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

The club will arrive back sometime Saturday after completing one of the best spring vacation records ever made by a State diamond team.





Soviet Delegate Leaves Council After Defeat

NEW YORK, Mar. 27 (P) — A spokesman for the Soviet delegation to the United Nations Security council said tonight the Russians would attend an executive session called for tomorrow afternoon on the understanding that "only procedural matters and not the Iranian question will be discussed."

NEW YORK, Mar. 27 (P) — The Russian delegation to the United Nations Security council picked up its papers and walked out of the council chambers today after being beaten in its fight to prevent consideration of the Iranian-Russian case before April 10.

The council then almost immediately proceeded to invite the Iranian delegate, Hussein Ala, to make a statement to the council.

It was after two hours of heated discussion that the Russian proposal to postpone the case until April 10 came to a vote. Only Russia and Poland voted for the motion and no negative vote was taken.

Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet delegate who had announced yesterday that he was not prepared to enter any discussion of the substance of the Iranian case before April 10, sat calmly in his seat as the council turned to an Egyptian proposal to have the Iranian delegate make his statement.

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
