

# Spartans Drop Close Tilt To Irish, 56-54

### MSC Five Hold Lead At Half By One Point

A rough-riding and high-scoring Notre Dame quintet defeated Michigan State college cagers 56-54 last night in Jenison fieldhouse, before a record attendance of 10,085 spectators.

Starting out in great style by holding a 28-27 lead at half time, the Spartans fell behind in the second period with six minutes left to play and were never able to overtake the Irish.

State took a barrage of shots in the final minutes with a pair by Don Waldron and Sam Fortino hitting the mark and putting the Spartans within two points of the visitors, but this was as close as the Spartans could get.

#### Sparked by Klier and Borsta

The South Benders' defense, sparked by Leo Klier and Vince Borsta, held back each Spartan offensive threat in those last moments of action.

Notre Dame's attack, fast and versatile, had the speedy and clever playing of Klier and Borsta as its stars. Both tallied 13 points each to share high-scoring honors.

The Irish hit the scoring column first by running up a 3-0 lead in the opening minutes. State rallied, and through the efforts of center Bill "Sandy" Krall and Don Waldron, tied the score at the end of five minutes of play.

#### Tied Up At 17-All

State then took the lead 15-11 at the nine-minute mark through baskets by Fortino, Robin Roberts, Krall and Waldron. But Notre Dame came with 8 minutes before the half. This gave both teams a sniff for the lead, until Ollie White sank a dog shot to put the Spartans in the lead 28-27 less than a minute before the half ended.

Coming back in the second period, the Spartans still showed designs of holding the lead, and after nine minutes had passed, held sway 42-38. However, the Irish came to life and tallied points from every section of the floor to put them in the lead 47-44 with six minutes to play.

#### Last Minute Try

State could never regain the lead again, although in the last two minutes of play, baskets by Waldron and Fortino brought

### News in Brief

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—The government tonight outlined a new program designed to increase production of inexpensive cotton garments by fifty per cent.

DETROIT, Feb. 20 (AP)—Federal Mediator James F. Dewey, adjourning the General Motors-CIO United Auto Workers negotiations until Thursday morning, termed today's session "the best so far" and said it had resulted in "substantial" progress for a settlement of the 92-day old strike.

DETROIT, Feb. 20 (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics board today was presented a brief from the Michigan Air Transportation association seeking scheduled air transportation for 15 Michigan cities, according to an announcement by Carl H. Peterson, association president and Saginaw city manager.

VATICAN CITY, Feb. 20 (AP)—Pope Pius XII declared today that modern imperialism "carries in it germs which endanger the very foundations of human intercourse" and called upon the Roman Catholic church to take a militant leadership in preparing a basis on which human society "can rest securely."

### Truman Signs Bill to Insure Employment

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—A government "commitment to take any and all of the measures necessary for a healthy economy," as President Truman interpreted it, became law today with his signature.

It was the long-debated bill dealing with the opportunity to work. As finally enacted it establishes a policy for the government to plan and function maintaining "useful employment opportunities."

It sets up a three-man economic council. An informed source said Mr. Truman is considering for two of these places Gov. Ellis C. A. A. and John G. Winant, former social security board chairman and now ambassador to Britain.

Mr. Truman observed that the act "is not all I had hoped for."

Senior commencement invitations and graduation announcements may be ordered this week in the lower lounge of the Union, according to Maryvita Mulvihill, Grand Rapids senior and head of the ticket committee.

Miss Mulvihill emphasized that all orders must be in by Tuesday and that all money must be paid at the time the order is made.

Samples of the invitations and announcements will be displayed at the booth where subscriptions are taken.

Invitations and announcements will be on sale weekdays from 1 to 4 p.m. and Saturday 9 to 11 a.m.

Reports on last Thursday's preliminary vote show that the turn out for both classes was fair, according to Sue Averill, Birmingham senior. Sophomores had a larger proportion of votes cast, however, than did the freshmen.

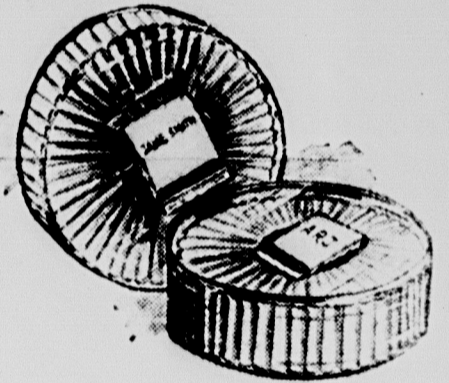

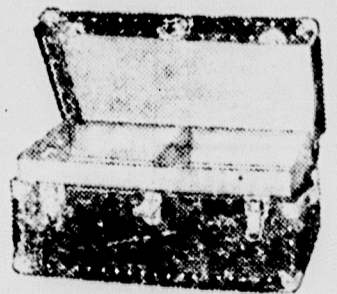

Goal of every MSC wrestler is to win the Walter Jacob award, given annually to the Spartan wrestler winning the greatest number of points during the regular season and in tournament competition.

With the season nearly gone, the men are pressing down the mat. The top contender is Gale Mikles, former AAU champ, out in front of the second straight year with 10 points.

Closest behind Mikles is Bob Anderson, Redford freshman star, with 9 points. Next is John Doolittle, Tulsa, Okla., star, who has 8 points.

Still in the running is Iggy Grant, one of State's several prep grapplers. Konrad is tied with Bill Covey, Detroit, at 16 points. Still holding a mathematical chance is Cliff Fletcher, who has a little snuff more from the mat.

Every true Spartan is fully aware that there exists at natural intervals a rivalry between State and Michigan. This rivalry is not confined to students alone. Between Fendley, Collins, MSC mat coach, and Ed Keen, coach of 'M' grapplers, there exists a rivalry dating back over 20 years.

Both wrestled at 158 pounds. Oklahoma A & M in the '20s. Keen held invincible records at A & M. Coach Keen came to Michigan in 1925 as mat tutor and also coached at State four years.

Since they became coaches at their respective schools, their teams have met 20 times. State has won 14. Only once in 1940 have the Wolverines taken back a State mat team. In 1942 they split, each winning the same score, 16-14.
