital's buildings in ruins, and the city center section of the city in flames.

Swarms of German fighters came to meet the four groups to meet the four bombers along their route as far as 50 miles from Berlin, and 41 British planes were shot down during the great battle. Bombs pierced by hundreds of incendiaries and split into three flak.

Flames around the wreckage of the city scattered through Berlin last night after this fifth major assault in two weeks.

Assuming that Reichsmar-

chancellor Goering could do nothing to stop the great force of bombers reaching the heart of Germany shortly after 10 p.m., incendiaries cascading down in clouds of high explosives

and incendiaries of phosphorous

burned in 30 minutes.

British reports estimated that

most of Berlin was gone

by morning and Nov. 26,

including last night's blow

of incendiaries, half the city

had been blown up or gutted.

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Bulgarian Armies Revolt Against German Heads

LONDON, Dec. 3 (AP)—A break in morale and revolt among some of Germany's Bulgarian mercenaries helping Hitler's battle in Yugoslavia was reported today by the Yugoslav partisans as they fought on against Nazi legions being constantly reinforced for a showdown along the eastern Adriatic.

A broadcast communiqué from Gen. Josip Broz (Tito) declared that on the Serbian-Bosnian frontier, Bulgarian soldiers had refused orders of their German commanders to fight, and that the Nazis had disarmed an entire battalion of Bulgarians in one instance.

London—although considering the possibility of exaggeration—received the news with interest, for it could represent a crack in the dam Hitler has built to keep the Allied flood out of the Balkans.
