

# Foreign Ministers Adjourn, Still Deadlocked On Issues

PARIS, May 16 (AP) — The foreign ministers of the United States, Britain, France and Russia broke off their three-week old Paris conference tonight, adjourning until June 15 still deadlocked over major issues and peace treaties for Italy and the Balkans.

afternoon they initiated revised armistice terms for Italy to aid her reconstruction, an American informant said, but reached no agreement on the question of a peace treaty for Germany.

There was not even any agreement on appointment of a special commission to study German problems in advance of any conference on a German treaty, this informant said. U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes had news conference today. proposed such an advance study, and a German treaty conference next Nov. 12.

Byrnes also had sought un- for the post. successfully to have the ministers set a definite date now for a peace conference - preferably in July-to write treaties for Finland, Italy, and the Balkan nations but was opposed by Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Mol-
