Nazis Counterattack Along Eastern Front

LONDON, Jan. 3 (AP) Strong German counterattacks approximately 40 miles northwest of Budapest aimed at relieving the encircled German garrison in the capital have succeeded in capturing several towns on the south bank of the Danube, Moscow announced tonight

The Russians claimed that the enemy blows, southeast of Komaron on the Danube almost 45 miles northwest of Budapest, had been repulsed, despite capture of the towns.

This was the first counterblow by the Germans in Hungary since a massive tank battle near Debrechen in October and it bore out to some extent Berlin's boast that the German army still posing lines virtually all along was strong enough to strike back the Italian battlefront. 

Aerial Attack Aims At Nip War Plants

Superforts Invade Enemy Homeland in New Phase of War

GUAM, Jan. 3 (AP) America's aerial invasion of the Japanese homeland, designed to knock out Nippon war industries, entered a new phase today with a Superfortress raid directed for the first time from new 21st bomber command headquarters on Guam island.

The mammoths of the sky, taking off from Saipan, lashed Nagoya, key aircraft center less than 200 miles west by south of Tokyo. The sizeable force of B-29s, sent against Japan's main Honshu island, hit the Japanese with a bomb load that probably exceeded the explosive tonnage dropped on Nagoya in three previous attacks and equalled the heaviest unloaded on Tokyo in five earlier, raids

Superforts Bomb
Radio Tokyo reported about
90 Superforts striking in wayes at mid-afternoon, bombed Na-goya, Kobe, Osaka and Hama-matsu. The three latter industrial cities are south of Nagoya. The Japanese acknowledged some damage and claimed, without American confirmation, that 17 of the raiders were shot down and 25 damaged.

This mitial Superfort strike di-rected from reconquered American territory was the first against Honshu since the Tokyo blasting of Dec. 27.

The opening phase of the aerial invasion of Japan-proper temonstrated that B-29s could raid the Nippon homeland and get back to their bases in the Marianas The second phase, now under way, means that the giant planes are settling down to business. It is known that Superfort bases eventually will be on all three islands in the region (Guam, Saipan and Tinin addition to existing Saipan bases
