Outstanding Political Leader To Lecture This Evening

Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit to Speak on Democracy

Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit, leading woman political leader and writer of India who has been outstanding in the struggle for Indian independence, will speak at 8 p.m. tonight in the College auditorium on "The Indian Democracy."

Mrs. Pandit is the daughter of the late Mahatma Gandhi, one of the greatest men in India, and sister of the outstanding political leader of India. Reared with every educational and cultural advantage, she has devoted her life to the people of her country. Her influence has been felt throughout India.

She is president of the All-India Women's conference and has held a number of other important posts, including that of minister for local self-government and health in the United Provinces.

One of the world's most outstanding women, notable for her idealistic and personal sacrifices for the benefit of her people, Mrs. Pandit has organized relief organizations in famine areas of India and has led urgent reform movements.

Because of her political opinions Mrs. Pandit was at one time imprisoned with her brother and her husband, who also are leaders in the movement for national independence.

News in Brief

OBERURSEL, Germany, Dec. 4 (AP)—A graphic eye-witness account of Adolf Hitler's last hours today pictured the fuhrer as a raving madman, alternately rehearsing suicide and "directing" a phantom rescue army which had been wiped out days before.

The dramatic description, often bordering on comic opera, was given to U. S. army investigators by Capt. Hanna Reitsch, German aviatix who flew the last Nazi plane out of Berlin, and was released with the comment that it was "probably as accurate" an account as will be obtained. Her story was told today through an American interrogator.

CHUNGKING, Dec. 5 (AP)—Chinese nationalist troops were nearing Mukden today after thrusting more than 210 miles into Manchuria in three weeks and a triumphant entry into the city appeared imminent.

Formal entry might be delayed until the completion of negotiations with Russia for moving in troops by air, but apparently no Chinese communists stand between the nationalists and Mukden.

DETROIT, Dec. 5 (AP)—General Motors corporation and the CIO United Auto Workers agreed tonight to resume negotiations, as the government flashed the auto industry a green light to hike new car prices in line with wage increases.

Philip Murray, CIO president, announced that negotiations on all disputed points will be resumed Thursday in Detroit between GM and the UAW-CIO.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—The British Broadcasting company, quoting "Washington correspondents," said tonight that an agreement had been reached between the United States and Great Britain for a loan of \$4,400,000,000.

The London broadcast, reported by NBC, said the loan would be announced in both capitals tomorrow.

were tied at the end of regulation play at 48-48.

Robin Roberts put the Spartans out in front with the first basket, followed by Sam Fortino with the second, score 4-0. Great Lakes got quickly to their feet, and after a few moments tied the score at nine all, and soon jumped out in the lead. However, Jack Gramack, replacement for Fortino at the forward post, tied it up again at 15-15.

Two shots by Roberts again put the Spartans in the lead by 20-17. State maintained the lead until the close of the first half, which ended with the Green and White out in front 25-24.

Fortino Scores
At the opening of the second half, Sam Fortino again jumped the Spartans to a three point lead. Great Lakes once again connected with long and short shots to push out in front 33-31. Until the end of the regular playing time neither team managed to get more than three points ahead of the other.

Great Lakes led in the closing minutes of play by two points, and by clever ball handling, Jack Cawood, replacement for Bill Krall, put the ball through the hoop in the last one-tenth of a second to tie the score, and forced the game into an extra five minutes of play.

Great Lakes Rally
Cawood again put the ball through the basket to put State back in the lead, but Great Lakes, not to be defeated, put three more points on their list and jumped to a 51-48 lead. A single

WKAR Presents Talks On World Astronomy

Karel Hujer, assistant professor of astronomy in the physics department at Michigan State college, is being starred this fall in "Stars Around the World," a series of astronomical talks each Thursday at 3:15 p.m. over station WKAR. In these talks, Dr. Hujer, who is Czechoslovakian born, describes the stars and tells of some of the trips he has taken to obtain his information.

After receiving college training in his home community of Turnov, Dr. Hujer subsequently received professional training in astronomy at Charles university in Prague and at London university in England.

In addition to work in the Yerkes observatory in the United States, his travels have taken him to India, Japan, China, and most of the countries of the far east. He has also made exploratory studies of the ancient Incas in Peru.

Gen. Hurley Denounces British Opposition

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Army-Marek Patrick J. Hurley, who more than any other man in the world today has been named "collapse" of the present Government of China and has been given vital assignments by Gen. Douglas MacArthur. Hurley sent them home from the embassy in Chungking. Hurley, in the course of two and a half hours of impassioned testimony before the senate foreign relations committee, Hurley made the following assertions:

That Britain was opposing United States policy for the unification of China at the very moment that Maj. Gen. Hurley, American ambassador of Chungking, was trying hardest to negotiate an agreement between the Chinese communists and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

Heating MSC Proves A Down-to-earth Job

Ever wonder how Michigan State keeps 70 odd campus buildings warm amid the severities of Michigan weather? Then see Frank H. Mitchell, recently retired guardian of the campus heating plant, for some very fascinating data.

Mitchell, who made his first appearance here in '37 and recently returned to work to help heat the sprouting new dormitories, has nursed the campus heating system from a mere hot flash to its present gargantuan proportions. He has the complete low-down on what is very much of an underground proposition.

Briefly, the MSC campus is heated by a system of under-

ground tunnels elaborate enough to put the most talented gophers to absolute shame. These tunnels, many of which are large enough to accommodate a couple of men walking upright, not only provide the campus buildings with steam heat but with electricity and telephone lines as well.

Two Subways
The heat-carrying subways emanate in two great multi-branched trunks from the power plant, in back of Ag hall, to every campus building. How did they get there? At the beginning of the century, Mitchell relates, underground heating tunnels were a fairly new thing.

In '04 the college warmed to

the idea and began construction of a man-sized tunnel which was completed in '05. Frank Ayres, Mitchell remembers, was the contractor, and the original circular tunnel, built of crushed stone, gravel and cement (no steel was used), made a tour which included the engineering building, greenhouse, physics buildings and old College hall. This tunnel still stands and is used today, and new tunnels were added in time.

Underground Tunnels
Just where are all these tunnels? Ground-level observers can't see them but can get a general idea during the winter when heat radiating from them leaves

Modern Farm Exhibit Sponsored by MSC To Tour Next Term

"Labor Saving" will be the keynote of the Rural Progress caravan which will tour at least 50 counties in Michigan during January, February, and March. The caravan will travel approximately 3,000 miles to bring this show to residents of rural communities.

The exhibit will consist of a huge display of about 100 working models of labor saving devices, illustrated by approximately 340 lineal feet of display panels, and informative movies. Some of the subjects covered by the exhibit will be farm machinery, farm methods, farm building construction, rural home economics, and rural home landscaping.

The caravan represents the cooperative work of nearly all of the college departments having extension specialists. It will be sponsored by the extension service of the college and financed principally by the emergency farm labor department.

The idea for the caravan was conceived by George Amundsen, agricultural engineering specialist, and the first show will be presented on Jan. 3 in the MSC stock pavilion.

Group to Present Handel's Messiah

The choir of Peoples church will present Handel's "Messiah" Sunday evening at 7:30 at Peoples church. William San, professor of music at MSC, will direct the choir.

Contralto Harriet Hillier, East Lansing graduate student, and soprano Joyce Johnson, Royal Oak sophomore, will have solo parts in the presentation. The program will be sponsored by the Student Christian union and Peoples church.

"The Messiah," written in only 24 days, was first produced in Dublin in 1742 and is the most famous of Handel's Oratorios. The work is in three parts; the prophecies of the coming of Christ and the story of the Nativity; the life, suffering and death of the Savior, and the religious faith in the manner of a Credo.

Only the Christmas portion of the Messiah will be presented Sunday night.
