Farm Bloc Group Urge Senate Vote on Subsidy Bill

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—Changes in legislation to speed the administration's food subsidy program neared an end today as the senate banking committee voted to pass a farm bloc sponsored bill before the Christmas holidays.

The bill, which would force a senate vote on the bill before the Christmas holidays, would speed action on the bill by the administration and would also delay action in the house approved by the senate until after a vote on the bill, with the franking privilege hope that a visit to the senate would convince wavering members that there is a dominant farm bloc in the line on the bill.

The bill, the plea of Senator Charles McNary, that the senate should pass a "cooling off" bill, which would allow the Senate Banking Committee (D-Mo.) to delay action on the bill until after a vote on the bill, and a farm bloc member, who said the public would be a close ahead of the bill, and announced he would introduce a committee action on the bill before the week end.

The bill would succeed in the senate, however, the ranking members of the committee also are on the committee, currently working on the new tax bill.

Hiller Faces Possible Loss of Bulgarian Aid

LONDON, Dec. 9 (AP)—German troops engaged by Yugoslav partisans in a fight for the approaches to the only interior communication lines covering the whole length of the Balkan peninsula—were confronted today with maneuverings in Bulgaria suggesting the possibility of Hitler's early loss of that ally.

At the Yugoslav partisans of Marshal Josip Broz (Tito) were stubbornly to check Nazi and Marshal Erwin Rommel's offensive in Bosnia, dislodging to neutral countries and of peace demonstrations.

Red Tanks Repulse Nazis in Kiev Area

Turkey Controls Strategic Positions

Low Allied Shipping Losses Credited to Use of Bases in Portugal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—Allied merchant ship losses in November were the lowest of any month since May, 1940, President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill said tonight, adding that the number of U-boats destroyed exceeded the number of ships lost as was the case in the three preceding months.

Their joint statement, issued here and in London, said use of bases in the Azores, allowed by Portugal under an ancient treaty with Britain, contributed greatly to the month's success in the anti-submarine war.

They called this success "notable" because the Germans had exerted "great effort" in concentrating U-boats against them.

The communique was the first official disclosure that the Azores bases had been fitted out and were in operation. Portugal's consent to their use was announced by Prime Minister Churchill on Oct. 12.

No numerical total of ships lost or U-boats destroyed in November was given. More than 150 U-boats were wiped out in the previous six months.

High School Seniors May Enroll at State for Special Course

High school seniors graduating from Michigan schools in January will be able to enter Michigan State Feb. 1, 1944, R. S. Linton, registrar, announced yesterday.

By entering college then, the students may earn from six to nine credits in English, mathematics, history or chemistry, Linton said.

The students, taking a special orientation and classification program on the first, will begin classes Feb. 2.

Their transcript of first semester senior year grades should be sent to the registrar's office now, and final grades can be brought when the prospective freshman enters.

Germans Suffer Heavy Losses in Tight Battle

LONDON, Dec. 9 (AP)—The Red army smashed to within 18 miles of the industrial center of Kirovograd today in a five-mile gain which tightened its annihilation loop around the pocketed rail hub of Znamenka in the Dnieper river bend.

West of Kiev in the Chernyakhov sector, where one of the biggest tank battles of the war was raging, the Russians repulsed large-scale German tank and infantry counterattacks, Moscow announced in its communique tonight.

Moscow dispatches said more than 5,000 Germans had been killed and approximately 200 enemy tanks destroyed by Soviet gunners during the last three days in that explosive area where Axis forces are trying to achieve a mass breakthrough toward Kiev on the middle Dnieper.

The Germans were reported pouring into battle their tank and infantry reserve drawn from Germany, the Netherlands, Poland and even Italy, spending them lavishly in a supreme effort to regain a part of their lost Dnieper line and relieve enormous Soviet pressure on the Axis fronts in White Russia and in the Dnieper bend.

Both sides have lines in considerable depth, and with slightly improving weather the Red air force should be able soon to bring its heavily armored Stormovik straining planes into devastating use.

Chinese Recover Changteh in Rush Against Invaders

CHUNGKING, Dec. 9 (AP)—Chinese forces under Gen. Yu Cheng Wan, the "Hero of Changteh," recaptured that stricken city in particularly bloody fighting early this morning and moved on to push the Japanese invaders back from China's vital "rice bowl" region.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's headquarters announced General Yu's victory in returning to avenge his 57th division. The division was wiped out except for 300 men in its 15-day defense of the city that fell to the Japanese Dec. 3.

Chinese forces north of the Yuan river in the Panchiapi sector, northwest of Changteh, were attacking the Japanese who are already showing "signs of weakening," said a headquarters bulletin.

During last night, a pitched battle was fought on the south shore of the Yuan river, and the Chinese succeeded in crossing after inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy.

U. S. air power in China co-operated with the ground forces throughout the entire action, attacking communications and troop concentrations, bombing military objectives and dropping supplies to the Chinese forces.

THIS time the jokes on us. The suggestion was made in this column early this fall that Michigan State college ends donate their junk jewelry to be used by American soldiers in bartering with the natives in the South Pacific and North Africa areas.

CJC got to work and organized such a drive, picking up trinkets from the women in dorms and sorority houses in a drive such as other schools were conducting.

Now the army tells us that they don't want discarded jewelry for barter in overseas theaters and will not accept such collections. Such drives have been dubbed by the war department as just another program of "patriotic but misinformed individuals."

Offers of jewelry gifts were inspired by reports from North Africa and South Pacific telling of success in some cases by individual soldiers in bartering old jewelry with natives.

The actual facts as reported by the war department show that in these places nearly all transactions are carried on by the use of food, medical supplies and other provisions as exchange media.

Another "white horse" campaign included a drive to collect barbers' shavers and barber chairs for the army, and the army couldn't find a place for them.

Other "misguided" patriots went to great trouble collecting hunting knives which were not needed and turned out to be an unnecessary sacrifice on the part of the donors.

Some gift drives have been highly acceptable to the army and the top rank of all on the list goes to the donation of blood as sponsored by the Red Cross.

Last spring the war department collected 200,000 weapons including shotguns, target rifles and pistols to be used by guards at war plants and military installations.

Other gifts such as books, furniture and magazines, for soldiers' families and gifts of money to be used to purchase ambulances, training and combat planes, and their telephones have been made by larger groups and welcomed by the army.

The moral of the story is don't give the army anything until it asks for it because unnecessary and unwanted contributions will only clutter up.

Oriental to Present Third Talk on Policy of Jap Warfare

Shun Chang Lee, professor of oriental studies, will present the third of his series of four lectures on an analysis of Japan's military policy tonight at 7 p. m. in Music auditorium.

Dealing with the background of Japanese aggression, Lee will break his topic into sections on components beginning with Japan's policy of expansion back as 1911.

His series will continue with the Twenty-one Demands, Japan's move of China in 1937, various diplomatic moves, the Tanaka memorial of 1927 and a gradual building to Japanese plans of world conquest.

The oriental professor will make his final lecture Friday, Dec. 17.

LONDON, Friday, Dec. 10 (AP)—Edvard Benes, president of the Czechoslovak provisional government, has arrived in Russia. Czech circles said tonight Benes is expected to sign a pact with Russia which will have important repercussions on the post-war central European set-up.

Navy Units Report Attack on Nauru

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—The navy announced tonight that "strong forces" attacked Nauru island with carrier aircraft and naval bombardment Wednesday.

Nauru, 330 miles west of the Gilberts, is the second enemy position to feel heavy attacks within recent days. Strong carrier task forces have also bombed the Marshalls.

Nauru is in the middle of a mid-ocean sea way between the recently captured Gilberts and the American position at Christmas. It has the advantage of being a good observation post from which to watch ship movements in the district and from the great Japanese naval base at Truk west to the north and west.

Tonight's communiqué suggested that Nauru was coming in for the same kind of heavy shelling as has been given the Japanese positions at the Marshalls.

Academic Awards Given to 3 Vets

Three Vet students have been awarded \$50 prizes in recognition of their work during the past year, which ends this term. They are: Stanberry, who is in charge of the presentation, announced yesterday.

"Lefty" Dudge, Bremen, Ind., won the Michigan State Veterinary Medicine association prize as the best senior student.

The Vet faculty paid for the lunch and traveling expenses of the students who won the prizes.

Congress Passes Bill to Permit Immense Naval Expenditures

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—The House today authorized the navy to spend about \$5,500,000,000 for invasion craft, auxiliary vessels and other ships the senate and house passed separate and almost identical bills for the purpose today.

Members of the naval affairs committees of both houses said the situation was extremely unusual but that one of the two bills would be selected and passed by either the senate or house.

The bill, recommended by Navy Secretary Knox, authorizes expenditures for 2,500,000 tons of auxiliary vessels and 1,000,000 tons of landing and district (patrol) craft.
