Bike Regulations To Be Enforced

Chief Richard Rogers, East Lansing police head, has again listed regulations regarding use of bicycles to be parked or ridden on the sidewalks in the business district of East Lansing. Bike racks are furnished at Albert street and Abbott road, M.A.C. and East Grand River avenues and Peoples church. Racks are provided beside nearly all of the college buildings. Rogers seriously requests all students to make use of the racks, rather than leaving their bikes on the sidewalk.

Last week, two truck-loads of bicycles were picked up in the business district for being parked on the sidewalk. In observing this regulation the student is protecting himself as well as the pedestrian. If an accident occurs the owner of the bike can be heavily sued for damages. The parking and riding regulations will be rigidly enforced by the East Lansing police department.

Tragic Story of Hump-Back Makes Plot for 'Rigoletto'

Doris Marinelli, Ernice Lawrence to Play Leads

"Rigoletto" is the story of the gay and colorful court of Prince of Mantua. The time of the story is the sixteenth century when reckless counts and nobles had affairs with the wives of other court members and ladies of the court.

Playing leads in Verdi's opera, will be Doris Marinelli and Ernice Lawrence, noted Metropolitan opera singers.

Rigoletto is a hump-backed court jester of the Prince of Mantua. He laughs and ridicules the noblemen of the court for allowing the Prince to be attentive to and flirt with their wives. The court members plot vengeance on him and a count, Count Monterone, puts a curse on the jester.

Prince in Disguise

Disguised as a student, the Prince had been courting Gilda, Rigoletto's daughter, at church. The noblemen abduct her thinking she is Rigoletto's mistress. Rigoletto finds Gilda at the palace with the Prince and admits she is his daughter. He then takes her away.

Later Rigoletto goes to an inn where the Prince is staying and plans his death. A bandit, Sparafucile, is to aid him. Maddalena, Sparafucile's sister, begs him not to kill the Prince. The bandit promises not to kill the Prince if another person comes to the inn before midnight.

Gilda overhears Maddalena talking to Sparafucile and just before midnight enters the inn dressed as a man. Rigoletto arrives at the specified time and is given a body tied in a bag.

Happy to Die

About to throw the bag in the river, the jester hears the Prince singing in the inn. In frustration he unties the bag and finds Gilda who in her dying breath says she is happy to die for her

Court Martial Pends For Former Spartan On Official Decision

Former State student, Henry A. Gluski of Detroit, hit the headlines recently when his classmates of McKinsey high school wrote to Congressman George Dondero asking that Gluski's court martial be investigated. He was at State four terms, '43-'44.

While in active combat in Germany the 19-year-old soldier and several comrades were separated from their unit. The allied advance in January was underway, and Gluski, because of foot injuries, was ordered to ride in a jeep.

The men became separated from their outfit, a movement of German troops prevented them from rejoining it, and the result was that they stayed with an airborne command for 44 days, according to Free Press account. During that time, Gluski was in active combat.

Gluski and his comrades were charged with desertion and court martialled. His three battle stars and infantry badge were taken from him when he was sentenced.

His former classmates and other friends wrote to their representative in Washington asking for a retrial and claiming the army charges were unjust. Army officials have held up the court martial decision.

Spartan Backfield Shift May Prove MSC Win Over Kentucky Wildcats

Michigan State's football team will open the home portion of their 1945 schedule today against the Wildcats of the University of Kentucky. The kick off is scheduled for 2 p.m.

Bands to Play

Between halves of the Kentucky game this afternoon, the spectators will be entertained by the Battle Creek high school marching band under the direction of Paul Tammi, Leonard Falcone, head of the MSC band, stated yesterday.

The Battle Creek band is composed of 95 pieces. Seventy-two of the members are boys and 23 are girls. They will be led by the drum major, Bill Bloom.

Falcone added that the Michigan State college band, made up of 60 pieces, will play from the stands at the game, since there are not enough men among this number to resume a marching band at this time.

News In Brief

NEW YORK, Oct. 5 (AP) — A four-hour work stoppage by telephone operators throughout the country ended at six o'clock (EST) tonight and normal service was resumed.

New York City, Kansas City and Memphis, Tenn., were the first to announce the return of operators, maintenance men and clerks to their jobs. Similar information followed from other parts of the nation.

As the workers reported to their offices, the American Telephone and Telegraph company said they would not be paid for the time they were away—from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.

TOKYO, Oct. 5 (AP) — Emperor Hirohito is expected to appoint tomorrow a new premier equipped to obey General MacArthur's decrees for a free Japan and to meet the menace of famine and revolt this winter. The fall of Prince Higashi-

Kuni's post-surrender cabinet earlier today was traced to his inability to shake loose the bureaucratic fetters of the old order and act in the mounting crisis.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP) — Forty-three thousand oil striking workers were directed by their union today to return to jobs in refineries seized by the United States navy.

The union president, O. A. Knight, announced here that the workers in 15 states were willing to return to work "for the United States government" but were "still on strike against the companies."

The government thus had postponed—by federal seizure in peacetime—the final showdown on the CIO oil workers international union's demand for a 30 percent wage increase to compensate for loss of overtime pay. Twenty-six companies are in navy hands.

The Spartans will be out to avenge the 40-0 defeat suffered at the hands of the Michigan Wolverines last Saturday. This will be the third game for the Wildcats.

The Michigan defeat provoked several changes in the line up. State's triple threat fullback Jack Breslin will start the game at left half in place of the injured Don Ludwig. At the other half will be Steve Contos, the surprise back from the Michigan game.

In the fullback department will be Milford Jones, 180-pound understudy of Breslin. Jones played in the Michigan game. The only change in the Spartan line is the shift of Walt Vezmar, 225 pound former center to left tackle in place of Dan Goldsmith, a casualty of the "M" game.

Probable starting line ups for the game are: at center for State, Brady Sullivan, for Kentucky, McDonald. At guard for MSC, Lamssies, Black; for Kentucky, Haas and Keyser. Tackles for State are Vezmar and Esbaugh; and for the Wildcats, Serini and Shannon. On the ends will be Barbas and Massuch; Kentucky will start Hensley and Schliecher.

In the backfield for the Spartans will be Glenn Johnson at quarterback, Breslin and Contos at the halves, and Jones at full.

Kentucky's backfield will feature Granitz at quarter, Chambers and Yost at the halves, and Barnett in the fullback slot.

As the probable line up stands the Wildcats will out-weigh the Spartan line by 10 pounds per man, while in the backfield State has the edge, 177 to 173. The Spartan line tips the scale at 194 pounds per man, and the backfield at 190 pounds.

Against Kentucky, the Spartans will be meeting a team that lost a 21 to 7 decision to Mississippi and then came from behind last week to nip Cincinnati, 13 to 7. Sparking the Wildcats is Jim Burnett, a 165-pound fullback patterned in the Kentucky T-formation who has scored all three of his team's touchdowns on long runs.

A crowd of 10,000 fans is expected at the opening game. This is at least 2,500 more than witnessed any MSC home game last fall.

Conference Postponed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP) — Argentina joined the 20 other American republics today in voting to postpone the Inter-American conference scheduled to start October 20 in Brazil.

The Pan American union, 55-year-old international organization of the 21 republics, voted unanimously to call off the Brazil meeting in a 30-minute session.

Keyed Up Spartan 11 Faces Kentucky In Ball Game Today

Cubs Win As Pitcher Hurls Shutout Ball

DETROIT, Oct. 5 (AP) — Thirty-six-year-old Claude Passeau of the Chicago Cubs delivered the greatest pitching performance of world series history today when he held the Detroit Tigers to a single hit and turned them back, 3 to 0, in the third game of the 1945 classic.

Only Rudy York's clean single to left field in the second inning deprived 53,500 spectators of the thrill of a no-hit, no-run showing by the slender veteran from Lucedale, Miss. Only one other Tiger reached first, on a walk to Bob Swift in the sixth inning, and he was wiped out on a double play.

Only 28 American league batters faced Passeau's sharp curve and medium fast ball as he hurled the Cubs into a 2 to 1 lead in games won and sent them joyously homeward tonight for the remaining contests necessary to wind up the series.

1906 Performance

The only world series performance even remotely challenging Passeau's brilliant feat was turned in by Ed Reulbach of the Chicago Cubs of 1906, when he limited the White Sox to one safety and beat them, 7 to 1.

Reulbach, however, issued six passes against the single walk off Passeau today. Also, he hit one batter and delivered a wild pitch, so his game, though undeniably brilliant, scarcely equalled the gem seen at Briggs stadium today.

Passeau, who, ironically, is a former chattel of the Detroit Farm system, was not particularly fast. His control, however, was magnificent, and his curve seldom failed to slice off the corner Passeau had in mind. So thoroughly did he keep the Tigers under control that there scarcely was a difficult chance for a Chicago fielder. In the final inning, for instance, two Detroit pinch-hitters could not get a ball out of the infield.

Crowd Applauds

When the enemy pitcher came up to bat for himself in the final inning, the crowd—biggest ever to see a world series game in Detroit—stood up almost in a body and gave Passeau the tremendous cheer he deserved. When the last Tiger batter popped up to end the game, the Chicago club stormed out and almost carried their cool ace into the dressing room.

Percy Jones Soldiers To See Football Game

They will be brought to the stadium in ambulances which are to be parked on the field so that they will be able to watch the game. Afterwards the Red Cross chapter will sponsor a special dinner and entertainment for them in the Union.

lover, Rigoletto realizes that the curse of Count Monterone had been fulfilled.

The composer of "Rigoletto," Giuseppe Verdi, was born in Le Roncole, near Busseto, Duchy of Parma, Oct. 6, 1813, and died at Milan Jan. 27, 1901. He was the son of an innkeeper and grocer.

Following a period in which Verdi's operas were unfavorably compared with Wagner's, there has been a marked tendency to rank him as an even superior musical dramatist in some respects.

Verdi is considered a master and moulder of Italian musical thought. Among his better known works are "Aida," "Falstaff," "Otello," "La Traviata" and "Il Trovatore."




