News in Brief

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP) British joined forces today with the campaign to isolate Burma from the Japanese sphere of influence.

Fraternities to Take IFC Test to Check Pledge Programs

IFC will give a test to all fraternity men which will take the place of the pre-war test given to all pledges during Fraternity week on Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Hort building lecture room according to Mac Crowley, MacCollister senior.

All fraternity men, both pledges and actives who have not previously taken a similar test will be required to take it.

The test will bring out the value and scope of each fraternity's pledge program. It will cover points on the history of MSC, information on Greek associations on campus, social activities and etiquette of both fraternal and collegiate functions. The points included form a background of knowledge for a good fraternity man.

After grading the tests, the fraternity with the highest average will be announced.

Churchill to Urge Settlement Delay

LONDON, Feb. 7 (AP) Prime Minister Churchill is expected to urge the "Big Three" conference, now in session in the Black Sea area, to postpone settlement of Europe's frontiers until France can be included in the deliberations.

The announcement tonight that Churchill, President Roosevelt and Premier Stalin had turned to wide-angle political discussions after reaching complete agreement on military operations against Germany made no mention of the frontier problem.

A few hours before official disclosure that the conference is in progress, Minister of State Richard Law told the house of commons that Britain believed the question of new European boundaries "must be decided later by all powers together."

Reds Establish New Crossings Nearer Berlin

LONDON, Wednesday, Feb. 8 (AP) Soviet troops established their seventh bridgehead over the Oder river in the Kustrin area little more than 30 miles from Berlin yesterday and broke into the city of Kustrin itself according to German accounts.

Moscow still did not confirm any of the river crossings which Berlin had been made by Marshal Gregory Zhukov's first White Russian army.

The "rightly" communiqué broadcast from Moscow told only of a spring-up operations east of the river, including the capture of Guestebesel on the east bank 33 miles northeast of Berlin, and limited advances in the 50-mile-wide Soviet bridgehead in Silesia, far to the southeast.

The only indication from Moscow that Zhukov's forces might be west of the Oder was unofficial. It was a broadcast quoting the Red army newspaper Red Star as saying, "fighting is going on in the fortified fortress of Berlin."

Moscow's communiqué, however, announced that 15,460 prisoners had been taken on the eastern front Sunday and Monday, and that since Jan. 11 eight German generals had been killed, and five generals and four top-ranking colonels had been captured.

60 Students Register for Special Session

Sixty new students, mid-year high school graduates, enrolled in school this week for a special short term running until the end of winter term Saturday, March 17, Registrar Robert S. Lentz announced yesterday.

The policy of admitting students at this time is followed to enable men to continue their schooling uninterrupted until their induction into the armed forces.

State enrollment now nears 4,300—including 2,819 women and 1,025 men. About 450 army students are receiving instruction on campus.

Americans Blast Through Last of Siegfried Line

PARIS, Feb. 7 (AP)—The U.S. third army thrust elements of four divisions across the Our and Sure rivers into Germans from Luxembourg at ten places on a 24-mile front today as the U.S. first army burst through the last main zone of the Siegfried line defenses in the Oder river section near Schleiden.

At the same time the third army forces already in Germany exploited the breach they had made in the Siegfried line—permanent works east of St. Vith, making gains of a miles southward through the Sciences Forest hills and taking Wisscheid, three and one-half miles north of the strongpoint of Peper.

Move Up in Rain

These forces formed up are around Pruem as close as three miles on the west down to seven miles away on the southwest with the capture of Holling.

First army doughboys, moving up in a heavy rain, cracked the Siegfried emplacements innermost belt by capturing Hettenthal, two and one-half miles southwest of Clodden and pointing across the Oder river.

Civilians Awake Trops

There they left the main system of concrete barriers and pillboxes behind them and threatened to outflank the Schleiden-Gemund sector of the west wall.

Second infantry division soldiers making the assault reported that German civilians spread the alarm and awakened sleeping Nazi troops.

Gains Made

During the day the first army also made gains north and southwest of the Roer river network of dams inside the Siegfried defenses east of Monschau, Germany, reached within 300 yards of the strongpoint of Schneid and captured Malboden, a suburb of the Siegfried line fortification town of Gemund.

These two American armies under Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley

Will Durant to Give Four Lectures On Campus for Faculty, Guests

Dr. Will Durant, famed author, philosopher, will speak before an audience in America on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings. He will also visit Europe on a lecture tour. Author of "The Story of Civilization," Dr. S. E. Cowe announced recently.

The meetings will be held in the Music Auditorium and are open to faculty members and guests of state universities only. Following each lecture a discussion period will be held.

The first meeting is scheduled for Tuesday evening, at 7:30 in the Auditorium. The topic of the lecture is "Democracy."

To Discuss Democracy

Two lectures will be given on Wednesday. The first will concern "Democracy in Transition" and will be held at 10 a.m. The second, to be at 2 p.m., will be on "Marriage in Transition."

The Thursday meeting is set aside for 10 a.m. with its topic "Religion in Transition." Durant was born in North Adams in 1885 of French-Canadian heritage and was named after the great Harvard philosopher and psychologist.

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Bitter Jap Resistance Stalls Advance at Edge of Manila

Yanks Clear Capital's Business District

MANILA, Thursday, Feb. 8 (AP)—The fire-ravaged business district of Manila has been cleared of Japanese demolition squads by Yanks now holding all the area north of the Pasig river but American troops still are held up in the Pasay suburb at the southeast edge of the city by continued bitter resistance at Nichols.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who left the city yesterday during which a Nipponese shell fell only 100 feet of him, announced slow progress in a combat today which listed enemy casualties in the Luzon capital at about 48,000.

American casualties for the preceding four-week period were reported 7,076, including 1,000 lost.

Draw Up Bridges

U.S. 1st cavalry and 37th division crossed all northern Manila yesterday.

The 10th airborne division was tramping up in the vicinity of Nichols field, on the outskirts.

Bridge across the wide Pasig river, which divides Manila, have been blown recently, MacArthur announced. This undoubtedly will aid the American advance in the southern areas of the besieged city.

Associated Press Correspondent Bill Braine said Japanese had shelled northern Manila yesterday, causing injuries in the Santo Domingo camp, where Japanese were fired last

Interns Lose Calm

Services firmly lost their nerve, became calm," Braine said. "There was no panic but there was a lack of enthusiasm among people as they faced the rear of buildings and against walls. Not a shell fire would rouse them newly won

thus were already through the Germans' most vaunted permanent defenses at two points besides the original 35-mile-wide Aachen gap, and standing at or inside the line's concrete encirclement zones for another ten miles.

The Allies appeared to be mounting an offensive to smash out Neufransach, taking more Germany's western defenses, than 1,200 prisoners.

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
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
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
