

U.S.Division Lands On Ormoc Under Heavy Bombing

GEN. MACARTHUR'S HDQ., PHILIPPINES, Friday, Dec. 8 (AP)-A sensational landing of U.S. 77th division troops at Ormoc, enemy held port on Leyte island. and a during suicide attack by Japanese paratroopers 19 miles from Talcloban on the opposite side of the island were reported by a headquarters communique today.

A Japanese convoy of 13 ships which came into Ormoc behind the American tanding force was destroyed.

The enemy paratroopers did some damage before being nearly wiped out, the communique reported. Tacloban as the site of a U. S. airfield.

U.S. Ships Lost

Japanese planes hit the American convoy at Ormoc after troops had been put ashore. One U. S. destroyer and a small transport were lost.

By the Ormoc maneaver, Gen. Douglas MacArthur said, have seized the center of the Yamashita line from the rear and have split the enemy's forces in two.

Among the 13 Japanese ships were four large loaded sunk transports. There were two small transports and seven destroyers in the convoy.

An additional Japanese convoy of six small ships approaching Leyte at nightfall vesterday also was wiped out.
