Library Displays Feature Old Coin, Bill Collection

Displays ranging from threatening notes to "shimpactors" are featured in the display of quasi-currency now on display in the library show cases.

Among the bills are some bearing the inscription "To counteract is death." They are colonial currency dated from 1767 to 1776 which were unearthed in an old family bible by Prof. H. T. Darlington of the history department.

Omeara C. Wilson of the foreign language department loaned a portion of his shinplaster collection to the exhibit. Issued during the civil war, this currency is still redeemable at its face value, plus a more than nominal collector's fee.

Also featured in the exhibit are collections of vivid issues of Confederate currency.

Too valuable for exhibit in the show cases of the library is the collection of Prof. J. M. DeHaan of the philosophy department. His collection consists of gold coins.

Yanks Split Luzon Highway As Jap Resistance Stiffens

Planes Hammer Enemy on All Fronts

GEN. MACARTHUR'S HQ., LUZON, Thursday, Jan. 18 (AP)—Progress stepped up along the left flank of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's wide Luzon beachhead as sixth army patrols entered Pozorrubio and cut the main highway, headquarters reported.

Other units were within a half mile of Rosario, nine miles to the north. Action in the northwestern sector had been slowed for days by stiff opposition and one tankless counterattack.

Other Yank forces, driving 17 miles from captured Alaminos on the right flank, secured the north end of the Bolinao peninsula by reaching the northern extremity. Driving southwest from Alaminos, another force was headed toward Dasol bay.

The left flank drive reached half mile from Roxas. Sub-resistance still was acknowledged in General MacArthur's communiqué.

To the south, patrols were operating east of the Cabanatuan hills, which would be excellent as observation and supply points if captured, and into Tanauan eight miles to the south. Our patrols have entered Pozorrubio.

U.S. planes ranging the central Luzon plains and the areas south of Manila destroyed a number of locomotives, freight cars, three tanks and more than 50 trucks.

Heavy bombers hit supply and bivouac installations of Fort Stoessenburg, adjacent to Clark field, starting fires.

Forces of vital Japanese railroad north of Lingayen were on again, long-range patrollers harassed them in darkness by night.




Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra Will Present Concert At MSC




