Krall Makes Top Points

Breaking a two game losing streak Michigan State caught fire yesterday and swamped a better Michigan Normal 75-31. The game was played at 7:30 p.m. before a meager crowd of 2,200 spectators.

Breaking up their third win season against six losses Krall and White took command the outset and held a 10-point margin throughout. The Spartans walked off the floor with a 29-19 lead at half-time.

String Game

Ben VanAlstyne sent his stringers into the fray at the start and made only one substitution until the final minute, when he sent his reserves to finish the game. The Yanks virtually ran the legs of the Spartans with a blazing MacArthur report.

Japanese Resistance Diminishes as Yanks Cross Island Plain

MACARTHUR'S HQ., LUZON, Friday, Jan. 19 (AP)—American troops using mobile guns and armor smashed Japanese tanks and artillery to capture Urdentia, a highway hub town on Luzon island's central plain, Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported today.

The fight Thursday (Philippine time) was the stiffest action since the liberation troops came ashore on Luzon at Lingayen gulf Jan. 9. Enemy guns were cleverly concealed in bamboo thickets but failed to halt the American advance.

Important Junction Taken

Amqui, another highway center, also was captured by the Americans, who then advanced southward on the central Luzon plain. The town is 19 road miles north of Tafile, prominent junction on the highway to Manila which is 70 more road miles south.

Seventh Fleet ships bombarded Japanese positions at Rosario on the east flank of the American drive, helping to hold down stubborn enemy resistance to Yank forces which have reached the outskirts of the town.

The Americans are moving toward Agoo northwest of Rosario apparently to seize another road into the Benguet mountain, where the Japanese are reported to be concentrated.

Planes Use Lingayen

Yank warplanes are operating from Lingayen airfield which was captured after hours of the Lingayen landings.

Alibat airfield continued to attack enemy-held machine gun nests on Luzon and to sweep the roads and railways over which the Japanese are attempting to move supplies and troops.

Planes wrecked three locomotives, 20 freight cars and more than 80 enemy motor vehicles.

tary of the American Dairy association, gave \$30,200 for a 10 year research program in nutrition of dairy herds and the effects on quality of milk. The Standard Oil Company of Chicago gave \$15,000 to the college for a five-year research program on improving the quality of milk for manufacturers.

A fund of \$25,000 from John W. Beaumont of New York was accepted, the intention which is to provide annual scholarships to outstanding men students and each scholarship will be three quarters of tuition and cash award of \$126. George Song Line, former language instructor, gave \$1,000 for developing courses at State.



Third Army Veteran Returns To Tell of War Experiences

Back from 13 months of active duty in the European theater of war is Captain Herbert "Andy" Hays, MSC, graduate of '41 and member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity.

A member of the 4th Armored tank battalion of the third army, Andy is possessed of the Purple Heart, with two Oak Leaf clusters, the Bronze Star, European theater of operations ribbon and the Army-Pearl Harbor Unit citation. One can easily see that the devices every minute of his 39 day tour.

At the time of his departure Andy's battalion was east of Stettin, Germany. Since then the battalion has been pictured in the latest issue of Life magazine during the siege of Bastogne.

Andy entered the army in July of '41 and after completing his training in the United States he was sent across, arriving first in Wales. From there he proceeded farther into England. The beginning of Buckingham palace seemed to unify the people he commented.

Andy's first wound, which brought him the Purple Heart, was when the Germans were dropping artillery fire from approximately 25 yards away. A piece of shrapnel went through the collar of his raincoat, jacket and shirt and went out the other side of his neck. A calm "pretty close" was his only comment as to that handshake with death.

The first Oak Leaf cluster was for a wound received when his tank was wiped out Nov. 14. The second one was the result of a wound in the hand while walking beside his tank trying to discover where the Germans' guns were situated. Shrapnel bounded off the tank and pierced his hand.

While overseas Captain Hays met several other Michigan State men. Among them were Bill Hassleback '40, Leslie W. Jeox '40, Chester Kennedy '41, and Bill Dwight '41.


WOMEN'S SPORTS

British Army, Yank Artillery Join Forces In Rhine Drive

Germans Shove Americans Back in Stiff Fighting

PARIS, Jan. 18 (AP)—The British second army, backed by American heavy artillery, slugged out gains of two and a half miles today and overran four towns as its drive on a 28-mile front in western Germany's approaches to the Rhine rose in scope and intensity.

Simultaneously the U.S. third army opened a new assault in northern Luxembourg, broke across the Sure river on a seven-mile front and plunged on two miles into the mountainous defenses on which the enemy must rely to hold his shanks on positions in Belgium.

British Advance

With some infantry, wearing white camouflage suits such as those worn on the Russian front, Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's doughboys fought into Dikirch, 17 miles northeast of Luxembourg city, and Bettendorf, three miles east, while other forces seized strategic heights beyond.

Battering up through the Holland appendix north of Aachen, the tomahawks of Lt. Gen. Sir Miles C. Dempsey fought into a village six and a half miles south of Roermond, key to the German defenses at the apex of additional material. His paragraphs were obviously different from the Maas-Roer river triangle.

Farther south in a new penetration of the Reich the British in an advance of over a mile were nearing a town three miles inside Germany.

Germans Hit Back

The Germans threw reinforcements into the mounting struggle, but the British drive appeared to be gathering momentum and was pressing the enemy back toward the Roer, most formidable of German water hazards short of the Rhine.

Along the Rhine front in France, tank-led German forces drove Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch's seventh army troops from positions won yesterday in the bridgehead north of Strasbourg. Stiff fighting was in progress.

Red Troops Move Into Germany In Rapid Advance

LONDON, Jan. 18 (AP)—Berlin said tonight that Russian troops had reached the German Silesian frontiers 250 miles southeast of Berlin as other powerful Soviet formations in history's greatest offensive tore big holes in collapsing Nazi defenses clear across Poland, capturing more than 1,000 localities with 30-mile advances in 24 hours.

Unconfirmed reports said the Russians already had crossed into industrially-rich Silesia and also into lower East Prussia. A Moscow dispatch said Soviet artillery and airplanes were laying down a terrific barrage on Silesia.


