## Mad As Hopps

WHEN a member of the faculty said recently of felt students at MSC lacked responsibility in intellectual matters, he put the words in my mouth for which I've been

Following last week's dissertation I was asked: What separates college material from non-college material? Well, isn't it "intellect-ual responsibility?" If an educa-tion has to be forced down a person because he lacks that responsibility, he doesn't deserve to lean in the shelter of college

In raising our scholastic stand-ards, we should look to the person who has that responsibility. True, it can't be measured very accurately from previous grades, although previous grades are some indication.

On the other hand, it can be measured quite accurately after a student has been here a short while. Anyone who has difficulty in maintaining a one point every third term (and that appears to be all that's required to remain at State) either assumes no responsibility where education is concerned or doesn't have the wherewithall to get an education.

A student with either of these failings, and there must be some if professors declare it true, does not belong at State. A number of such students is sufficient to lower the scholastic standards of the school as a whole as long as marks are based on a curve. And a number of such students are responsible for the skepticism of instructors in trusting students to take a test. Lastly, a number of such students lower every individual's chances of being rated highly when compared with graduates from many other colleges and universities. Once out of school, you'll be competing with graduates from those other schools.

We can't condemn the person who isn't a brilliant student but still strives for an education. He works hard for what he gets and deserves all he does get. But he do condemn the many who don't seem to care whether or not they for the students. get an education. Higher entrance requirements, more rigid scholastic standards and class attendance at the student's discretion will rid us of the irresponsi-

## House Committee Recommends Bills

### Price Control, Income Tax Rates Planned By Post-War Policy Group

WASHINGTON, March 7 (A) - Modified extension of the price control act for another year, and maintenance of existing federal income tax rates, were recommended today by the House postwar economic policy committee,

The committee, headed by Rep. Colmr (D., Miss.), cautioned that effective control of inflationary forces will be "impossible without the aid of strong fiscal and monetary country representative management."

The committee, headed by base period for calculation of how much prices shall be increased above March, 1942, ceilings, to compensate for added costs. tre measeres.

The group filed its ninth re-port with Congress as Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson told the House banking committee the world food shortage makes it imperative to continue price controls and subsidy payments to hold down food costs in this country. The banking committee is considering legislation to extend the price control law another year beyond June 30.

After prolonged study, the postwar committee said, it reached the conclusion that summary removal of wartime controls "would most likely result in ruinous inflation and would react unfavorably not only to the wage earners and consumers, but to business itself."

#### Three Nations Split German Sea Power

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7 (A) -Britain, Russia and the United States agreed today to let Germany keep approximately one seventh of its remaining merchant marine, and split the balance — 1,189,000 gross tons, worth \$80,000,000 — three ways.

The tripartite action on seagoing ships was disclosed in an announcement simultaneously released in London, Moscow and Washington which said the

transfers are now taking place. In pre-war years, Germany's merchant marine ranked fourth in the world - behind Britain. the United States, and Japan. The 200,000 gross tons which will remain in its hands is the equivalent of about 22 American victory ships.
