Jan Struther Hits Wartime Hatred In College Talk

"But she has a lot to worry about, doesn't she?" remarked a woman after hearing Jan Struther, noted author of "Mrs. Struther," speak in College Auditorium last night. Jap Mountain Forces Retreat Five Miles in Western Philippines

GENERAL MACARTHUR'S HDQ., PHILIPPINES, Nov. 11 (AP) — The westernmost arm of American forces converging on Ormoc advanced five miles through the mountains today while the embattled 24th division continued pushing along the axis of the Ormoc-Panapan road against heavy Japanese resistance.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's only communiqué credited the five-mile advance to elements of the first cavalry division operating in mountains west and south of this highway where the principal battle is underway.

The communiqué admitted that the Japanese succeeded in landing reinforcements from four large cargo ships at Ormoc last night. The transports were accompanied by 15 destroyers.

Speedy New Nazi V-2 Robot Bomb Blasts England

LONDON, Nov. 10 (AP) —

Prime Minister Churchill continued today that England is under attack by the German long-range V-2 rocket, announcing that it flies through the stratosphere up to a height of between 60 and 70 miles and then plunges to earth with a ton of explosive traveling at a speed faster than sound.

Casualties and damage, he told a sober house of commons, have so far not been heavy, although the attack has been under way "for the last few weeks." Churchill said "a number" of the new rockets had landed at widely-scattered points in England.

Churchill pointed out that the speed of the V-2—estimated by other sources at between 700 and 1,000 miles an hour—outstripped sound. Therefore there was no way of giving sufficient public warning, but he said that there is, however, no need to exaggerate the danger.

"The scale and effect of these attacks have not hitherto been significant," he added.

The German radio said tonight that the V-2 was now being fired against Paris and the harbor installations at Antwerp, great Belgian port through which the Allied command plans to supply the western front armies.

Jap Drives Near Two Main Chinese Bases

CHUNGKING, Nov. 10 (AP) — Two main objectives of Japan's south China offensive, Kweichow and Luchow, were almost in enemy grasp tonight. Both are former bases of U. S. air power in the Orient.

The Chinese high command said the Japanese loosed an all-out offensive against encircled Kweichow, the Kwangsi province capital, and rammed spearheads to within six miles of Luchow.

Yanks Spread Out Over 75 Mile Front

Third Army Forces Put Metz Fortress In Line of Capture

SHAEFF, PARIS, Nov. 10 (AP)—The third army's winter offensive spread today to nearly every section of a 75-mile front and the fortress of Metz threatened with encirclement, echoed to the din of battle five miles to the north and nine miles to the south.

A dispatch said the sixth American division, the second tank division to point at least six planes divisions in the drive, pushed forward five miles and passed beyond Buchy, 10 miles north of Metz.

The Germans struck back at two places north of Metz during the morning, the first counterattacks since the big push began three days ago, but by mid-afternoon the doughboys had regained an average of two to three miles, as much as seven miles beyond jump-off positions.

Metz Nearly Encircled

Metz was ablaze from the south with the exception of the strongly fortified Metz area with an average of seven miles and was threatened with encirclement by Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's forces.

The attack did not permit dispersion until late last night, that the major offensive, an attempt to break through in the Metz area, was spearheaded by the 30th division today, pushing 30 miles from the Saar to the area around Saarbrücken.

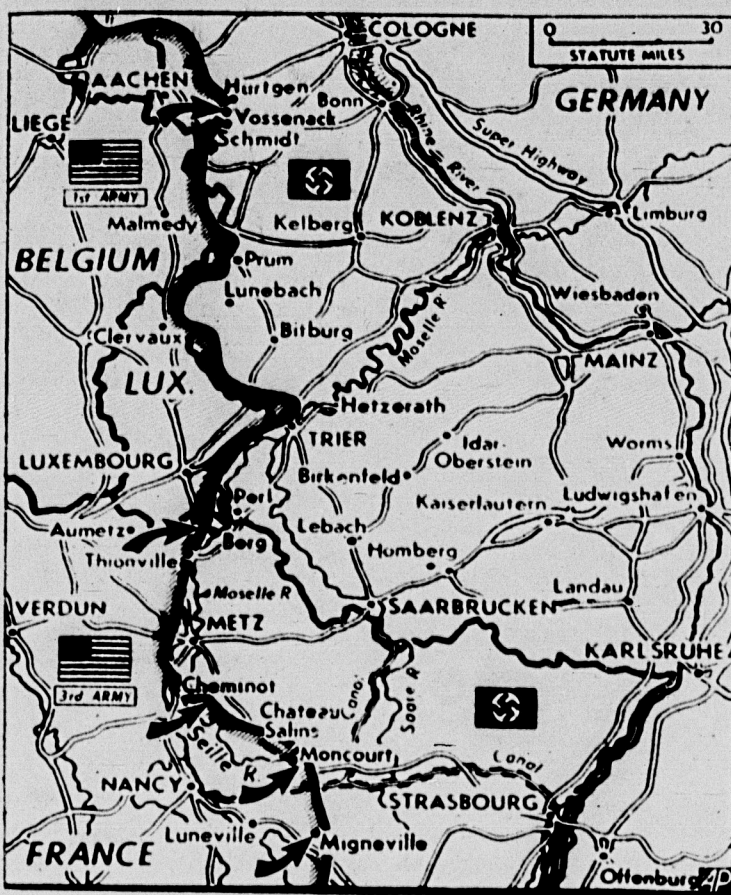
The 30th division's half yards, feeding into the front, were attacked in an attempt to break through the battlezone—as in the Metz area, the Germans seem to be bringing up enough troops to stay the offensive.

Counterattacks Repulsed

The 30th division, repulsing a counterattack led by but two battalions, the 19th division, at Metz, deepened its penetration to three miles beyond the Moselle river, which flows into Metz within 10 miles of the Saar frontier.

The counterattack rolled back the long-quiet Maizeren sector, five miles from Metz, but the 95th division up the assault and toward the Moselle.

Lavis led the way in the 100 yard back stroke with a time of 1:15.2 while Bill Jansen and Leonard Carr grabbed the second and third. The next meet will be Tuesday, Nov. 12, at 5 p.m. The meet last night afforded excellent practice for most of State's varsity swimmers and it is hoped that more will be on hand for the next meet.

Information regarding late permission for freshmen attending Red Cross meetings will be announced later.

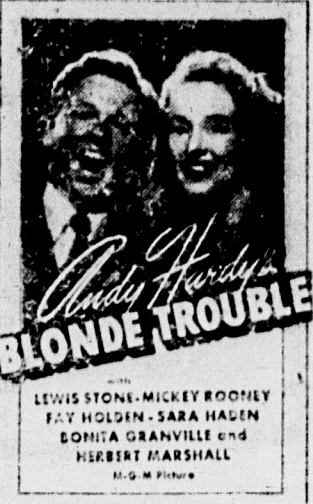
