

# Thrilled First Nighters Preview 'Kind Lady'

Two More Performances Scheduled Today; Capable Supporting Cast Backs Leads Through Weakly Written Drama

The college dramatic season got off to an auspicious start last night as the drama department presented Edward Chodorov's "Kind Lady". Every thrill in the script came across to the audience who were left panting at the end of the third act.

Frances Joyner as Mary Herries, the "kind lady" who unwittingly clasps an assassin to her bosom, dominates throughout. Her effortless dramatic power, and her thoughtful interpretation of a difficult role are the core of the play.

## Skilful Handling

Paul Gershenhof, as Henry Abbott handles skilfully a part requiring almost a dual personality. His accomplices in crime played their parts enthusiastically, although Bill Thielicke and Dorothy Blasko were most successful in approaching credibility.

Howard DeWolf, as Peter Sandford provided a welcome note of lightness and sanity, although he had the advantage of not being up to his knees in grotesque characterization and English diction. The rest of the cast were capable and steady in support.

Above from a too loving temperance the part of some of the cast, the chief fault of the evening is the author's. The play is stock and uninspired melodrama with all the familiar mechanical appointments.

## All Types Present

The idiot, the moron, the sadist, the stupid man of action, the murdering doctor, the suave but ruthless villain, the guileless man of good will, easily deceived and the lone, lorn maiden who falls into the hands of the villains, but outwits them with the last ounce of strength—all are there.

Shirley Temple has played such melodrama; Orphan Annie never stops playing it. Usually it cracks, but several times last night the machine came to life in spite of its artificial contrivances. The director and cast deserve applause for making the most of the material at hand.

Paul C. H. Nickle maintains the tradition of providing sets of exquisite taste and masterly construction.

Two more performances of the play are scheduled for today at 7:30 and 8:15 p.m.—T.R.

## Twin Attacks Dent Nazi Lines

### Third Army Nears Saar, First Plows Into Rhine Area

SHAFF, PARIS, Nov. 17 (AP)—The U.S. third army loosed its armored might across the Moselle north of embattled Metz for the first time today and sent tanks charging five miles east to little more than two miles from the border of the Saar industrial basin, an important source of Germany's war might.

This surprise blow fell as the U.S. first army to the north, attacking under a thundering barrage from 1,000 guns, plowed forward two miles to a point 14 miles inside Germany and only 23 miles short of the Rhine.

### Six Allied Armies

All six of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's Allied armies ground eastward in the winter offensive, with possibly 1,250,000 men attacking German lines held by less than 500,000 troops.

A front dispatch said that Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's tanks pierced to Remeling, two miles from the Saar frontier, the closest that his armor yet had come to the Reich.

Meanwhile infantry slugged away less than a mile from Metz as the garrison of this Lorraine fortress prepared for a stand to the death under the guns of the Gestapo, by the account of enemy captives.

### Advance Six Miles

The U.S. first army advanced to within six miles west of Duren, which would be approximately 14 miles inside the Reich east of Aachen.

The British second army, in eastern Holland fought up to the Maas river near the enemy stronghold of Roermond, speared to less than five miles of the German frontier to the north, and broke across the Zig canal, where the enemy had dug in for a stand.

On the third army's southern flank, the U.S. seventh army was closing in around flanking St. See ALLIES, Page 4

In her travels, the actress has played in almost every country of Europe.

Miss Draper attributes her decision to become an actress to the advice of the Polish composer and pianist, Paderewski, who heard her first monologue in 1913.

## Japs at Ormoc Encircled by 24th Division

MACARTHUR'S HDQ., Philippines, Sat., Nov. 18 — (AP) — Units of the American 24th division have established a strong road block on the Ormoc road, four miles south of Carigara bay on Leyte island, completing their double envelopment maneuver around remnants of a Japanese regiment, headquarters reported today.

A communique mentioned the U. S. 32nd division for the first time in the Philippine campaign, reporting that elements of the force now are deployed in the sector north of the front Japanese line and have driven a deep wedge into isolated enemy strongpoints.

This action is swirling south of Limon, key village on the mountain pass road leading from Pinamopon to the Ormoc corridor.

Enemy supply columns attempting to break through the 24th's road block to Limon were destroyed, the communique said.

East of Ormoc road, action in mountain fighting around the Mt. Minoro-Badian area was limited to mopping up of enemy pockets by the dismounted first cavalry and elements of the 24th division.

## State Listed Among Colleges to Establish Aviation Training

Michigan State college was listed among the 11 Michigan colleges and universities which will "continue, expand, or establish student courses in aviation after the war," in a survey recently completed by the Bendix Aviation corporation of Detroit.

Instead of the actual flight instruction courses offered under the civilian pilot training, Michigan State will stress the engineering phase of aviation.

Equipment for the development of an aviation education program will be made available to the schools on a sale or lease basis, under the provisions of the federal surplus disposal law.

## Fuzesabony Falls as Reds Close in on Budapest

LONDON, Sat., Nov. 18 — (AP) — Russian troops captured the key Hungarian rail junction of Fuzesabony yesterday, advancing up to four miles on a 65-mile front and hurling the enemy back into the Matra and Bukk mountains northeast of besieged Budapest, a Moscow communique announced last night.

The fall of Fuzesabony, 60 miles northeast of the Hungarian capital gave the Russians control of a 27-mile section of the Budapest-Miskolc trunk railway, which also has been cut 10 miles east of Hatvan, an important junction only 26 miles from the capital.

Hatvan was reported under attack from three sides and Moscow announced the seizure of Czany, five miles southeast of Hatvan, and Szasbok, nine miles southwest of the terminal of a line running over the mountains into central Slovakia, 28 miles beyond.

Strong Russian tank and infantry forces were fighting their way slowly along invasion paths to Austria and Czechoslovakia in a big flanking maneuver pivoting on Budapest's grimly defended outskirts.

Special interest will be centered on the Royal Gorge, Pikes Peak and the Black Canyon of Gunnison. There will also be visits to Denver, Colorado Springs, Boulder, Leadville, and other historic points.

## Jack Breslin Named as Most Valuable Football Player

### Winner Receives Award at Annual Banquet

Jack Breslin, junior fullback from Battle Creek, received the coveted Croix de Guerre watch, gift of the governor of Michigan, last night at the 24th annual football banquet held in the Union ballroom.

The watch was presented by the Hon. Vernon J. Brown, auditor general and lieu-<sup>2</sup> tenant governor-elect, who expressed the regrets of Gov. Harry F. Kelly that he could not attend the banquet personally.

Breslin proved himself a polished speaker by thanking the team members for their play all season and also gave touching remarks that they could not have done all the way.

### Missed Orange Bowl

Jimmy Conzelman, final speaker on the program and one who has gained world wide fame in the sporting realm, added a somber touch to the evening when he announced that the Spartans came within seven points of a missed bowl bid.

Coach Charley Bachman introduced the 22 letter winners from the 1944 team and presented a pen and pencil set to Harold Johnson, Dubois, Pa., sophomore who played halfback this season and was voted by his teammates as the outstanding player on the squad.

Bachman also related interesting facts from the start of summer practice throughout the entire campaign of which his team annexed six victories out of seven starts. He commended each letter winner personally.

### Hang With Flags

The ballroom, scene of the annual banquet, was decorated with the colors of former Spartan champions. In addition to the decorations and the coaching staff, several celebrities, members of the press, townspeople and dignitaries were present for the event.

John Price gave the invocation and group singing was led by William McIntyre, of Lansing Eastern high school. Dr. Sam A. Hannah, president of MSU, spoke on the aspect of the letter winners now and in later life, and stressed the fact that mental stress has to be equalized with physical fitness to make a success in life easier.

Master of ceremonies for the banquet was Guy Hill, of the education department. Ralph H. Young, director of athletics, also spoke on the behalf of the 1,200 Spartan athletes in service and stressed the need of civilian boys after the war, in the field of competitive sports.

Young also confirmed reports of a more enticing football schedule next fall, conditions permitting.

The Badgers will be making their first start since their first string quarterback Allen Shatford, died of injuries suffered during Wisconsin's 26 to 7 win over Iowa last week.

The Badgers, winners only four times in 19 games against Michigan, needed a victory to lead their season mark at four wins and four defeats. The Wolverines beat Wisconsin last season 27 to 0.

## Philippines Battle Costs Japs More Than 60 Ships

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (AP)—The Navy reported today on the Philippines battle which cost the Japanese more than 60 warships and said that some damaged American craft already have returned to duty.

Summing up the turn of Oct. 22-27 battle in the longest naval campaign of the war, the department identified six American ships that in action included the light carrier, Badger. This sinking had been reported previously.

The six ships lost, the Prince, two escort carriers—the Saint Lo and Gambier Bay, two destroyers—the Johnston and Hoel, and destroyer escort—the Samuel B. Roberts.

A few lesser craft also were reported lost.

The Japanese are still wondering what hit them, the navy said.

The number of damaged American vessels was not disclosed, the navy said, for security reasons.

Against this, the Japanese claim they lost two battleships, four carriers, six heavy cruisers, two light cruisers and an undetermined number of destroyers.

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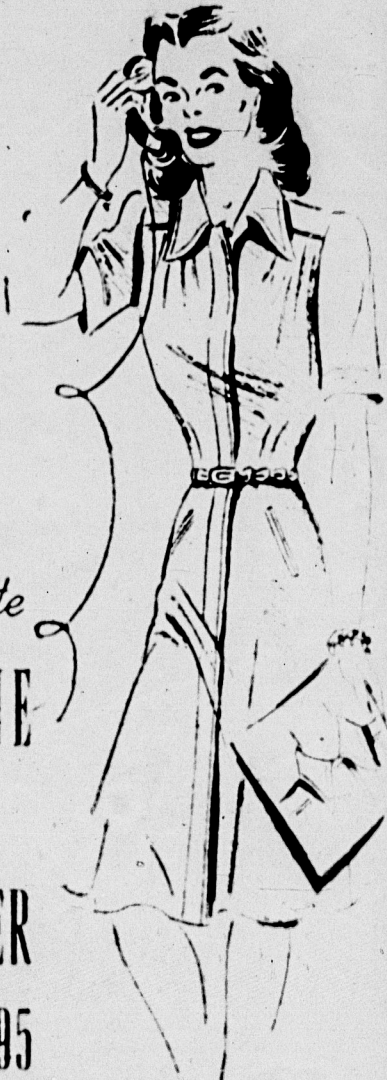
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
