## High School Boys Gain Experience In Government

More than 800 high school youths from all over Michigan have been on campus this past week for the ninth annual Wolverine Boys' State which ends at noon today.

Under the sponsorship of the American Legion, the boys were selected by their home town civic organizations as the outstanding students of their respective high schools.

In an experiment in democratic procedure, the boys organized a mythical "49th state" complete with all state, county and municipal elective and appointed offices. For the past week they have been simulating the functions of these offices.

Boys' State headquarters has been in Jenison fieldhouse, where 500 of the boys have been living. The remainder have been housed in quonset huts on the campus.

Yesterday, "Governor" Dave Anderson of Iron Mountain and other "state" officials took over the reins of the Michigan State government when they occupied the offices and legislative chambers at the capitol building in Lansing.

Other activities of the convalesce included a sports clinic under the tutelage of college athletic coaches, and the publishing of a daily newspaper, the Whirligig. Hastlet senior Ken Kahn, a night editor of the State News, acted as editor for the paper.

# Summer School Enrollment Figures Reach 4,139 To Establish New Record At Michigan State

## Final Number To Be Given Next Week

Marking an all-time high in summer school enrollment at Michigan State college, 4,139 students have registered for this term, according to latest enrollment figures.

This is an increase of approximately 2,500 students over last year's summer session when 1,615 students registered. Previous to this term, the highest summer enrollment figure was about 2,400.

Late registration will increase the 4,139 to some extent. Of the total, 3,012 are men and 1,127 are women, a reversal of last year when 682 women attended MSC and 733 men were enrolled.

The final enrollment figures will be released next week with a more complete breakdown of the number as to six-week, quarter, short course, and veteran students.

The letter was addressed to Student Council, which was sponsor of the band shell convocation, and reads as follows:

Mr. Thomas M. Loring, president Student Council Michigan State college East Lansing, Michigan

Dear Mr. Loring:

In response to the various questions raised as a result of the announced adjustment in dormitory rates, I am sending you this general statement as closing the incident so far as the college is concerned.

Mary Mayo hall, Sarah Langdon Williams hall, Louise H. Campbell hall, and Mason-Abbott halls were made possible through the use of borrowed funds and the sale of revenue bonds, since the usual mortgage relationship that accompanies the usual financing of buildings on borrowed money. The Ann Arbor Trust company is the trustee. There is a contract between the State Department of Agriculture and the Ann Arbor Trust company in which it is agreed that the college will operate the dormitories efficiently making every reasonable effort to keep them fully occupied; furnish light, heat, and water without charge; and charge the occupants of the buildings sufficient amounts to take care of the costs of operation and make available sufficient funds to be paid to the trustee to take care of the interest

The college contributes light, heat, and water without charge although these services cost

## Concert Star

The new dormitories now under construction are being similarly financed. The Ann Arbor Trust company is the trustee. The interest rate averages 1.8 per cent. The period of retirement of the debt has been extended to 20 years which is the longest period that the banks furnishing the money could be interested in.

One of the objectives of Michigan State college is to make available the best possible education to the greatest possible number of young people at the lowest possible cost, and that continues to be the objective. The college is no less interested in keeping dormitory rates at a low level than are the students who pay the rates. The college has no desire to make any profit on the operation, but it is required by our contracts, with those who furnished the funds for their construction to charge enough to take care of the costs of operation and the costs of the debt service.

The college contributes light, heat, and water without charge although these services cost

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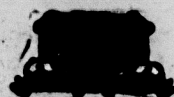


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## Four MSC Thineclads Entered In National Collegiate Meet

Four Spartan stars will vie for honors this afternoon in the 25th renewal of the National Collegiate track and field meet in Minnesota's Memorial stadium.

The hand picked Michigan State aggregation, composed of vaulter Ted Woneh, Leo

Naab, hurling the javelin, Jim Fraser, in the quarter mile, and Jim Gibbard running the mile, will compete in a field of 230 star trackers representing 57 colleges and universities from New York to California.

### World Record Holder

Included in the all-star athletic cast set to compete for individual and team championships are a world record holder, Herb McKenley of Illinois in the 440-yard dash, and another who recently equalled a world mark, Harrison Dillard of Baldwin Wallace college in the low hurdles.

Coach Karl A. Schlademan explained that only men who he thought had a chance to place in the classic were entered as he didn't think the team was quite strong enough to make a good showing as a complete team entry against the all star squads entered.

### Trojans Back

Adding luster to this year's NCAA contest will be the return of Dean Cromwell and his Southern Californian thineclads to the team competition after an absence of two years. Southern Cal is headed for an epic struggle with Illinois for top team honors.

The Trojans had carried off the trophy for nine consecutive years when transportation difficulties prevented their partici-

partion in 1943. Illinois took the laurels in 1944, and Navy followed in 1945. The Middies will not defend their title won a year ago at Milwaukee.

State's tracksters won three out of four outdoor dual meets this season, dominated the Drake relays, at Des Moines, placed fourth in the ICAA classic at Annapolis and tied for second place with Wisconsin in last week's Central Collegiate.

Jack Seibold, State medley champion from Jackson, and Roger Miller, Battle Creek freestyler.

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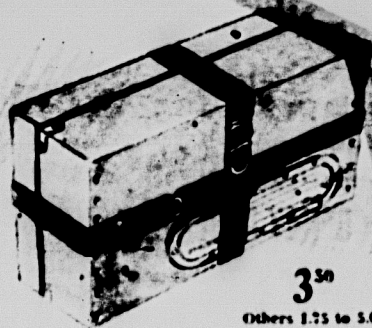
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# Hannah Says Rising Cost Of Living, New Buildings Caused Dorm Increase

 many thousands of dollars per year. The rates during the past two school years have been stable, and this year for the first time the dormitory revenues will not be sufficient to meet the planned financial schedule.

During the past several months food costs have gone up very materially, and every indication points to further increases. This is unfortunate, but since the college cannot control food prices and since we must buy most of our foods on the open market, we are in the same position as the average householder and are required to pay the current price for those things that we must buy even though we buy at wholesale and in large quantities. Labor rates likewise have increased consistently. Several times during the past two years we have made wage adjustments and recently have adjusted wage rates 5 cents per hour, effective as of April 1; and there is another increase of 5 cents per hour going into effect on July 1, and the basic rate for student labor is likewise being increased 10 cents per hour on July 1.

The new dormitories are costing more than twice as much to build as the existing dormi-

tories with the result that the per capita debt is more than twice what it was with the existing dormitories. The period of repayment has been extended over twice as many years so that the amount of principal payment each year is only a little higher than on the existing dormitories. The interest, however, is twice as much since it must be paid each year on the entire debt.

Some months ago all dormitories and food services were combined under a single manager, and Emory Foster was placed in charge of this total operation.

The State Board of Agriculture is given sole and exclusive responsibility for the operation of Michigan State college in the state constitution. In carrying out their functions they have decided that dormitory rates be adjusted to an amount sufficient to take care of present costs including food, labor, maintenance, and debt service.

Foster and Merrill Pierson, the comptroller, have made a careful study of present and prospective costs and recommend the rates that have been announced. These rates are based upon the same charge for room rent as is now paid with an increase in the board charge amounting to approximately \$1.00 per week and an over-all charge for the next school year of \$480 as compared to \$432 for the present school year. This is a percentage increase of 13.4 per cent and will provide only the funds that are required to take care of the usual operating costs of the dormitories plus the amount required to be paid to the trustee for interest, principal payments, and depreciation reserve.

These facts are not subject to argument. The costs involved are not subject to the control of the college. Foster and Pierson are better able to determine what costs are likely to be than mem-

bers of the student body or others with no direct knowledge of the problems involved.

The decision that all of the dormitories are to be operated as one operation under one director is sound. It would be inadvisable to have those living in dormitories already paid for charged a lower rate than those living in dormitories that are not paid for. The entirely unworkable arrangement which makes it possible for students on the campus to have first preference in the assignment of rooms for the coming year makes it possible for students living in Wells hall or North hall to move into one of the other dormitories for the next year if they wish to move.

There have been requests that individual students be permitted to analyze the business records of the college and various cost accounts, etc. These requests can not be complied with. Our comptroller's office and business offices are carrying more work now than the staff and facilities should be asked to carry. At the end of each fiscal year there is a printed financial report to the governor, copies of which may be seen in the library or may be obtained at the comptroller's office. At the end of each year competent outside auditing firms audit all the business transactions and records of the college during the preceding year. The audit for this fiscal year is being made by Ernst and Ernst, an internationally known firm of auditors.

Some of the questions that have been brought out in recent student discussions are impertinent, and those questioning the statements that have been made by Foster and Pierson by asking that substantiating data be provided are definitely insulting. I think they have been more than patient and that the statements that they have made are adequate. The conclusions that they have reached are based upon the

state of the present situation. The new rates are to be effective for the summer quarter. If costs increase further, they may have to be revised upward. On

the other hand, if costs decrease they can and will be revised downward.

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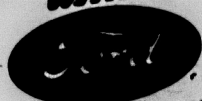
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
