### U.S. Planes Land on Yank - Made Russian Bases

LONDON, June 2 (AP)—In a history-making development forging a powerful new link in Allied air superiority, American Flying Fortresses and escorting Mustangs landed on American-made bases in Russia today after bombing Romanian objectives during massive two-way assaults by nearly 3,000 planes of the U.S. air forces.

The bombers, becoming the first Allied planes to complete a shuttle attack on enemy soil and wind up on Soviet soil, apparently flew from Italian bases. A raid on Romania from these bases had been announced earlier by Allied headquarters in the Mediterranean.

From Britain a powerful American blow was delivered against secret Nazi anti-invasion targets along the French Pas De Calais coast.

The American planes after dropping their loads on important junctions on rail lines supplying the Germans at the Russian front were met by American Mustang and Soviet Yak fighters which escorted them to the newly-made bases in Russia.

From Britain a fleet of 1,000 British-based Fortresses and Liberators, with half as many escorting fighters, slammed into the Pas De Calais area with some 3,000 tons of explosives.

Mrs. Raizes will meet today with Mrs. J. Gagner of the Lansing city Pan-Hellenic council and with Dean Elisabeth Conrad, after lunching with the local sorority, their mothers and alums.

### Basic College Department Heads Listed

#### New Curricula Changes Told to Students at Convo Yesterday

Announcing five of the seven heads for the new two-year basic college departments for next year, Pres. John A. Hannah also told a special student convocation yesterday the finer points to the recent reorganization of the college program.

Prof. Paul D. Bagwell, now acting head of speech and dramatics, will take over the department of written and spoken English, Hannah said at the nearly two hour program in College auditorium.

#### Euwema to Head English

The biological science department will be handled by Prof. C. A. Lawson, assistant professor of zoology, and W. R. Fee, now associate professor of history, will direct the social science department.

Prof. Ben Euwema, now acting head of the department of English and director of the language and literature division, will assume directorship of the basic college department of literature of fine arts.

Physical education and effective living are the two remaining departments which have no administrative heads as yet.

#### Only Freshmen Eligible

In a detailed explanation of the forthcoming two-year college program, Hannah explained the differences in the present program as compared to the basic course, and said the regular curriculum will be continued along with this advanced step in educational methods.

### Nazi Troops Push New Wedge in Red Lines

LONDON, June 2 (AP)—Nazi troops, attacking savagely with large forces of tanks and infantry through the fourth day of their battles in the Moldavian province of Romania, have driven another dent into Russian lines northwest of Iasi, Moscow acknowledged tonight.

"An insignificant wedge" was accomplished by the Germans at the cost of heavy losses in manpower and equipment.

### American Forces Shatter Key Nazi Roman Defenses

ALLIED HDQ., Naples, June 2 (AP) — Powerful American armored and infantry forces smashed through the key German strongholds of Valmontone and Velletri in the Alban hills before Rome today, shattering the enemy's last-ditch defenses and foreshadowing the beginning of the end of the battle for the Eternal City.

Valmontone, 20 airline miles from Rome on the Via Casilina, main escape route for the mauled German 10th army retreating from the Hitler line, and Velletri, 18 miles southeast of the Italian capital, fell after days of vicious assault and flaming resistance.

Early tonight fierce fighting was reported still in progress as Lt. Gen. Mark Clark's victorious forces continued to pound back the stubbornly struggling Herman Goering armored division and other crack Nazi units. The Allies held three miles of the Via Casilina.

Capture of Valmontone and severance of the Via Casilina drew the Allied sack tighter on the remnants of what once were 12 German division holding the Gustav and Hitler lines. Less than 18 miles separated Clark's troops from Canadian forces who pounded up the Via Casilina and seized Ferentoni. Caught between the two Allied wings, Marshal Albert Kesselring's battered forces were streaming northward on several secondary roads toward new positions.

### Pope States Need of Early Peace

LONDON, June 2 (AP) — Pope Pius declared today that the idea that the war must end in complete victory or complete destruction is "a stimulant towards prolonging the war," and, expressing hope for an early peace, he praised "the heralds of wisdom and moderation" as against those "who openly espouse vengeance."

Addressing the college of Cardinals on his name day, the Pontiff said, as Allied armies approached Rome, that "whoever dared raise a hand" against the city "would be guilty of matricide," and in a discussion of Christianity's current influence in world affairs he decried "cleavages from the church" and the "vast division and dispersal of religious confessions."

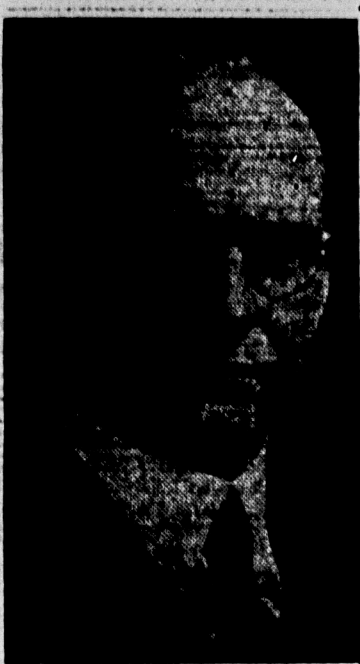

The last of 208 weeks of being a college student will begin Sunday for graduating seniors, with baccalaureate services in College auditorium at 3 p. m. Dr. Wynand Wickers, president of Hope college, will present the address on "The Secret of Creative Freedom," according to Pres. John A. Hannah.

Senior activities follow fast and thick Sunday evening with a College sing by the women's glee club scheduled for the band shell at 7:30 and a senior midnight snack to be held by the tennis courts.

#### Wickers Prominent in State

Dr. Wickers has been president of Hope college since 1931 and has also served as a member of the board of education of Holland city schools, as a member of the library board, and as a member of the state board of education for six years. The University of Michigan conferred upon him an honorary degree of doctor of laws in 1918.

Of the 641 men and women eligible to take part in the baccalaureate service, 230 received degrees last fall and winter terms; 279 will complete graduation requirements by June 10, and 132 expect to finish degree work by the end of summer quarter, Sept. 1.

Baccalaureate service is open to the public without ticket reservations. All seniors will appear in cap and gown, Hannah said.

#### Sing to Be at 7:30 p. m.

The college sing by the women's glee club is under the direction of William R. Sur of the music department. The group will present six numbers: "America the Beautiful," "Alleluia," "Holy, Holy, Holy," "Were You There," "Love's Old Sweet Song," and "Now the Day Is Over."

## German Paratroops Take Headquarters of Marshal Tito

BARI, ITALY, June 2 (Delayed) (AP) — German paratroopers supported by glider-borne infantry swarmed down and captured the Bosnian headquarters of Marshal Tito, May 25 but failed to catch the wily Yugoslav leader, partisan sources disclosed today.

Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, whose whereabouts had been a mystery for weeks, was said to have directed the attack personally.

Tito escaped to the mountains along with Maj. Randolph Churchill, son of the British prime minister, and virtually all Allied officers attached to Tito's staff.

Two Allied correspondents, Stoyan Pribichevich of Time, Life and Fortune magazines, John Talbot of Reuters, and two photographers were captured.

ed in the college may change to the basic curriculum, they can do so only if less than three terms of work have been completed, by seeing Dean Howard Rather.

The administrative changes include an adviser system with John Erickson, formerly of Northwestern university, heading the dean of men's and women's departments and with all students under S. E. Crowe.

**Servicemen Rules Made**  
The new entrance requirements, not stressing course patterns so heavily, will provide returning servicemen who have not finished high school to take comprehensive exams. The veterans bureau will handle these.

Other changes will have Dean Fred Mitchell continuing his work under the title of counselor on men's affairs, with Dean Elisabeth Conrad holding the same position for women.

Finishing up their home baseball schedule today, State will hook up with Romulus air base. The game is the next to last game on the schedule. The contest will be played on old college field and will start at 3 p. m.

With the ill-fated argosy of Decoration day still in their minds the team will be out there plugging to redeem themselves in the eyes of their fans. Only a late offensive burst deprived them of handing the buzz boys a defeat in the first contest.

### Romulus Won Before

The fliers took the measure of the Spartans a few weeks back 9-6. The game was marked by many State miscues, and many of the fliers' runs were unearned. Romulus has displayed steady ball all season, and owing to State's last few debacles they will be cast in the favorite's role.

A severe case of fumbleitis has plagued the Spartans all season, and Coach John Kobs has been working to iron out this important factor in an effort to make a good showing in the last home feature.

### Lineup Unchanged

Unless last minute changes occur the line-up will stay the same, with the exception of Ron Reed, second sacker who has left the team. Bill Turk or Howie Workman will take Reed's place. In case Workman does Web McDonald will move in from right field and take over first.

Dana Costin will be at short, Jack MacCris will be on third, Warren Hennessy will be in left field, Lee Grunst in center, and McDonald in right.

Kobs is undecided about his opening pitcher. Couey, Krestel, or Yarling stand an equal chance of starting the game.

## Tigers Climbing

York, Higgins Wallop Homes to Defeat Red Sox, 4-1

DETROIT, June 2 (AP)—First inning home runs by Rudy York and Pinky Higgins gave the Detroit Tigers a 4 to 1 victory today over the Boston Red Sox in the opener of a four-game series extended Detroit's winning streak to seven games, longest in five seasons.

In a game whose start was delayed half an hour by rain, York and Higgins teed off on Joe Bowman, former national league right-hander who left in the second inning with his third defeat. York connected with Eddie Mayo, who had walked, on base. It was a drive just over the left field barrier and York's fifth round-tripper of the season.

That brought up Higgins, who belted a long homer into the left

center field stands nearly 400 feet from the plate. It was Pinky's third of the season. Higgins singled home the other run in the third.

Gorsica, who shut out the Sox last time he faced them, yielded an unearned run in the third. With two out, Al Unscoer booted Jimmy Bucher's roller at second base, and Pete Fox and George Metkovich followed with singles, scoring Bucher.

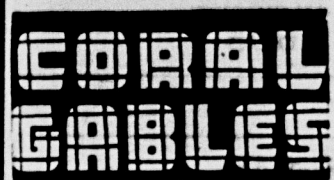

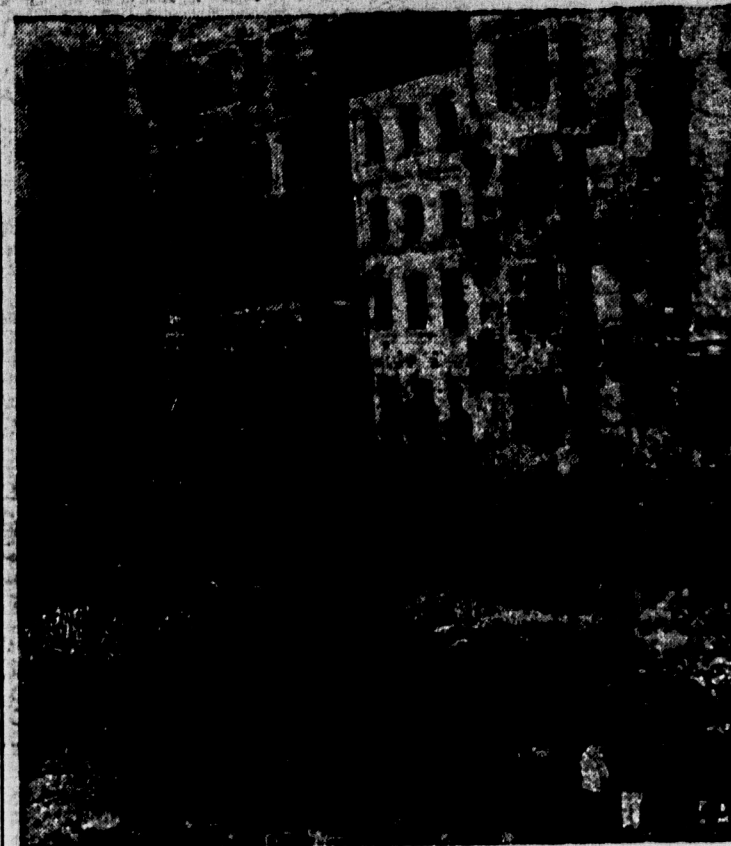

## New Order Places Strict Control on Male Workers

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP) — Practically all the nation's male workers were placed under strict new job controls today as the war manpower commission moved to channel more labor into war industries.

Extending its "priority referral" plan to blanket the country, WMC ordered that beginning July 1 all men except farm workers must clear through the United States employment service in seeking jobs. Only men referred by the employment service may be hired, although businesses with eight or more less employees are not affected.

Job applicants will be assigned to top priority war jobs, wherever they exist.

"The plan will make it possible for a worker anywhere in the country to take his most useful line," Paul V. McNutt, war manpower chairman said.

Already in effect in about a dozen "critical labor shortage areas," the referral program was extended by McNutt under President Roosevelt's executive order establishing the war manpower commission. It authorizes the recruitment of workers and referral to jobs in which they are most needed.

It will be difficult for workers to get jobs unless they clear through the employment service.

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
