

Britain Calls For U.S. Aid In Palestine

Jews, Arabs Rise Against Report Of Inquiry Group

LONDON (AP) — Britain bid today for United States military and financial aid to carry out a joint policy in Palestine, as an uproar of protest over the British-American inquiry committee report threatened to erupt in violence.

Jews and Arabs alike assailed the report, and Jerusalem dispatches said Arabs in Palestine proclaimed a symbolic general strike for Friday in protest, urging neighboring Arab states to join them.

Cables Washington, London

The Arab higher committee sent cables to Washington and London repudiating the report and reiterating demands for an independent Palestine, a dispatch said.

In London, Prime Minister Attlee said Britain wanted to "know to what extent the United States government would be prepared to share the resultant military and financial responsibilities" for administration of Palestine, which the British inherited as a League of Nations mandate.

Britain Wants Assurance

Britain wants to be satisfied, he told the House of Commons, "that it will not be called upon to implement a policy which would involve it single-handed" in "heavy, immediate and long-term commitments."

He said the government would "get in touch with the government of the United States as soon as possible."

King Asks Ex-GIs For Certificates

Veterans have been asked by Tom King, director of servicemen's institute, to turn in their certificates of eligibility as soon as they receive them.

Those who fail to turn in these certificates will not be entitled to subsistence, and will be required to pay for their own books and tuition, King added.

These letters come from the state veteran's administration office and are to be turned in to the registrar's office in the office of veterans' affairs located in Demonstration hall.

Student Council Announces Regulations For Elections

Student council has laid down the following regulations which are to be observed during the forthcoming campaign and election for council members. Infractions of these regulations will subject candidates involved to disqualification.

1. "All campaign literature shall be limited to mimeographed material. Each mimeographed sheet should have the signature or signatures of those who prepare the same.
2. "There shall not be any defacing or otherwise defacing of public or private property by the candidate, individuals, or organizations in student elections. To scatter material promiscuously over the campus or in the town in such a way as to make a litter of trash is strongly discouraged.
3. "Each candidate is requested to provide a copy of all mimeographed advertising materials for Student council inspection and filing by election day.
4. "None of the means of advertising listed in article 1, nor written material, nor electioneering shall be allowed on the day of elections in the buildings

in which elections are held, within 100 feet of the polls, with the exception of one 9x12 inch poster, upon which may be posted a picture of the candidate not to exceed three by five inches in measurement. Such posters are to be placed upon a bulletin board designed by the council for said purpose.

5. "No individual or organization may use the name of any candidate in any of the means of advertising stated above without the knowledge and consent of the candidate.

6. "All disqualifications and infractions of election rules must be published in the State News by the Student council."

Turtles representing 20 colleges and universities took part in the unique event in which the turtles are started outward from the center point of a circle 10 feet in diameter.


The Vanderbilt entry covered the distance to the outer ring in 20 seconds flat to take the title.


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Byrnes Urges Reduction Of Austrian Occupation Molotov Disagrees With Plan

PARIS, May 1 (AP) U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes urged the foreign ministers conference today to reduce Allied occupation forces in Austria immediately and to plan simultaneous Allied evacuation of both Italy and Austria, a qualified conference source reported.

Byrnes asked that occupation garrisons be limited to 15,000 troops in each Austrian zone, and that their complete evacuation later coincide with the withdrawal of troops from Italy, this source said.

Discuss Italy Treaty

The proposals were made during a discussion of the Italian peace treaty. Byrnes said that so long as American troops remained in Austria, they would have to be maintained in Italy to protect supply lines.

Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov, presiding, ruled that the matter of Austrian occupation could not be discussed in connection with the Italian treaty.

Informants reported Molotov said the question should be raised if and when they examine the Austrian settlement. Thus far Russia has opposed United States proposals to add Austrian problems to the conference agenda.

Statesmen Disagree

Byrnes and Molotov disagreed when Byrnes proposed a general over-all political-military commission with subcommittees to supervise imposition of the Italian peace treaty terms.

The ministers were reported to have rejected Austria's bid for the return of the South Tyrol, ceded to Italy after the first World War.
