Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, wartime director of selective service, and Maj. Gen. Willard S. Paul, army chief of personnel, offered this testimony to the senate military affairs committee.

Both insisted, despite sharp questions and comments from opposing senators, that the only way the United States can hope to fulfill its immediate international obligations is to extend the draft act which expires May

U.S. Offers Atom Control Plan Cosmopolitan Ball Tickets To Go On Sale Tomorrow

World Authority * Named Keeper Of Materials

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)-A plan for an international "atomic development authority" to be the sole producer of the world's fissionable materials and lease them to the nations for science and industry was released tonight by the state department.

It contemplates that over a period of years and as the data is established, knowledge now the exclusive possession of the United States will be made international property and plants like those at Oak Ridge, Tenn., and Hanford, Wash., will be owned and operated by the international authority - and by none other


A similar contest is open to undergraduate women.
